Agenda items

1. Welcome and introductions

OAIC opened the meeting and acknowledged the significant achievements of DP-REG and its member regulators in 2022.

2. Progress of DP-REG to date

The Chairs of the Working Groups provided an update on the Triannual Stocktake table which tracks the activities and achievements of the Working Groups for the months between July and October. It also sets out Working Groups' progress on their workstreams from their workplans, and their priorities for the next four months, being November to February.

2.1 Data and Research Working Group (DRWG)

The DRWG has been focussing on developing:

- a research hub to better catalogue and share research in real time,
- a digital platforms dictionary to better align key terms and definitions in the long term,
- survey instruments to help ACMA with their research on complaints on digital platforms which they are hoping to share in early 2023, and
- a scoping paper on a potential audit of digital platforms' terms and conditions. This workstream came out of the June communique and the DRWG is looking to put forward the paper to the Steering Committee early next year. The audit is likely to be focussed on the readability and accessibility of platforms' terms and conditions, and resourcing will be a key consideration in the paper.

2.2 Codes and Research Working Group (CRWG)

The CRWG has three workstreams:

- the first is aimed at building capacity across regulators in relation to code development and generally in relation to regulation:
 - the CRWG has had several presentations at the working group level. eSafety presented on the Basic Online Safety Expectations (BOSE) and the ACCC in relation to their role in code processes,
 - the next focus is on establishing a framework document regarding joint DP-REG submissions and statements,
 - the CRWG is continuing to meet to discuss best practice ideas. Considering developing at least one joint paper considering intersections on specific issues. Possible topics include privacy and safety in relation to age verification.
- the second is collaboration on areas of intersection, and
- the third is considering requests to engage with DP-REG concerning intersections and our respective regulatory remits or in relation to other regulatory issues.

2.3 Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG)

Key focus for the DTWG:

- Ongoing external engagement with industry. Meta engaged the DTWG to demonstrate their Metaverse technology and services, and engagement with CSIRO's Data61 on artificial intelligence best practices.
- Main focus of the last few months has been the written literature review on algorithms, structured around 3 areas most relevant to regulatory remits: recommender algorithms, targeted advertising and content moderation.
- DTWG will also commence horizon scanning work early next year on new technologies.

3. Communications and engagement strategy (OAIC and ACMA)

OAIC introduced this topic and noted that as DP-REG progresses, we anticipate there will be greater opportunities for external engagement with stakeholders. DP-REG has already received several proactive requests and it is anticipated that this will increase as awareness of DP-REG grows within industry and the community. DP-REG members also consider there is value in identifying opportunities to further promote the work of DP-REG to demonstrate how the forum facilitates coordination and collaboration amongst regulators in the regulation of digital platforms and the online ecosystem

3.1 Stakeholder engagement

- DP-REG currently assesses engagement requests on an ad hoc basis, and members proactively seek to identify opportunities for engagement. DP-REG has had 9 briefings from stakeholders since July 2022, and these have come from academia, the commonwealth government, and the digital platforms themselves.
- The proposal is to continue this current approach to stakeholder engagement, but we do anticipate an increase in requests for engagement as awareness of DP-REG increases.
- The ACMA proposed that the Steering Committee should conduct a stakeholder mapping exercise for DP-REG to help inform stakeholder engagement activities including prioritisation.
- Regulator Heads agreed and suggested that this could be reviewed and endorsed out of session.

3.2 Coordinating submissions and joint statements

- DP-REG members currently consult with each other on messaging used to describe DP-REG in submissions written on an individual basis. The ACMA prepared a paper setting out a more structured approach to submissions and joint statements.
- The ACMA noted that:
 - the CRWG is developing a framework for how DP-REG can make joint submissions to parliamentary inquiries, international consultation processes and other opportunities going forward.
 - a key issue in the development of that strategy is the process for approval of a submission, noting that each regulator has their own internal processes for submission approvals.
 - this is a key consideration when it comes to time critical submissions. The CRWG is developing an approach that gives the DP-REG Steering Committee early visibility of

matters of potential interest and provides for collective decisions to be made about pursuing joint submissions. This may involve delegating DP-REG approval of proposals for joint submissions to the DP-REG Steering Committee.

- the ACMA also raised the possibility of making joint statements where, for example, DP-REG wishes to show support for an initiative or condemn a matter involving online harms. The process would be similar to that developed for joint submissions. The CRWG anticipates presenting a final draft of the framework to the DP-REG Steering Committee, for their consideration and agreement, in Q1 2023.
- Regulator Heads generally agreed that consideration of joint submissions and statements should be pursued where warranted noting an administrative framework would be developed to support that process.
- Regulator Heads agreed approval for preparing joint submissions should sit with the Steering Committee, particularly where matters were time-critical noting the final product would still go through each individual regulators' internal clearance process.
- The ACMA noted that further consideration would likely need to be given to joint appearances given each regulator sits within a different portfolio.
- The OAIC noted that as part of their role in the Global Privacy Assembly (GPA), they had put forward a proposal for a mechanism to make statements on urgent matters out of session. One example where it was used was in relation to the GPA's statement in relation to Facebook's move to introduce their own native digital currency, Libra. This framework could be leveraged to help inform DP-REG's process for making joint statements.

3.3 Public facing explanatory material

The third proposal related to the DP-REG infographic:

- This has been prepared by eSafety's design team and is intended to be used as a public facing resource, including when responding to parliamentary committees or other inquiries about DP-REG. The proposal is to develop a longer infographic which shows how each regulator's respective remit intersects based on a mapping task completed by DP-REG members earlier in the year.
- The ACCC suggested expanding references to "safe" and "trusted" to also add "fair", "innovative" and "competitive".
- The ACMA suggested that the stakeholder engagement mapping exercise would help with putting together the longer infographic.

3.4 Branding and online presence

The final proposal was around DP-REG's online presence and branding:

- The Steering Committee has briefly discussed branding and a DP-REG web presence that could act as a single repository for public facing materials and decided to revisit this once additional DP-REG materials had been developed.
- DP-REG currently has Terms of Reference and June Communique published on the ACMA's website and regulators' respective websites, but further public facing documents (such as the infographic and end of year reporting) are on the way.
- The ACMA suggested that a branding and online presence be reconsidered in Q1 2023 when further products have been developed and the broader stakeholder mapping exercise has been conducted. Regulator Heads broadly supported this approach.

3.5 Other matters:

- The ACMA noted that the International Institute of Communications (IIC), which is an international group of regulators in the Communications space, have issued an invitation to meet with DP-REG in February. The ACMA will forward the invitation to the DP-REG group.
- eSafety added, in relation to international groups, that they had recently founded and launched the Global Online Safety Regulators Network together with the UK Ofcom and Fiji's Online Safety Commission in Washington DC. While in DC, eSafety also spoke to members of Congress, the Whitehouse and FTC Commissioners in relation to online safety regulation. The GPA had already contacted them, indicating a global interest in the intersection of the regulators.

Action item 1: Infographic to be updated to address minor amendments and finalised.

Action item 2: Steering Committee to conduct a stakeholder mapping exercise to help inform DP-REG's stakeholder engagement strategy. To be circulated for Regulator Heads approval out-of-session.

Outcome 3: Regulator Heads approved the ACMA's proposed approach as set out in the joint submissions paper noting that an administrative framework will be developed to support that process.

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5. Other business

- ACCC noted that the next step for the DPSI 5 recommendations on reform is that Treasury will consult on those recommendations in the new year. DPSI 6 is progressing well and will go to the Treasurer in March.
- eSafety will shortly be releasing their BOSE report covering activity from Apple, Meta, WhatsApp, Skype and Omegle. eSafety is also currently completing a technology assessment through a third-party independent technology provider on age verification and age solutions which is planned to be delivered around March. eSafety also provided an update on its work in relation to the development of industry codes.
- OAIC noted the *Privacy Legislation Amendment (Enforcement and Other Measures) Bill 2022* came into force on 13 December 2022. The ACMA and OAIC received new information sharing provisions, while the extra-territoriality provisions are now aligned with those of the Australian Consumer Law. The Privacy Act Review is ongoing.

Action Items

Outcomes

Minutes

Agenda item 1: Welcome and introductions, including opportunity to ask working group chairs questions about progress

- The Chair opened the Regulator Heads meeting with an Acknowledgement of Country.
- The Chair thanked the working groups for their assistance in preparing an overview of DP-REG's activities and achievements over the past financial year (Attachment A). This agenda item was covered on the papers, and the Regulator Heads acknowledged the work that the working groups have completed.
- eSafety commented that it is important to connect the work of DP-REG to what we are doing as regulators, and the Department of Industry, Science and Resources' (DISR) discussion paper on AI is a good opportunity to demonstrate where our collective regulatory capabilities can be put into effect.

Agenda item 2: Discussion of output of Digital Technology Working Group

- The Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG) Chair presented on the working group's Algorithms Literature Summary and examination of Generative AI Large Language Models.
- Algorithms Literature summary (Attachments B and C):
 - The DTWG explained that the Algorithms Literature Summary represents the main output from the working group under the algorithms strategic priority for 2022/23 DP-REG. The Cover Paper (Attachment B) sets out a high-level explanation of the paper and the options, advantages and disadvantages for publishing the paper. The DTWG sought a decision from the Regulator Heads on publication of the paper, potentially on a DP-REG dedicated website later in the year.
 - eSafety suggested that, in future, if the principles, approach and issues in the paper are circulated earlier, that would yield more positive results. It is important that the paper reflects our regulatory roles and perspectives and avoids an overly academic tone.
 - The ACCC noted the framing of the paper around themes of fairness, trust and safety was useful. The ACCC suggested that these themes are consistent in the next paper on LLMs as well. s47C
 - The ACMA noted that the paper would be particularly useful internal to government noting there is much work being done in various areas and it would be useful to share the depth of understanding in the space that DP-REG can offer as a collective of regulators. Going forward, these papers demonstrate what DP-REG can offer government. The DTWG agreed and added that they had received interest in the paper from various government departments already.

