
Impact Report 2022

On behalf of ConnectSafely, I am pleased to present our Impact Report. Since we were founded in 2015, ConnectSafely has grown in terms of its offerings, its reach and its impact. As we enter 2023, we now offer resources for nearly every popular interactive app and service, as well as the issues that concern parents, young people, policymakers and other stakeholders.

ConnectSafely has always focused on the needs of young people, and that remains our primary mission. However, as technology adoption has become ubiquitous, so has the need to address other vulnerable groups. To that end, we've expanded our offerings to include resources for seniors, LGBTQ youth and parents of very young children and are working on resources for people with disabilities, young adults and other groups. But no one is immune to online risks, which is why we have added resources to reach a broad range of consumers with information on how to protect their security in all their online interactions, including shopping, banking and medical applications.

We are also aware that not everyone absorbs information in the same way, which is why — in addition to our guides and quick-guides, we have launched short and long-form video and audio

resources, including our new "4-Minute" video series and our one-minute twice-weekly national radio segment. We're also expanding our social media presence to deliver messages directly to parents, educators and youth via TikTok, Instagram, Facebook and LinkedIn.

As we enter 2023, we are very concerned about the well-being of young people who are still recovering from the impact of the pandemic and are redoubling our efforts to help everyone, especially young people, use connected technologies in ways that help them thrive. That includes educational materials for youth, their parents and educators and working with companies and policymakers to ensure that they are doing all they can to help their users protect not just their safety, privacy and security but their overall well-being.

Our Programs

Guides and Quick-Guides

ConnectSafely offers both full-length and short-form safety guides for parents, educators and youth, covering popular apps and services as well as issues and risk areas. New or newly revised guides and quick-guides include sextortion, misinformation, cyberbullying, hate speech, sexting, Meta parental supervision tools, TikTok, Google Search, Twitch, and the new Meta Quest Pro.

"4 Minutes with..."

In 2022 we launched a short-form video project that will initially be geared toward parents. First guests include <u>TikTok</u> and <u>Snapchat</u>.

ConnectSafely Report for CBS News

In late 2020, ConnectSafely began a collaboration with CBS News to produce two weekly 1-minute segments called The ConnectSafely Report. It's carried by radio stations in more than 50 media markets, including New York, Boston, St. Louis, San Francisco, Chicago and other major cities and online at ConnectSafely.org/radio.

News & Analysis

ConnectSafely continues to cover topics that impact digital safety and wellness, with posts about <u>catfishing</u>, <u>age</u> <u>verification technology</u>, <u>technology and gun violence</u>, <u>legislation that aims to protect kids online</u> and much more.

Parent Survey in Partnership with TikTok

<u>TikTok</u>, in partnership with ConnectSafely, polled parents on what they do to help their teens stay safe online on all platforms — not just TikTok. It was conducted by YouGov, an international research data and analytics company, which interviewed 2,000 US parents of 13 to 17-year-olds. We were pleased to see that most parents (94%) reported feeling confident about speaking with their teens about their social media use. Fully 61% of parents say they talk with their teens about online safety after their teens tell them they've encountered a problem. while 58% initiated such conversations after seeing a negative change in the mood or habits of their teens.

Ask Trish

Ask Trish is a weekly blog and short video on TikTok and Instagram where Trisha Prabhu answers questions from young people. Trisha is now a 22-year-old Rhodes scholar at Oxford University. She continues to contribute weekly posts and videos for ConnectSafely on everything from the metaverse to the pros and cons of filters to online diet culture.

Digital Wellness Wednesday

Early this year, ConnectSafely is launching a short weekly tips blog and social media posts for parents, from our education director, Kerry Gallagher. Kerry's tips on digital wellness will focus on such topics as screens and sleep quality, app privacy settings, conspiracy theories and the news, minimizing eye strain, and body image.
