Outstanding resource waters

High quality or unique waterbodies that warrant special protection







Outstanding resource waters are protected from degradation

Applies to new or expanded point source discharges or nonpoint sources of pollution after we adopt an ORW designation.


Some activities are still allowed


- Temporary activities
- To protect public health or property in an emergency

This rule does not apply to sources of pollution from the air

Protecting outstanding resource waters is a federal requirement







Soap Lake

Nominated in 2021 by:

- Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation
- Soap Lake Conservancy



What makes Soap Lake eligible as an ORW?

- Unique habitat that is regionally rare example of its kind
- Exceptional statewide ecological significance
- Regionally unique recreational value






Soap Lake