- The Regulator Heads supported publishing the paper with the method of publication to be discussed as part of the web presence paper.

- Examination of technology – Large Language Models

- The DTWG explained that this paper is the first of a series of examination of technology studies that the working group is planning to write. The paper and series will have a strong focus on the regulatory remit of DP-REG and its connection to the topics. This draft incorporates feedback from the Steering Committee and each member. The DTWG sought in principle support to publish the study pending finalisation of the draft. The DTWG also sought feedback on whether the paper should be an attachment to the DP-REG's submission to the DISR AI discussion paper.
- The DTWG noted eSafety's preference to publish the DTWG paper after eSafety publish their Tech Trends paper on generative AI in July.
- The DTWG also noted that the paper would be updated in the coming weeks to capture new developments in the quick-moving space.
- The ACMA supported publishing the paper in principle and said that, subject to its finalisation, it would be useful to share a copy with government and DISR to inform their AI discussion paper outcomes.
- eSafety noted that the DTWG's paper primarily focusses on text generation and not imagery and voice generation, whereas eSafety's paper is broader and covers imagery (including deepfakes, CSAM, terrorist content). eSafety acknowledged the rapid developments in this space and questioned whether the paper should be expanded to cover other forms of generative AI output. After their Tech Trends paper is published, eSafety undertook to provide materials that could be used to update the paper with analysis around imagery and voice generation. The DTWG clarified that the plan was for this paper to be the first in a series, and solely cover LLMs. Future papers may cover image and voice generation. Members agreed with this approach.
- The ACMA suggested it may be helpful to include something at the start of each paper in the series that sets out our connection to the area and establishes that the piece is part of a series.
- The Chair asked members if there was a desire to make a joint submission to the DISR discussion paper. eSafety echoed the ACMA's earlier point that it is important to provide the government with DP-REG's voice in this space as regulators. There have been historical suggestions of an AI Safety Commissioner which all DP-REG members have been unified in saying is not needed. It would be useful to reiterate this with a broad statement that sets out how DP-REG members are working across the digital domain, where members' powers apply and any suggestions about how government might approach any gaps. The working group should consider this.
- The ACCC supported eSafety's comments. Given the substantial media and industry interest in AI, having a joint submission is important. The DISR discussion paper has consistent themes and principles, and sharing a draft of the DTWG's LLM paper with industry in that context and making a formal submission makes sense.
- The ACMA also agreed, commenting that the DP-REG's submission to the DISR AI discussion paper should be at the strategic level. In their roundtable with the Minister, they emphasised that there are existing laws that deal or could deal with these matters. The DP-REG's submission should consider how to position the regulators and DP-REG in the regulatory space rather than focus on the technology itself.

- The Chair sought confirmation whether members wanted to pursue a joint submission from DP-REG to the DISR AI discussion paper. The Chair suggested that perhaps dot points aimed at the strategic level could be circulated early for feedback and framing purposes. Members agreed to this approach. The ACMA said that they would want to see the proposal so that there's a clear steer from the Regulator Heads before building that out in the submission.
- There were no objections to publishing the LLM paper further into the future.

Action item 1: The DTWG will progress a strategic-level joint submission from the DP-REG to the DISR AI discussion paper. The DTWG will develop a dot point summary of the proposed structure and content of the submission and circulate those dot points with the Regulator Heads for feedback.

Outcome 1: The algorithms literature summary and the LLM paper will both be published. The LLM paper is to be published some time after the publication of the algorithms literature summary.

Agenda item 3: Communications and engagement strategy

- The Codes & Regulation Working Group (CRWG) spoke to the stakeholder mapping exercise (Attachment F):
 - The stakeholder map is nearing completion, subject to the confirmation of additional stakeholders recently added by eSafety.
 - The next step is to set out more actionable definitions for terms such as “positively engage” and “keep informed” that will help to contextualise the broader Communications and Engagement Strategy of DP-REG with those stakeholders, e.g. roundtables, individual meetings, other methods of keeping stakeholders updated. The communications and engagement methods settled upon will need to consider DP-REG’s resources at the relevant time.
 - The ACMA agreed that the next steps are to consider DP-REG’s priorities in terms of positive engagement with stakeholders. There are already several engagements a month—i.e. the working groups, the Steering Committee, external engagements—so thought needs to be given to how to prioritise the next strategic engagements. The ACMA suggested developing 3-4 key areas of strategic engagement for DP-REG, for example, a roundtable with DISR and relevant ministers on AI.
 - eSafety suggested that a roundtable could be considered further towards the end of the year once a communications strategy and website are established. eSafety noted industry sentiments that there is a crowded regulatory landscape, and noted that public communications would give DP-REG a good opportunity to talk about their individual domains, strategies and areas of focus, and how DP-REG members cooperate with each other. This is an important message that also shows DP-REG’s openness, transparency, and willingness to work with stakeholders to demystify the questions they may have.
 - The ACCC commented that it would be useful to identify the key issues that DP-REG would want to engage on.

- The OAIC was also supportive of the approach and queried whether the CRWG could consider developments in the external strategic environment (e.g. papers, developments, timing) and propose potential opportunities to engage based around those considerations. The Chair drew attention to Attachment J which tracks government initiatives related to digital platforms which would help to focus on key opportunities for engagement. The CRWG agreed, and the ACMA added that it would be helpful to try and secure 3 or 4 more engagements by the end of the year.
- DP-REG web presence:
 - The Secretariat introduced the item by noting that given the DP-REG’s work and outputs, it is the appropriate time to consider establishing DP-REG’s web presence. Attachment G sets out the financial and resourcing implications for 3 options: a dedicated DP-REG domain; a microsite; or no presence. The Secretariat recommended building a microsite connected to the OAIC’s domain (as Secretariat) using an external consultant. The Secretariat also recommended developing a DP-REG logo but that the web presence could be launched without a logo given the time it would take to develop a logo.
 - eSafety supported developing the microsite and noted a website helps lend credibility to DP-REG. However, it may be important that the landing page clarifies that the website is a work-in-progress and that DP-REG will be looking to develop it further in the future.
 - The ACMA agreed. In relation to the logo, the ACMA’s preference is that the crest is used to provide visibility that DP-REG are Commonwealth regulators.
 - The Secretariat confirmed this that the microsite would initially be an OAIC web address, but DP-REG would look to have a dedicated domain in the future.
 - s47C [REDACTED]
 - Members agreed that the cost of the microsite would be shared equally amongst all four members (25% each).

Action Item 2: Stakeholder map to be finalised with additional stakeholders added by eSafety.

Action Item 3: CRWG to develop 3-4 areas of strategic engagement for DP-REG to consider, while having regard to DP-REG resourcing.

Action Item 4: That a microsite for the DP-REG is established and the cost would be shared between regulators.

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Agenda item 5: Extension of the Working Group and Secretariat tenures and strategic priorities for 23/24

- The Chair raised that the Steering Committee had proposed to extend the current Working Group Chairs and Secretariat functions for a 12-month period to the end of the 2023/24 financial year, and the current working group workplans for a 6-month period to the end of 2023. At the beginning of 2024, the Steering Committee could look at the DP-REG outputs and working roles, and inform the strategic priorities for next financial year. Members endorsed this proposal.

Outcome 3: That the Working Group Chairs and Secretariat functions be extended for 12 months to the end of the 2023/24 financial year, and the Working Group workplans be extended for 6 months to the end of 2023.

Agenda item 6: Draft media release

- The Chair introduced the draft media release (Attachment I) and noted the Steering Committee had discussed the publication of a media release or communique following the Regulator Heads meeting. The draft media release highlights the achievements of the DP-REG in the year to date and signals its current exploration of generative artificial intelligence technologies.
- The ACMA endorsed the media release, subject to an amendment to include the names of each of the Regulator Heads.
- eSafety asked about the process for release. The Secretariat noted that they planned to follow the same process as the last media release but were open to another process if

there were preferences. eSafety said that it depends on the audience and suggested it may be worthwhile contacting certain media outlets that may be interested in the media release.

- The OAIC commented that the release is a good transparency and accountability piece and suggested that members also host the release on their websites as a resource. The ACMA added that the microsite could be the first place to release papers in the future.

Action Item 6: Media release to be published on members' websites and Secretariat to liaise with Strategic Communications teams of each regulator in relation to the release strategy.

Agenda item 7: Other

- The ACMA noted that they expect public consultation on a Misinformation and Disinformation Bill to be forthcoming.
- eSafety noted that they were considering commencing legal action against a social media company.
- Members agreed that the December 2023 Regulator Heads meeting would be in person.

Outcome 4: The December 2023 Regulator Heads meeting will be an in-person meeting.

Agenda Items

1. Tech Policy and Regulator Coordinator Model (30 minutes)

Joanna Weaver (ANU) gave a presentation on the ANU Policy Tech Group's Tech Policy and Regulator Secretariat (TPRC) Model (see overview). Members were given the opportunity to ask questions and give views.

