## A BILL

To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to clarify the procedures and conditions for the award of matching grants for the purchase of armor vests.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. 3 4 This Act may be cited as the "Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Act of 2000". SEC. 2. FINDINGS. 7 Congress finds that— 8 (1) the number of law enforcement officers who 9 are killed in the line of duty would significantly de-10 crease if every law enforcement officer in the United 11 States had the protection of an armor vest; 12 (2) according to studies, between 1985 and 1994, 13 709 law enforcement officers in the United States 14 were feloniously killed in the line of duty;
  - (3) the Federal Bureau of Investigation estimates that the risk of fatality to law enforcement officers while not wearing an armor vest is 14 times higher than for officers wearing an armor vest;

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1	(4) according to studies, between 1985 and 1994,
2	bullet-resistant materials helped save the lives of more
3	than 2,000 law enforcement officers in the United
4	States; and
5	(5) the Executive Committee for Indian Country
6	Law Enforcement Improvements reports that violent
7	crime in Indian country has risen sharply, despite a
8	decrease in the national crime rate, and has con-
9	cluded that there is a "public safety crisis in Indian
10	country".
11	SEC. 3. MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM FOR LAW ENFORCE-
12	MENT ARMOR VESTS.
13	(a) Matching Funds.—Section 2501(f) (42 U.S.C.
14	3796ll(f)) of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets
15	Act of 1968 is amended—
16	(1) by striking "The portion" and inserting the
17	following:
18	"(1) The portion";
19	(2) by striking "subsection (a)" and all that fol-
20	lows through the period at the end of the first sentence
21	and inserting "subsection (a)—
22	"(A) may not exceed 50 percent; and
23	"(B) shall equal 50 percent, if—

1	"(i) such grant is to a unit of local
2	government with fewer than 100,000 resi-
3	dents;
4	"(ii) the Director of the Bureau of Jus-
5	tice Assistance determines that the quantity
6	of vests to be purchased with such grant is
7	reasonable; and
8	"(iii) such portion does not cause such
9	grant to violate the requirements of sub-
10	section (e)."; and
11	(3) by striking "Any funds" and inserting the
12	following:
13	"(2) Any funds".
14	(b) Allocation of Funds.—Section 2501(g) (42
15	U.S.C. 3796ll(g)) of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe
16	Streets Act of 1968 is amended to read as follows:
17	"(g) Allocation of Funds.—Funds available under
18	this part shall be awarded, without regard to subsection (c),
19	to each qualifying unit of local government with fewer than
20	100,000 residents. Any remaining funds available under
21	this part shall be awarded to other qualifying applicants.".
22	(c) Applications.—Section 2502 (42 U.S.C. 3796ll-
23	1) of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of
24	1968 is amended by inserting after subsection (c) the fol-
25	lowing new subsection:

1	"(d) Applications in Conjunction With Pur-
2	CHASES.—If an application under this section is submitted
3	in conjunction with a transaction for the purchase of armor
4	vests, grant amounts under this section may not be used
5	to fund any portion of that purchase unless, before the ap-
6	plication is submitted, the applicant—
7	"(1) receives clear and conspicuous notice that
8	receipt of the grant amounts requested in the applica-
9	tion is uncertain; and
10	"(2) expressly assumes the obligation to carry
11	out the transaction regardless of whether such
12	amounts are received.".
13	(d) Definition of Armor Vest.—Paragraph (1) of
14	section 2503 (42 U.S.C. 3796ll-2) of such Act is amended—
15	(1) by striking "means body armor" and insert-
16	ing the following: "means—
17	"(A) body armor"; and
18	(2) by inserting after the semicolon at the end
19	the following: "or
20	"(B) body armor which has been tested
21	through such voluntary compliance testing pro-
22	gram, and found to meet or exceed the require-
23	ments of NIJ Standard 0115.00, or any subse-
24	quent revision of such standard;".

- 1 (e) Interim Definition of Armor Vest.—For pur-
- 2 poses of part Y of title I of the Omnibus Crime Control
- 3 and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended by this Act, the
- 4 meaning of the term "armor vest" (as defined in section
- 5 2503 of such Act (42 U.S.C. 37966ll-2)) shall, until the date
- 6 on which a final NIJ Standard 0115.00 is first fully ap-
- 7 proved and implemented, also include body armor which
- 8 has been found to meet or exceed the requirements for pro-
- 9 tection against stabbing established by the State in which
- 10 the grantee is located.
- 11 (f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—Section
- 12 1001(a)(23) of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets
- 13 Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 3793(a)(23)) is amended by striking
- 14 the period at the end and inserting the following: ", and
- 15 \$50,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2002 through 2004.".

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
