

TOP THREE COMMODITIES



The bustling ports of Vancouver and Prince Rupert are dynamic gateways to international trade, offering shorter transit times to Asia. At the Port of Vancouver, we have coal, grain and intermodal terminals. In the Vancouver area, where over 900 CN employees live and work, we have a distribution centre for forest products, two for metals, three for automotive products, and a CN CargoFlo® bulk handling centre. In Prince George, with over 600 employees, we have an intermodal terminal and a distribution centre for forest products. Surrey's Thornton Yard is home to a major rail classification facility. CN also maintains large railcar and locomotive repair shops in Surrey and Prince George.

Network Investments

CN is moving significant added volumes of steelmaking coal from Teck's four mines near Kamloops, BC, for export to Asia via Neptune Terminals at the Port of Vancouver. CN invested over \$125 million to strengthen its rail network between Kamloops and Vancouver to handle the heavier traffic.

Over the past decade, CN has invested more than \$3.3 billion to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in B.C. and to support our supply chain partners. Expansion projects included the construction of new and extended sidings as well as double-tracking sections of our main lines to the ports of Prince Rupert and Vancouver. Maintenance projects focused on the replacement of rail and ties, plus upkeep of crossings, bridges, culverts, signals, and other track infrastructure.



Community Investments

CN CENTRE - PRINCE GEORGE The CN Centre in Prince George is northern British Columbia's premier sports and entertainment venue, which has hosted many internationally renowned acts and events. We're proud to have our name on the arena since 2005.

INDIGENOUS FOOD SOVEREIGNTY ASSOCIATION The Indigenous Food Sovereignty Association (IFSA) supports Indigenous peoples and cultures across B.C. through education, poverty alleviation, affordable housing and mental health assistance. IFSA's purpose is to support healthy, resilient Indigenous communities based on an abundance of culturally appropriate foods.

SALVATION ARMY CN donated to the Salvation Army to help our Operations employees sponsor six B.C. families over the Christmas holidays - two families each in Surrey, Kamloops and Prince George.