The ACCC asked questions about the composition of the technology panel and clarified if the experts would include those employed by digital platforms, noting that this could raise particular considerations for regulators. ANU noted that it would include technical experts employed by digital platforms if they had expertise in the area. The ACCC also raised considerations around the size of the industry panel.

eSafety noted that in relation to the secretariat function that the ability to have senior level discussions is well captured but that the frequency of meetings (monthly) may be too ambitious. It was also noted that DP-REG is not only about policy, but also about broader (enforcement) coordination between the agencies.

JW noted that policy makers have an appetite to examine how to better engage with regulators in a way that doesn't impinge on independence. Whilst industry (and academics) have indicated that they want non-transactional relationship with regulators, DP-Reg members noted the importance of maintaining independence and impartiality.

2. Action items from meeting on 20 May 2022

Action item 1: The Secretariat (ACCC) to draft a workplan, to be distributed for review and approval by DP-REG members prior to the Chair-level meeting in June

The ACCC developed a draft Work Plan and all agencies provided input and comments. Whilst we previously discussed the prospect of publishing the work plan after the DP-REG heads of agency meeting, after further discussion with staff from DP-REG agencies including media teams, it was instead decided to publish a meeting [Communiqué](#) with a summary of the key priorities.

Action item 2: The Secretariat (ACCC) to reach out to DP-REG members in coming weeks to begin developing a 3-page narrative document regarding the role of DP-REG

A kick-off meeting at officer-level was held on 13 July 2022. Staff aim to present a draft document by the next DP-REG meeting in September.

Action item 3: ACMA and OAIC to go back to Meta and Apple to ask whether it is possible to invite other DP-REG members to planned briefings

Apple privacy DMA briefing took place on 15 July 2022. ACMA noted that it hasn't heard back from Meta regarding the Metaverse and would be followed up.

3. Coordination and collaboration between DP-Reg agencies

(a) Update from Agency heads meeting

Agency heads met on 28 June 2022 and agreed a set of DP-Reg work priorities. A meeting Communiqué was published. It was noted that there was a defensive element to the discussion, and that that whilst all agencies indicated their commitment that there was recognition of the difficulties with limited resourcing s47C
s47C Reception of the photo and social media was generally positive.

(b) Discussion of options to progress the new DP-REG work priorities

Draft Work Plan 2022-23 developed, and the ACMA Governance proposal document circulated along with further email discussion of options.

Members agreed that the governance arrangements should apply for approximately 12 months – for the duration of the work plan and be re-assessed in mid-2023. The following Working Group leads were agreed:

- Data and Research: ACMA
- Codes and Regulation: eSafety
- Digital Technology: ACCC

The OAIC will take over as Secretariat in advance of the next meeting in September.

Whilst agencies will chair particular Working Groups, members noted that each agency would have a representative in each Working Group and that the Working Groups should work closely together in developing work plans (particularly taking into account public commitments, noting that the current draft work plans for working groups do not necessarily marry up neatly with DP Reg's public commitments). The Chair of each Working Group will be responsible for developing the work plan for that Working Group. Each Working Group will report to Steering Committee on a regular basis, possibly to alternate meetings.

All agencies agreed to provide contact details as to who will be the relevant agencies' Working Group Chair and relevant Working Group nominations. The ACCC (as Secretariat) will coordinate Working Group membership. Working Group chairs will coordinate with each other to ensure delivery of DP-Reg priorities, public commitments, and identify and manage areas of overlap.

Action item 1: ACCC to circulate a request for working group nominations and chair details. Agencies to provide Working Group Chair and member contact details.

Action item 2: Working Group Chairs to meet to coordinate consideration of workplans and project plans and ensure delivery of priority areas. Working Groups to have particular regard to the public commitments made about DP Reg's areas of focus, to ensure the work of the Working Groups marries up with the public commitments made.

Members also discussed changes to the Terms of Reference. It was noted that the proposed ACMA changes were accepted at the Agency Head meeting on 28 June

but that minor additional changes would be needed to reflect that the Secretariat role would no longer rotate on a 6 monthly basis.

Action item 3: ACMA to recirculate Terms of Reference with necessary amendments.

(c) Data sub-committee update

The Data sub-committee met on 3 June 2022 to discuss the data gap analysis and future areas for data collaboration. It was agreed that each agency would undertake a review to identify topics or areas that they wish to explore and the ACCC sent around a document with some suggestions. Members agreed that this work stream will be folded into the Data and Research Working Group to be led by ACMA.

(d) Liaison and coordination with government

ACCC provided a short update on recent discussions with the Digital Technology Taskforce (DTT), which is being moved from PMC to DISER in a machinery of government change. The DTT have offered to update DP-REG at a future meeting about their role and future coordination on digital issues. Members agreed to offer the DTT the chance to speak at the beginning of the next DP-REG meeting (similar to the ANU presentation).

Action item 4: ACCC to offer Digital Technology Taskforce opportunity to speak at next DP-REG meeting in September.

The ACMA noted that it was recently contacted by the Department of Home Affairs to set-up a joint meeting with DP-REG, particularly to discuss our work on algorithms. The Department is also looking into algorithms, with a terrorism/national security focus. All members agreed it was too early for the DP-REG to discuss this aspect of the work plan given that the Working Groups had not yet kicked off. eSafety agreed to meet with them as part of broader engagement and then to organise a more technical discussion with the relevant DP-REG Working Group once it is more established. eSafety noted that it has previously provided input to the DISER AI Ethics Framework – noting the overlap between the work of DISER and the Department of Home Affairs.

Action item 5: ACMA will have an interim meeting with the Department of Home Affairs. DP-Reg Secretariat (OAIC) to organise a joint Department/DP-REG meeting with the relevant Working Group at a later date.

The OAIC also noted that ASIC had approached it regarding DP-REG. It was agreed that requests from Government should be directed to the Chair who will coordinate responses and meetings as appropriate.

(e) Change in chair, virtual workspace, and online collaboration tools

As agreed, the Chair/Secretariat role will move to OAIC for 12 months. OAIC will organise the next DP-REG Steering Committee meeting (which is currently scheduled for 16 September but may be rescheduled by the OAIC if desired).

Action item 6: ACCC to delete meeting invite and OAIC to send new invite for next DP-REG Steering Committee meeting to be held in September.

Action item 7: ACCC/OAIC to organise Secretariat handover meeting.

Members agreed to discuss options for digital workspaces. In particular, whether any agencies have a platform that could be used by DP-REG or whether it would be appropriate to continue to work over email for now. ACCC agreed to send a note for the next DP-REG meeting on options for digital workspaces.

Action item 8: ACCC to send note prior to next DP-REG meeting outlining options for digital workspaces.

4. Agency updates

(a) OAIC

The OAIC updated that:

- Privacy policy and law reform review is still going and that the Attorney-General's Department is working hard to complete their report
- The OAIC are still waiting for a court date (High Court) for the Facebook matter
- Online privacy bill has not been introduced but the new Government has acknowledged that it needs to be progressed. ^{s47C}

(b) eSafety

eSafety updated that:

- Industry codes are being progressed with close industry consultation. The timeframe has been extended to 18 November 2022 (9 week extension). eSafety noted that the approach of platforms and industry to day has not been particularly cooperative.
- Public consultation will be the next step (28 day consultation). eSafety has asked industry to wait for their feedback on the Codes before launching their consultations.
- eSafety released its regulatory guidance on the Basic Online Safety Principles on 25 July 2022. There were targeted communications to industry along with several information sessions about what to expect. The first round of reporting notices in August will look at child sexual exploitation and abuse.
- eSafety met with privacy experts regarding the Age Verification Roadmap and will hold final consultation next week. Have heard from diverse groups. Consultation is seeking views on draft principles would underpin technical and non-technical interventions and risks. eSafety will report by the end of the year.
- On tech trends and challenges, eSafety is looking into recommendation algorithms & online safety – and will share its draft report with DP-REG members. It is preparing position statements on end-to-end encryption and will seek feedback. The OAIC noted that they are very interested in this issue.

(c) ACMA

The ACMA updated that:

- On the Dis/Misinformation Code, DIGI announced its review and call for submission closes next week. It's a narrow review with a number of areas carved out to look at later.
- The ACMA is continuing to work with DITRICA on disinformation. They are interested in potential regulatory options for harmful but legal content. The European Commission released a strengthened EU Code on Misinformation, which will become a Code of Conduct under the DSA. It will be a self-regulatory instrument with hard reporting obligations. Obligations on v-locks will become active when DSA comes into effect.
- ACMA released its paper 'What audiences want – Audience expectations for content safeguards' last week.
- Treasury held its first (closed) roundtable today on the NMBC review. Platforms will join for another roundtable next week.

(c) ACCC

The ACCC updated that:

- The 5th interim report (Regulatory Reform Report) team is concentrating on the detail of drafting at the moment and is looking closely at international developments. The ACCC is also have discussions with digital platforms, particularly regarding their responses to the EU DMA. We are getting very different responses regarding the voluntary roll out of measures to other jurisdictions.
- ACCC (along with OIAC) attended CMA's Google Privacy Sandbox quarterly update meeting on 22 June 2022. CMA advised in the meeting that stakeholders had raised a number of concerns and that they are trying to understand and address these concerns. The CMA is going to hold another international update meeting following the next quarterly report.

5. Close

There was no other business. The next meeting will be in September, with the OAIC to send an invite.

- 3** DP-REG endorsed the working group reporting template and public end-of-year reporting templates (Attachments K and L)

- 4** DP-REG endorsed 25 November 2022 as the next Steering Committee meeting date.

Agenda items

1. Digital Technology Taskforce

The Digital Technology Taskforce (DTT) presented on the role of the DTT and the potential for future coordination on digital issues. By way of background, they noted that their previous work included the Digital Economy Strategy and coordinating budget packages to support the Strategy.

