Nova Scotia is home to the Port of Halifax, where CN handles all rail-served containers imported and exported through the marine facility. Halifax, home to over 400 CN employees, is the site of a major Autoport, where automotive vehicles imported from overseas enter North America for distribution across the continent. One of our intermodal terminals is also located in Halifax.

Network Investments

In November 2023, CN announced it acquired a stake in the Cape Breton & Central Nova Scotia Railway (CBNS) that includes 145 miles of active track. The CBNS, which interchanges with CN's main line at Truro, continues to be operated by a Genesee & Wyoming Inc. subsidiary. This ensures a seamless, safe, and efficient continuation of service for customers.

Over the past decade, CN has invested about \$200 million to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in Nova Scotia and to support our supply chain partners. The program focused on upgrades to bridges and the Autoport, the replacement of rail and ties, plus maintenance of public crossings, culverts, signal systems, and other track infrastructure.

Community Investments

NOVA SCOTIA ASSEMBLY OF FIRST NATIONS Working collaboratively, the Office of the Regional Chief proudly serves 13 Mi'kmaw First Nation communities in Nova Scotia through unity, harmony and collaboration to promote and protect the Mi'kmaw way of life.

CHISHOLM FOUNDATION FOR CHILDREN The team at Chisholm focuses on prevention, early intervention and aligning children with a loving and safe home. Chisholm provides three pillars of programming, including the child and youth caring program, the LINKS child literacy program, and the trauma-informed program for caregivers.

FIRST RESPONDERS SOCIETY – CAMP COURAGE The First Responders Society is a non-profit organization established to introduce young women and gender-diverse youth aged 15–18 to careers as first responders (primarily paramedics, police officers, and firefighters). Camp Courage provides information and opportunities to experience the physical demands of the job. Young women and gender-diverse youth leave with a sense of empowerment and confidence.

TEMA FOUNDATION The TEMA Foundation is a non-profit organization that focuses on mental health and wellness for frontline workers, first responders, healthcare professionals, public safety personnel and the important people in their lives. By developing educational programs and partnering with like-minded organizations, the TEMA Foundation delivers impactful education to individuals and businesses operating on the frontlines of civilian and military life.

SKILLS CANADA – NOVA SCOTIA Skills Canada – Nova Scotia (SCNS) is a non-profit organization that provides youth the opportunity to explore careers in skilled trades and technologies by offering programs throughout the province. CN supported SCNS' Skilled Futures for Women programs.