While it is presently unclear what the change of government means for the Digital Economy Strategy, the current government has a similar commitment to jobs in the tech space (1.2 million tech-related jobs by 2030) and, currently, Minister Husic (Minister for Industry and Science) takes on a whole-of-government data and digital coordination role.

The DTT is continuing some of its key pieces of work from the last administration, including:

- consulting on artificial intelligence and automatic decision-making regulation (an options paper is likely to be released in October),
- exploring a digital and tech skills compact to set up a working group within industry, government, and the training sector to look at digital apprenticeships, and
- developing a broader data strategy for the digital economy.

The DTT noted that the Productivity Commission's work will be a big part of informing the productivity agenda going forward and their comments around data and digital will inform the economic package.

The DTT also indicated there will a Band 2 IDC meeting in the future to discuss how to bring a sense of coordination and coherence to the various pieces of work in progress.

The ACCC noted the Productivity Commission's paper seemed focussed on large uses of data, but is not very privacy, security or consumer related. eSafety asked about the Government's security approach. The DTT responded that trust and confidence is a recurring theme in the Government's strategies and that security has a role in these themes—Government aims to provide confidence to the marketplace to ensure that things are operating as they should.

The OAIC suggested that DP-REG members should be involved in the Digital Economy Summit and Band 2 IDC meeting to ensure the DP-REG perspective is captured at those meetings. DTT agreed and indicated they would provide a list of attendees to the DP-REG once available.

eSafety commented that it would be useful to hear from industry about over-regulation and its impact on the start-up scene. DTT agreed they are considering where the balance lies between regulation and letting the market operate and that it would be helpful to involve DP-REG in this conversation.

Action item 1: DP-REG to consider how to coordinate with the Digital Technology Taskforce, particularly where regulation of industry is involved.

2. Action items from 15 July 2022 meeting

Action item 1: the ACCC will circulate a request for working group nominations and chair details. Agencies to provide Working Group Chair and member contact details

Status: This has been completed - the ACCC circulated a finalised list of participants for working groups.

Action item 2: Working Group Chairs to meet to coordinate consideration of workplans and project plans and ensure delivery of priority areas. Working Groups to have particular regard to the public commitments made about DP Reg's areas of focus, to ensure the work of the Working Groups marries up with the public commitments made.

Status: This has been completed – the Working Group Chairs met and each working group has commenced drafting a work plan (discussed further in item 4).

Action item 3: ACMA to recirculate DP Reg Terms of Reference with necessary amendments.

Status: Further changes to the Terms of Reference were consolidated into a new draft and circulated by the ACCC on 26 July 2022 (Attachments A and B). During the meeting the Steering Committee endorsed the updated Terms of Reference for publication.

Action item 4: ACCC to offer Digital Technology Taskforce opportunity to speak at next DP-REG meeting in September.

Status: This has been completed – the Digital Technology Taskforce presented at this meeting.

Action item 5: ACMA will have an interim meeting with the Department of Home Affairs. DP-Reg Secretariat (OAIC) to organise a joint Department/DP-REG meeting with the relevant Working Group at a later date.

Chair's update: This engagement was discussed as part of agenda item 6 – processes for stakeholder engagement.

Action item 6: ACCC to delete meeting invite and OAIC to send new invite for next DP-REG Steering Committee meeting to be held in September.

Chair's update: This has been completed.

Action item 7: ACCC/OAIC to organise Secretariat handover meeting.

Chair's update: This has been completed.

Action item 8: ACCC to send note prior to next DP-REG meeting outlining options for digital workspaces.

Chair's update: DP-REG agencies met at an officer level to discuss use of GovTeams as a digital workspace for the purpose of officer level collaboration.

Outcome 1: DP-REG agreed that all action items from the 15 July 2022 Steering Committee meeting except for action item 5 had been completed with no objections. Action item 5 was discussed as part of agenda item 6.

3. Update on Working Group work plans

Digital Technology Working Group

The Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG) met on 10 August and 6 September to progress the workplan. They agreed to four key workstreams:

- Workstream 1: algorithms and their impact,
- Workstream 2: horizon scanning to identify those technologies that may impact on regulatory remit,
- Workstream 3: consideration of particular technologies and their implications, and
- Workstream 4: external engagement relevant to digital technology issues.

The DTWG indicated that they will prioritise Workstream 1 for the rest of 2022, with key deliverables being an interagency workshop to share current experience and build capacity, and a literature review drawing on overseas regulatory work. In early 2023, the DTWG will begin Workstreams 2 and 3, and afterwards, Workstream 4, however, they noted that they will maintain a regular dialogue on the external seminars members are attending to share knowledge throughout the year.

eSafety asked about the parameters of the algorithms and impact workshop. DTWG responded that they are taking their lead from the UK who indicated that when they started their examination of issues, the critical part was understanding what each regulator was already doing in that space and their interests in algorithms. The same need was apparent to the DTWG in their meetings, and each agency will be giving a 10-minute presentation at their October meeting on their engagement with algorithms. The literature review of overseas regulators' work will also assist to scope the workshop. The ACCC noted that the workshop could identify common threads and areas of interest, e.g. transparency and how it is explained.

Codes & Regulation Working Group

The Codes & Regulation Working Group (CRWG) met on 12 August and 6 September to settle their Terms of Reference which directs their work, and their Workplan detailing the aspects of their three workstreams:

- Workstream 1: building capacity in code development and regulation. At their 11 October meeting, members will present on their experience in code regulation and development, process and implementation, enforcement, and review process.
- Workstream 2: Collaborating on a coordinated approach to areas of intersection, which will involve identifying opportunities to collaborate or produce joint papers. CRWG expects this workstream to take them through to 2023, with regular stocktakes and considerations around potential intersections.
- Workstream 3: external engagements on an ongoing basis.

ACMA noted that they have benefited from informal conversations around code making powers. While the misinformation code is currently voluntary, they expect that could change

if the ACMA were provided regulatory powers in the future. eSafety commented that they wanted to build a process of evaluation where members can share their experiences with codes, and that data collection may be important in that.

Data & Research Working Group

The Data & Research Working Group (DRWG) noted having the benefit of previous work done by the preceding Data Subcommittee on their workplan, which they finalised with three workstreams:

- Workstream 1: Improving data sharing arrangements between members. One of the main activities (from the previous workplan) is taking a stocktake of data from agencies last year, and the DRWG are interested in a research project on barriers to sharing data between agencies.
- Workstream 2: Scoping an audit of platform rules and frameworks, which draws on the DP-REG communique in relation to looking at platforms' Terms and Conditions. DRWG indicated that they are scoping at this stage because this task will be potentially very resource intensive and will revert to the Steering Committee once the scoping exercise is completed. This workstream also includes complaints research through the ACMA which will be shared with the broader group once ready.
- Workstream 3: Laying foundations for joint data and research projects. This includes developing a digital platforms dictionary that would be shared amongst DP-REG members' policy departments to be used to align members' legislative proposals and outputs. This may also include a workshop around digital platforms' metrics and needs, which may feed into the DP-REG communique for 2023/24.

eSafety commented that the data dictionary likely needs to be provided to the OPC and other Departments as well to see if there are existing version to being with. DRWG indicated that that may be the second phase of the dictionary task, as the first stage is to stocktake on what is already out there and as there are some considerations around how members work with the terms as well.

Outcome 2: DP-REG endorsed the workplans of all three Working Groups.

4. Update on internal narrative document

DP-REG members have collaborated at an officer level to develop an internal narrative document, which sets out members' respective regulatory remits and intersections with respect to digital platforms to address emerging concerns of a crowded regulatory landscape with significant regulatory overlap. The next step is to develop a public facing version of the document, and members have had officer level discussions around that being an infographic, potentially utilising eSafety's internal marketing design team to do so.

The ACCC noted their particular interest in this task and suggested the document would benefit from an agreed overarching statement of objective. They have a statement prepared, but need to finalise it before circulating.

eSafety made an administrative note that they are not an agency and so preferred that DP-REG members be referred to regulators rather than agencies in documents. In relation to the infographic, eSafety noted they would discuss with their internal design team. DP-REG

members expressed that it may be beneficial to develop a design brief to provide eSafety's design team and meet with the design team to discuss the infographic further.

The OAIC reiterated the importance of the public facing narrative, suggesting that once it was agreed upon, it may potentially be used to speak cohesively and with confidence as a group on behalf of each other in digital platform contexts. DP-REG members generally agreed with that sentiment.

Action item 2:

- ACCC to provide overarching statement to Secretariat.
- eSafety to contact their internal design team to reserve capacity to assist with the public narrative document.
- Secretariat to set up an officer-level meeting with DP-REG members and eSafety's design team to discuss the design brief.
- Secretariat to respond out of session with an update when ready.

5. Processes for stakeholder engagement

The OAIC have developed draft principles for stakeholder engagement (Attachment J), noting that the DP-REG has received several meeting requests from external entities. The process, allocation and sharing principles are intended only to be a starting point, and eSafety had already given written feedback about considering proactive engagement. The OAIC noted that a further principle to incorporate may be to consider the impact on equal opportunity for stakeholders to engage with DP-REG so that DP-REG are not overly engaged with one group.

eSafety commented that there are differences in the ways that externals are engaging DP-REG. For example, the request from the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts (DITRDCA) about the Social Media Inquiry is a very different engagement to Meta engaging DP-REG to showcase the Metaverse. As such, eSafety suggested DP-REG consider the context of the parties engaging DP-REG in these principles, perhaps from the perspective of whether the external is requesting action from DP-REG or simply requesting to present to DP-REG.

The ACCC agreed and commented that DP-REG should be clear when engaging with externals that DP-REG is not a decision-making body and are not resourced to be delivering outputs—DP-REG's work is complementary to the work that external entities are doing.

A DP-REG member also noted that DP-REG is a relatively new body without a lot of external documentation out currently, but as external documentation is developed, some external requests may be resolved by those documents, and the nature of engagements may change to clarifications of specific questions.

The ACCC further noted that DP-REG should have a qualifier at the start of the document that says this is a general process that is subject to the opportunities that might arise which the Secretariat will use to assess the engagement. In relation to recording the sessions, this will need to be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Action item 3: Secretariat to review the Principles for Engagement document (Attachment J) to capture DP-REG comments and re-circulate.

Action item 4: Secretariat to arrange an out-of-session meeting with Home Affairs and DITRDCA.

6. Agency updates

eSafety

eSafety updated on various topics:

- Social Media Inquiry—DP-REG members had been separately approached for input and a decision will need to be made on how DP-REG responds to the Inquiry as it was relevant to all DP-REG members. DITRDCA are leading the response and the Inquiry is considering potentially starting a Standing Committee.
- Disability Royal Commission— eSafety had been asked to give evidence both in writing and potentially at hearing, however, this was not likely to impact on other members of the DP-REG.
- TechTrends position paper around end-to-end encryption—currently being internally reviewed and is expected to be finalised by the end of the month.
- Online Safety Act Basic Online Safety Expectations (BOSE) notices sent to Apple, Meta (and WhatsApp), Microsoft (and Skype), Omegle and Snap—BOSE notices have been sent out concerning periodic reporting and harms-based reports around removal of child exploitation material. Digital platforms say they are taking actions around child exploitation material, and the BOSE notices ask if they are executing what they claim. The platforms have 28 days to respond. eSafety indicated they are also thinking about other periodic notices that can be issued in the future, having regard to what would be required under the Code and other reporting requirements expected in the industry.
- Industry codes—noted industry association codes are open for consultation until the end of the month. The first set deals with class 1 content and is very complex, both in the terms of the code and the broad range of stakeholders. eSafety further noted that there are real intersections between privacy and online safety. A decision on the Codes will not be made until later this year, and eSafety suggested that they discuss their response with the OAIC. The OAIC noted that they are currently considering the Codes and whether to make a submission and agreed to contact s47E(c) (CRWG Chair) in the first instance.
- eSafety noted that s47E(c) is moving on to another role.

ACMA

ACMA provided updates on various topics:

- DIGI and the Misinformation Code—DIGI had closed their consultation for review of the Misinformation Code.
- Social Media Inquiry—ACMA noted continuing discussions with the DITRDCA about the Social Media Inquiry and will update DP-REG as progress is made.
- Standing Committee on Electoral Matters—ACMA noted the Standing Committee on Electoral Matters is commencing their inquiry into the 2022 federal election and that

activities of digital platforms will be a focus. Submissions close first week of October. Further noted that the OAIC and ACMA are meeting with Tom Rogers (Australian Electoral Commissioner) in the future to discuss the election. OAIC noted that there were less privacy complaints in the 2022 federal election than in previous election.

- Voice to Parliament and Republic—ACMA also commented that there have been initial discussions about online misinformation in relation to an Indigenous voice to Parliament and becoming a republic. eSafety commented that hate speech in relation to a voice to Parliament has been mentioned in passing to them as well.
- News Media Bargaining Code—ACMA updated that the review continues and there is now some clarity that Andrew Leigh is the responsible Minister, potentially meaning that there would be an extension to the timeframe given the change of Ministers. ACCC provided that there were no updates on this matter from their end.

ACCC

ACCC provided an update on their Digital Platforms and Services Inquiry, being that their fifth interim report to the Minister was imminent. ACCC indicated they would provide a briefing to the DP-REG in confidence once they provided the report to the Minister.

OAIC

The OAIC updated on various topics:

- Facebook litigation—Facebook’s special leave application is currently being heard in the HCA.
- Clearview—OAIC updated that Clearview matters were currently in the AAT and that so far only dates had been received.
- s37 [REDACTED]
- International Enforcement Cooperation Working Group (IEWG)—OAIC noted that they were involved in discussions about issuing some form of joint letter from the IEWG.
- Facial recognition technology—OAIC have opened investigations against Bunnings and Kmart, s37 [REDACTED]

7. Other business (all)

Joint submissions

The OAIC introduced the topic noting that there is no current process for drafting and clearance of joint submissions, but that some DP-REG members have had officer level discussions about how this might be achieved going forward. OAIC commented that it was also open to leave the issue to the CRWG as they are also looking into it, however, the critical question for DP-REG is when and where DP-REG would do a joint submission, which may be a Steering Committee level decision.

The ACMA identified two scenarios where DP-REG may choose to do a joint submission, the first where DP-REG sees a consultation and decides to respond jointly, and the second where one of the DP-REG regulators are doing a submission and asks if the other DP-REG regulators would like to put their name to it.

The ACCC noted that their new clearance system required submissions to go through an internal process (within the ACCC first) before they can commit to anything.

DP-REG agreed the CRWG could consider how to manage joint submissions.

Action item 5: Codes & Regulation Working Group to consider processes and opportunities for joint submissions.

DP-REG branding and web presence

The ACCC commented that they would prefer to discuss this later as DP-REG does not currently have any materials to publicly release. As a lot of time and energy goes into building a website, DP-REG should wait until there are outputs before committing to a website. eSafety and ACMA agreed and s47C

Action item 6: DP-REG to revisit branding and web presence discussion in the future, once the DP-REG has materials to publish.

Reporting – Working Group reporting and public end-of-year reporting (see attachments K and L)

The Oaic provided that the purpose of these documents is to have some consistency for the Working Groups moving through the year to track their progress, and also to have a template for the end of year so we can capture all DP-REG's work. DP-REG members unanimously agreed to the templates, noting that they can be tweaked on an as needs basis.

Outcome 3: DP-REG endorsed the working group reporting template and public end-of-year reporting templates.

Outcome 4: DP-REG endorsed 25 November 2022 as the next Steering Committee meeting date.

Agenda items

1. Home Affairs and DITRDCA Briefings

Home Affairs' work in relation to online terrorism and violent extremism.

Home Affairs introduced their Countering Violent Extremism (CVE) Branch which has policy responsibility for the *Criminal Code Amendments (Violent Abhorrent Materials) Act 2019* (Cth) and shared responsibility for the *Online Safety Act 2021* and manage the Online Content Incident arrangement (Australia's domestic response protocol for online extremist content) with the eSafety Commissioner's office. The CVE Branch engages with stakeholders both bilaterally and through forums and working groups.

While national security is not in DP-REG's terms of reference, Home Affairs noted there may be commonalities in many of the challenges that the CVE branch is aiming to address in relation to algorithmic systems. Notably, the same algorithms that lead to consumer harms are also amplifying extremist material to at-risk individuals and accelerating online radicalisation. Some of the challenges CVE has come across include:

- a lack of regulation
- technical and policy differences between platforms creating inconsistencies in the way platforms respond to violent and extremist materials on their platforms, and
- the extra-territorial nature of platforms limiting the response that they can take with digital platforms.

CVE's priorities and interests include:

- Improving transparency— CVE noted that only 2 smaller online content services have submitted transparency reports (about their dealings with online terrorist and violent extremism content) to the OECD's Voluntary Transparency Reporting Framework (VTRF) web portal despite the industry generally supporting the VTRF portal. Relying on self-publishing from platforms is challenging and more needs to be done to convince and compel platforms to deal with extremism.
- BOSE powers— interested to see whether they can be used in relation to terrorist and violent extremist content.
- Meeting with Commonwealth stakeholders before the end of 2022 to discuss establishing an Online Terrorism Industry Engagement Forum in 2023. eSafety and ACMA will be invited to be members of that forum. CVE will engage with DP-REG to avoid duplication of efforts.

Home Affairs' work on algorithms and other relevant areas.

Home Affairs has been considering algorithms and their implications on harms, including in relation to terrorist content, misinformation and disinformation, and a range of foreign interference issues. This work cuts across several regulators and policy departments, including the AGD and other parts of Home Affairs, and includes:

- Social media applications review: The review will focus on foreign interference and apps' transparency around:
 - what kinds of data they are accessing
 - their data storage and security measures
 - s33 [REDACTED]

- s33 [REDACTED]
- s47E(d) [REDACTED] The report will be used to help inform a discussion on potential policy responses.
- Home Affairs has also been interested in how algorithms impact a range of security risks. Better transparency and research are an important part of the solution, and the government is interested in regulating algorithms. Home Affairs is currently undertaking a three-year study with UTS and UC Berkley into how different threat actors like foreign states or terrorist groups are taking advantage of social media algorithms to go viral on multiple platforms.

DITRDCA's work on algorithms in response to recommendation 13 of the House Select Committee Social Media and Online Safety Inquiry.

DITRDCA noted that the government is yet to formally respond to the Social Media and Online Safety Inquiry report. Recommendation 13 of the report was around algorithms and recommended that the eSafety Commissioner, DITRDCA and Home Affairs conduct a joint review of the use of algorithms in digital platforms, including how they operate, their use in harms, transparency, methods for technical regulation and a roadmap of skills.

DITRDCA's Platforms and News Branch has responsibility for matters relating to election integrity, misinformation, disinformation, platform and markets, among others. DITRDCA is supportive of Recommendation 13 in principle and will work together with Home Affairs to report to government around Q1 2024. They are currently in the scoping phase and considering the types of harms that can arise from algorithms. These include consumer harms, security harms, social harms, echo chambers, misinformation and disinformation, and also how algorithms affect dissemination of news services and discoverability of Australian content.

DITRDCA is interested to hear from DP-REG about their proposed work in the area and are interested in collaborating going forward.

DP-REG's Digital Technology Working Group's work on algorithms

The Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG) presented on their work relating to algorithms. The DTWG has run an interagency workshop with CSIRO's Data61 and are completing a literature review on algorithms, the scope of which is narrowed down to how algorithms contribute to harms which relate to DP-REG regulators' respective regulatory remits.

There are 3 areas of focus for the literature review—content moderation, recommender algorithms, and targeted advertising. DTWG is aiming to have an output around early next year to inform a joint understanding on these issues and where DP-REG may contribute in the future. DTWG is not intending to publish this more broadly. Home Affairs will contact the DTWG as the literature review progresses.

Other points:

- OAIC noted that the Privacy Act and certain Australian Privacy Principles (APPs) do apply to artificial intelligence and algorithms, and that the Privacy Act Review is considering additional protections specific to artificial intelligence technology. It is important to get the balance right between protecting rights and enabling innovation of technology.

- OAIC made submissions to the Privacy Act Review recommending amendments to the requirements of APP 5 notices and the introduction of a fair and reasonable standard for the collection, use and disclosure of personal information. ACCC commented that a major challenge is a lack of transparency around how algorithms operate and their effects, making it difficult to identify harms, take action, and understand their effect on consumer markets. ACCC noted some successful actions they have had in relation to algorithms in:
 - April 2022, Trivago was ordered to pay \$44.7m for making misleading representations about hotel room rates on its website and in television advertising, and
 - October 2020, iSelect was ordered to pay \$8.5m in penalties for making false or misleading representations about its electricity comparison service.
- ACCC also noted that they had made recommendations in their fifth interim report around consumer protection reforms, for example, a general unfair trading practices prohibition.
- ACMA had previously recommended the ACMA be provided with formal powers in relation to misinformation and disinformation.
- ACMA noted that they commissioned research in the context of their misinformation and disinformation report that may be relevant to Home Affairs' areas of focus. The ACMA also noted Home Affairs may be interested in research done by the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) on algorithms and the discoverability of Australian content. UK's Ofcom also announced that they will be researching algorithms, specifically around misinformation and disinformation, and how consumers consume news. Home Affairs will contact ACMA directly about this research.
- eSafety noted that they have regulatory tools to help identify if algorithms are causing or addressing online harms and safety. The first set of BOSE notices have gone out seeking information about what the recipient is doing to address child sex abuse material. Under industry codes, there are commitments from providers that they will use algorithms to reduce the risk of harmful material, for example, Google censors harmful search results. eSafety noted that they have a paper on recommender systems coming out in December which identifies key recommender systems and their harms. The paper covers topics such as the three pillars of protection and systemic change, advice for users and industry, safety by design and practical measures for recommender algorithms.

OAIC thanked all for participating and noted that there are real opportunities to collaborate on areas of intersection and leverage the work each agency and regulator is doing. As a general principle, the Steering Committee agreed that regulators should consider sharing research more broadly where possible on a case-by-case basis.

Outcome 1: Regulators to consider future opportunities to collaborate and share research where possible.

2. Action items from 16 September 2022 meeting

Previous meeting minutes

Status: The DP-REG Steering Committee meeting minutes of 16 September 2022 were endorsed by group.

Action item 1: DP-REG to consider how to coordinate with the Digital Technology Taskforce

Status: This is an ongoing area for consideration alongside how we coordinate with other areas of government. To be carried over to next meeting.

Action Item 1: Any DP-REG member that makes contact with the taskforce to report back at the next Steering Committee meeting.

Action item 2: Progress the DP-REG internal narrative document and public narrative document.

Status: DP-REG members have worked with eSafety designers to prepare an infographic for public use. To be discussed further in agenda item 5.

Action item 3: Secretariat to review the Principles for Engagement document to capture DP-REG comments and re-circulate.

Status: The Secretariat reviewed this document and have circulated it for comment by email on 15 November 2022. Document to be recirculated and DP-REG members to provide feedback by 29 November 2022.

Action Item 2: Secretariat to recirculate the Principles for Engagement document for comment by 29 November 2022.

Action item 4: Secretariat to arrange an out-of-session meeting with Home Affairs and DITRDCA.

Status: Completed – the briefing from Home Affairs and DITRDCA occurred at the meeting today.

Action item 5: DP-REG members to coordinate in relation to Senate Economics References Committee inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms and drafting a DP-REG covering letter.

Status: DP-REG members met at an officer level on 9 November and agreed a timeline for progression. The covering letter and submissions will be progressed for clearance through each individual regulator in December. This will be discussed in agenda item 7.

Action item 6: Codes & Regulation Working Group to consider processes and opportunities for joint submissions.

Status: Completed – This will be progressed as set out in the Codes & Regulation work plan.

3. Update on Working Group work plans

Data & Research Working Group (DRWG)

The DRWG has completed a scoping workshop in relation to the potential terms and conditions audit and are drafting a paper for consideration by the Steering Committee for the February meeting. The focus will likely be on readability and accessibility. The audit is likely to be resource intensive and DRWG will be seeking further guidance from the Steering Committee on this issue. DRWG is also progressing a digital platforms data dictionary of key terms for use in internal and external documents for the regulators. DRWG flagged complaints research being led by the ACMA that will be published in the coming weeks.

Codes & Regulation Working Group (CRWG)

The CRWG is currently progressing several deliverables as set out in its 2022-23 workplan. The CRWG have been arranging presentations on each regulators' experience with code development or other regulation relevant to digital platforms. To date, the ACMA has presented on the Misinformation Code and eSafety has presented on the BOSE. CRWG has also held a series of workshops on priority areas of regulatory intersection and are now drafting a framework for joint DP-REG submissions and statements with a view to circulating to the Steering Committee around the first meeting of 2023. CRWG are also progressing a stocktake of regulatory reforms and code proposals to be completed by the end of January 2023.

Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG)

Data61 presented to the DTWG, which was useful both in substance and in terms of promoting engagement with Data61 and each regulator. DTWG is horizon scanning on individual technologies noting a challenge has been scoping the work.

4. DP-REG Infographic

eSafety has shared a 1-pager developed by eSafety's design team which gives an overview of DP-REG, regulators' remits and areas of focus. It is intended to be used at relevant meetings and for media and marketing purposes. eSafety is considering developing a longer form graphic that is 2 or 3 pages that shows areas where regulators remits overlap. eSafety welcomed any comments on the infographic.

DP-REG members to provide any additional feedback in the next week.

Action item 3: DP-REG members to provide any additional feedback on infographic by 2 December 2022.

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6. DP-REG joint covering letter

OAIC noted there have been discussions about a coordinated response to the Senate Economics References Committee inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms. A DP-REG covering letter is being progressed and regulators are sharing progress on their submissions. The suggested structure for the covering letter is to set out information about the structure and current areas of focus for DP-REG to ensure that there is consistent messaging around DP-REG's role. OAIC welcomed feedback on the proposed approach and any themes that should be drawn out in the letter.

Outcome 3: Steering Committee supported the joint covering letter approach to responding to the Senate Economics References Committee inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms.

7. DP-REG Regulator Head Meeting Agenda

The next Regulator Head meeting is scheduled for 4-5pm on 13 December 2022. OAIC sought feedback on the draft agenda.

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8. Regulator updates

OAIC

The *Privacy Legislation Amendment (Enforcement and Other Measures) Bill 2022* was still before Parliament. The Committee report on the Bill recommended it be passed, but there were two recommendations around extraterritoriality and penalties that have been deferred to consideration as part of the Privacy Act Review.

eSafety

eSafety's tech trends position statement on recommender systems will go out end of December.

The timeframe for providing the age verification roadmap to Government has been extended to March 2023. eSafety will provide relevant sections as working drafts to DP-REG members.

Consultation on industry codes has now closed and submissions are being reviewed. A decision will be made early next year.

ACCC

ACCC is waiting for the government to issue the consultation paper in relation to ACCC DPSI report 5. ACCC has started drafting DPSI report 6 and may share certain portions as they are drafted with other DP-REG members.

ACCC and OAIC presented at the IAPP conference and there had been significant interest in DP-REG.

9. Other Business

DP-REG agreed that the next Steering Committee meeting will be held on 3 February 2023.

Item 2: Secretariat to recirculate the Principles for Engagement document for comment by 29 November 2022.

- DP-REG members endorsed the Principles for Engagement document.

Outcome 2: DP-REG members endorsed the Principles for Engagement document.

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Update on work in progress

Item 1: Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG) literature review on algorithms

- The DTWG's literature review on algorithms is progressing well. The initial review of the resources was completed over the summer, and a first draft of the final paper has been collated. The Working Group will use its February and March meetings to discuss the final paper ahead of producing it to next Steering Committee meeting on 24 March 2023 for approval.
- eSafety asked whether the next topic after the literature review had been discussed yet. The DTWG answered that they are not seeking any recommendations from the Steering Committee at this point as they intend to identify any gaps in the current review and pursue them after the final paper is produced.

Item 2: Joint letter for the Senate Economics References Committee inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms

- An Issues Paper for the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms has been released with 28 February 2023 set as the close of submissions. A draft letter response from DP-REG has been circulated for feedback.
- The main objective of the letter is to provide background to DP-REG and how the forum can provide a cohesive and streamlined approach to regulating digital platforms. This part of the letter is deliberately general, but each regulator's submission will address specific issues related to their remit.
- We've also written our timeline for progressing the submission to allow a wider window for feedback from the Steering Committee before submission. The timeline is intended to be fluid such that if we're able to complete a particular stage early, we can progress to the

next stage early as well. We will also need to coordinate clearance of the letter and signatures of the Regulator Heads to submit it by 28 February. We are today seeking endorsement of the approach to the letter and the proposed timeline.

- eSafety flagged that they will be sending through some comments in writing, mostly to suggest that the letter is not limited to consumer harms. They further noted that the eSafety Commissioner may be away and that they will arrange an alternative way to get clearance. The ACCC said that the approach and timing was amenable to them.
- The DP-REG endorsed the proposed approach and timeline to the DP-REG letter to the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms.

Outcome 4: DP-REG members endorsed the proposed approach and timeline to the DP-REG letter to the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms.

Action Item 3: OAIC to progress DP-REG letter to the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms in line with agreed timetable.

Item 3: Framework for making joint submissions and statements

- At the December Regulator Heads meeting, the Codes and Regulation Working Group (CRWG) presented on the objectives of developing a framework for approving joint submissions and sought in principle agreement that the Regulator Heads agree to delegate decisions to approve proposals for future joint submissions to the Steering Committee.
- The Regulator Heads generally agreed that consideration of joint submissions and statements should be pursued where warranted, noting an administrative framework would be developed to support that process. The Regulator Heads also agreed that approval for preparing joint submissions should sit with the Steering Committee, particularly where matters were time-critical noting the final product would still go through each individual regulators' internal clearance process.
- The CRWG is today seeking feedback on the proposed process for joint submissions and statements. The process considers both joint submissions and statements. In terms of scope for submissions, it would be formal joint submissions to inquiries and consultations. These will likely require short turnarounds. For statements, the scope includes public comments and information that might raise awareness of DP-REG's work in the subject. These are not likely to require short turnarounds and does not include communiques.
- As the work of joint submissions and statements will be largely done out of session, the process needs to be able to consider as much as possible upfront so that we can avoid wildly diverging views at the Steering Committee or Regulator Heads level.
- It starts with an EOI template that regulators take away and discuss internally, and then submit to the CRWG to take it to the proposal stage. The regulator who submitted the EOI would make a case for it to the WG, and if the WG agrees to progress with the submission or statement, they would then identify a lead regulator to draft and progress the submission or statement through the CRWG and then the Steering Committee. The end result is the regulator heads would clear the final submission/statements.
- The OAIC commented that the proposal is a sensible approach but would likely be subject to change during the operationalisation of it.

- eSafety commented that they were interested in the work Ofcom completed with the ICO in the UK and thought it was a good example of how the joint letters could work. eSafety further commented that in practice, if something did come up, they would socialise it internally and then bring it to the other regulators rather than go through each step like the EOI and going up the chain of approvals. eSafety hoped that there is flexibility to have bilateral chats at the higher SES level without needing to follow the chain of approval.
- The ACMA agreed with eSafety. The ACMA's CRWG members would only raise it to the CRWG if there was already work on the topic internally at the ACMA, so flexibility should be accounted for. The ACMA's experience with working on joint statements has been that it's difficult to manage several opinions at once, and regulators need flexibility to simply say yes if there are proposals more appropriate for one regulator rather than themselves, but that would benefit from DP-REG as a forum's endorsement. Regulators preparing joint statements separate to DP-REG should be acceptable as well, e.g. two regulators releasing a joint statement separate to DP-REG.
- The OAIC and eSafety added that joint statements are a good opportunity to frame any areas of regulatory tensions between our remits and show unity to the market.
- The CRWG to amend the process proposal to reflect that the steps are flexible and will be subject to review following a few submissions or statements.

Action item 4: The CRWG to amend the process proposal to reflect that the steps for joint submissions and statements are flexible and will be subject to review following a few submissions or statements.

Stakeholder mapping exercise

- The communications and engagement strategy paper included the current approach to stakeholder engagement. The Regulator Heads suggested that a stakeholder mapping exercise for DP-REG be conducted to help guide how we engage with external parties.
- The OAIC has developed a first draft of the map after consulting the Working Group chairs for an initial list of stakeholders. Also included in the map is the stakeholder engagement matrix provided by the ACMA which considers the impact of the stakeholder on the industry and gives them a rating for how DP-REG may prioritise working with that stakeholder. The intent is to hold an officer-level workshop to complete the stakeholder list and assess the matrix rating for them.
- DP-REG members agreed that the matrix would benefit from different language in place of 'keep satisfied' and 'manage closely', and potentially a different rating system, for example, colour coding. Further, the ACCC suggested that rather than using the term 'foreign government', that be changed to 'overseas regulator'.
- OAIC noted that a challenge in determining the list of stakeholders was figuring out what the criteria should be for a DP-REG stakeholder rather than just an individual regulator's stakeholder. When workshoping with the Working Group Chairs, it was suggested that the organisation should operate a digital platform and intersect with at least one of the DP-REG's regulators. The list of stakeholders will be revisited when reforming the matrix.

Action item 5: The OAIC to revise the stakeholder map and reconsider the rating matrix and other terms used in the map.

International Institute of Communications Australian Chapter Event – 15 March 2023

- The International Institute of Communications (IIC) has invited the DP-REG regulator heads to take part in its Australian Chapter Event on 15 March 2023. Each regulator head has agreed to take part in a panel event.
- The OAIC has been liaising with the IIC who has advised that the panel event will be 1.5hrs and hosted at the Allens office in Sydney, with a partner from Allens moderating. It is scheduled from 12:30-2pm on 15 March 2023 which is broken into 50 minutes of the panel speaking, 10 minutes of Q&A, and 30 minutes for lunch. The IIC is promoting the event to its members in Australia and the UK. They have provided the OAIC with a list of questions to assist preparations for the panel event. The OAIC has circulated these questions to the Working Group chairs and will circulate them to the broader DP-REG in due course.
- The OAIC opened the floor to discuss how best to prepare the regulator heads for the panel event, the main issue being how much granularity should go into the brief being built around the questions that the IIC has provided. DP-REG members unanimously agreed that each regulator should only give a few dot points in response to each question—enough to give a sense of what they intend to say in answer to each question, but not a detailed script.
- The ACCC asked whether a topic had been confirmed for the panel event. The OAIC responded that the panel event is intended to be centred around DP-REG and its functions. The OAIC further noted that this would be the first time that the four regulator heads will be together to talk about the DP-REG.
- The OAIC further advised that ordinarily these events will be run under Chatham House Rules, however, the media may be in attendance and the IIC is interested in whether the regulator heads are comfortable with media attending and whether Chatham House Rules should be in place. DP-REG members all agreed that this is a good opportunity for media teams to attend, photograph, and make announcements, but there was no need to make any formal statements to journalists or over-promise during the panel event.
- DP-REG members agreed that the next steps will be for the OAIC to continue to work with the Working Group chairs on the panel event questions, then organise a workshop on high level briefing pack which regulators' internal media teams may attend. Once the briefing pack for the questions are prepared and circulated, DP-REG can revisit the questions around media and Chatham House Rules.

Action item 6: The OAIC to continue working on the briefing pack for regulator heads with the Working Group chairs, noting that each regulator need only contribute dot point summaries of how they intend to answer each question. Once a briefing pack has been prepared, the OAIC will organise a workshop on the briefing pack to which the regulators' internal media teams will be invited.

Regulator updates

OAIC

- The OAIC is again conducting its flagship community survey, the Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey (ACAPS), this year. The ACAPS measures Australians' perceptions and experiences of privacy, as well as actions taken to protect their privacy. The survey is designed to cover several topics, including trust in organisations' handling of personal information, AI and algorithms, digital services, data collection and usage, and biometrics. The OAIC's media team will consult with relevant DP-REG working groups to review the questions before the survey goes public. They are aiming to have preliminary results ready by the first week of May so that they can report on it during the OAIC's Privacy Awareness Week.
- The *Privacy Legislation Amendment (Enforcement and Other Measures) Act 2022* came into force on 13 December 2022, and the OAIC has adopted a staged approach to implementing its amendments. The initial focus has been on publishing new and updated external guidance, including to the OAIC's Guide to Privacy Regulatory Action. The OAIC's Legal section is also working in conjunction with business units to update internal policies and procedures to provide guidance for staff on the purpose of the new powers and the procedural steps the OAIC will take in the exercise of the powers.
 - The amendments included an amendment to the information sharing provisions that enable the OAIC to share information with receiving bodies in both the OAIC's and receiving bodies' interests. All DP-REG members are receiving bodies. There is some administration work needed to establish ongoing sharing which may be able to be operationalised through MOUs.
- In terms of the OAIC's ongoing High Court proceedings against Facebook Inc, all parties have now provided their submissions and a Hearing is scheduled for the 7 March 2023.
- The OAIC understands that the Privacy Act Review final report has gone to the AG. It is now a matter for the AG, and the OAIC is prepared for any outcome.

eSafety

- Safer Internet Day is 7 February 2023 and is the biggest day for eSafety. There is lots of media interest in the event which covers online safety, scams and other issues. eSafety asked that other DP-REG members advertise the event through their media teams.
- Industry Codes are being progressed and a public update will be provided shortly.
- A summary of the responses to the first tranche of BOSE notices around transparency was published in late December. eSafety is looking to publish further notices.
- The eSafety Commissioner took part in an online dating round table last week at the invitation of Ministers. The proposal is that the Minister will ask what the companies are doing to keep people safe on their platform, and then potentially establish a voluntary code. However, eSafety's code making power is around online content so does not extend to many conduct issues relevant in online dating.
- eSafety has now published their position statement on algorithms and recommender systems which has been well received and shared amongst external stakeholders.

ACMA

- The main news is around misinformation and disinformation—just before Christmas, DIGI finalised their code review and published a revised code. Changes included a revised definition of harm, a new outcome on the transparency of recommender systems and minor changes to transparency and reporting arrangements. The ACMA noted that signatories with less than a million users would be subject to lesser reporting obligations. This may encourage smaller platforms to sign up to the code.
- The Government announced that the ACMA will be receiving powers to compel information, register and enforce codes and make standards. The Department is working with the OPC to draft that legislation. It is likely that an exposure draft will be released in April/May with a view of progressing to Parliament in the middle of the year. The ACMA may engage eSafety and the OAIC to discuss their experience with code making.
- The Government released their National Cultural Policy which includes commitments to content requirements on streaming services and discoverability of Australian content to viewers.
- The ACMA also advised that they had had a discussion with Meta about the Voice referendum which is active right now. Meta indicated that they will be putting the same mechanisms in relation to political advertising in place as they had for the 2022 federal election. Meta also advised that they have an indigenous advisory body in place who has encouraged ensuring that the many different views on the Voice referendum can be shared online, with the obvious issues being hate speech and racism. There are also issues around the practicalities of how the online space will be monitored. The EIATaskforce will be set up again, but Meta will need to coordinate information sharing with the AFP and Government at the same time.

ACCC

- In December 2022, the ACCC lost the Google double-click case. They are currently considering whether they want to appeal.
- The consultation period for the Government's DPSI 5 Inquiry closes on 15 February 2023. Roundtables will be held which the ACCC intends to attend.
- DPSI 6 on social media is under way. The ACCC is drafting the report now and will be in contact with DP-REG members in relation to any content that might overlap with others regulators' remits.
- The News Media Bargaining Code review is also underway and the ACCC and ACMA have proposed certain changes that are tied to the DPSI 5 recommendations.
- RMIT has set up a presentation on search engines coming up that the DP-REG is invited to. DP-REG members are interested in whether it will consider the impact of artificial intelligence on search engines.

Other Business

- The next DP-REG Steering Committee meeting will be on 24 March 2023.

Outcome 2: DP-REG closed the item in relation to the DP-REG's letter to the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms. OAIC will keep DP-REG informed of any engagement received on the joint letter.

- The OAIC has actioned the Steering Committee's feedback from the last meeting on the template and prepared the draft at **Attachment C**.
- eSafety will send the OAIC their comments.
- DP-REG agreed that the stakeholder map is final, subject to eSafety's comments.
- The next steps for the stakeholder map are as follows:
 - The Secretariat will circulate the document to each member and will ask them to complete their own stakeholder analysis column and return it to the Secretariat.
 - The Secretariat will then collate the results and arrange a workshop to compare them, discuss areas of difference and reach a consensus rating for all stakeholders.
 - The completed stakeholder analysis will then be re-submitted to the Steering Committee for final clearance.

Action item 2: eSafety to send comments on stakeholder map to the OAIC and OAIC to incorporate comments.

Action item 3: The OAIC will circulate the Stakeholder Map to DP-REG members so that members may complete their respective analysis column.

Outcome 4: The Stakeholder Map was accepted as final, subject to eSafety's comments.

Item 6: The OAIC to continue working on the IIC event briefing pack for regulator heads with the Working Group chairs, noting that each regulator need only contribute dot point summaries of how they intend to answer each question. Once a briefing pack has been prepared, the OAIC will organise a workshop on the briefing pack to which the regulators' internal media teams will be invited.

- DP-REG members collaborated on briefing materials and the IIC panel event took place on 15 March 2023.

- Nerida O’Loughlin (ACMA), Gina Cass-Gottlieb (ACCC), Toby Dagg (eSafety) and Angelene Falk (OAIC) discussed the rationale for establishing DP-REG, our current strategic priorities and work, as well as the benefits of the forum for collaboration, information sharing and capacity building. IIC invited journalists from the Sydney Morning Herald and the AFR, however those media outlets did not attend. OAIC has not seen reporting from any of the major media outlets on the event. OAIC has followed up on the recording of the event and will circulate the recording once it is made available, but there may be some minutes missing due to technical issues on the day.
- ACMA commented that the panel event went well. The Panellists were well prepared and confident. ACMA received positive feedback from attendees, who also commented that they found the event a good networking opportunity. ACMA noted that a few questions were raised about joint compliance actions.
- eSafety noted a few questions about the burden of additional regulations creating barriers to entry to competition and expansion, and the effect of codes and regulations on market power. DIGI, for example, has built those considerations into their Disinformation and Misinformation Code on report, i.e. the power to distinguish between sizes when reporting. The EU has different regulations for different sizes of entities. eSafety is trying to accommodate something similar in their codes.
- OAIC see the DP-REG as a good response to queries about overregulation—DP-REG is a good coordination forum that is working well to respond to issues.

Action item 4: The OAIC will circulate the recording of the IIC Panel Event when it becomes available.

Item 3: Update on work in progress

Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG)

- DTWG has been approached by the dedicated AI team of the Department of Industry.
- s47C [REDACTED]
- DTWG has also decided Generative AI is likely to be its next topic for consideration. It will prepare an examination of technology paper.
- eSafety has been working with Professor Amin Beheshti from Macquarie University on generative AI and will provide the DTWG with his contact details.

Action item 5: eSafety to provide the DTWG with Professor Amin Beheshti’s contact details.

Codes and Regulation Working Group (CRWG)

- The first two workstream items are on a register of regulatory reforms and code proposals and a register of formal action taken by DP-REG members. An issue that has arisen is how regulators define “digital platforms”. There is about a 95% overlap, but there is a gap, for

example, in the DPSI and the Online Safety Act. The CRWG is testing templates for both of those, and once the reporting periods are finalised, will circulate those more widely.

- The OAIC noted that the definitions misaligning may affect certain entities not being captured in regulations across schemes. This would need to be addressed.
- The CRWG and eSafety did not have an immediate answer but noted that they are looking at it from the perspective of each regulator’s purpose, e.g. eSafety’s purpose is around harmful content, ACCC’s purpose is around competition and consumer issues.
- OAIC is interested in misalignments potentially posing risks to society. Given there are arguments around regulatory overlap and coordination, it is important to call out differences in scope to address arguments around over and under-regulation.
- ACMA and eSafety commented that their definitions are probably closer as they are dealing with content causing an issue over time and as they are also in the same portfolio department. The ACMA also added that while there are some issues with exact alignment, they are being considered. The Data and Research Working Group (DRWG) is also going through their digital platform dictionary currently which may be useful for this issue.
- The third workstream is around a key learnings document and principles to be established for codes development which has been difficult to cover in 2 pages, but the CRWG are progressing.
- The fourth workstream is a joint paper on intersections which has broad parameters. CRWG is attempting to scope it to be more useful for DP-REG.

Data and Research Working Group

- The main focus of the DRWG is the digital platforms dictionary which is hoped to be finalised in the next quarter.
- There is also good progress being made in relation to research. The research hub is being set up, which will be a single repository of information and research for DP-REG members.
- The ACMA’s complaints survey is progressing well and the research outcomes will be reported on in the next quarter.
- DRWG is still scoping a potential platforms terms and conditions audit. There are two main issues, the first being what is the desired outcome of the audit given it is not a compliance exercise, and the second being it is potentially extremely resource intensive both at the staffing and financial levels.
 - The ACMA added that the original idea was to look at readability and accessibility of terms and conditions. It would look at a certain number of them, but the outcome and what to do with it would be unclear.
 - The OAIC commented that, from their perspective, the audit would go towards the question of meaningful consent and adequacy of notification. There are a lot of theoretical discussions taking place around this which are hard to ground it in real life, and a tangible outcome from a review would be useful in privacy reform discussions.
 - eSafety asked whether the audit would be run through metrics, e.g. these terms and condition would require a university level education to read, or takes about 10 hours to read? The DRWG said that this would depend on the scope and details of the project, and resourcing.

- ACCC added that they had previous experience with readability in the DPI. There is a scoping question around readability and comprehension, separate to the substance of the terms and conditions (which would look at the permissions and relationships being established). The former is less resource intensive, but the second would be more difficult given it is a legal assessment which may require external engagement.
- eSafety agreed with the ACCC and suggested that ACCAN may have done something on this in the past.
- The ACMA added that if you only do a few sites, it's almost meaningless unless you do something further, for example, inform future policy decisions or positions in respect of those platforms. It would otherwise need to be broader to achieve a good outcome, but that may be too resource intensive.
- The ACCC suggested that a more resource effective approach may be to approach ACCAN or a university academic and ask for their assistance in the project. OAIC supported this suggestion and added that communications staff may have experience with tools for readability assessments and it may therefore be useful to discuss the audit with communications teams.
- DRWG is also working on a guidance paper on barriers to information sharing. The idea is that it will explore current barriers to information sharing and recommend a pilot project for the next program about how to overcome those barriers.

Outcome 4: Data and Research Working Group to scope the terms and conditions audit and consider how to utilise third parties as part of that review.

General work items

- The Triannual Reporting Document also includes progress on items sitting outside the working groups including, for example, the internal mapping document, the infographic, stakeholder engagement at all levels, the joint letter, engagement strategies and funding. DP-REG agreed that progress across the board was tracking well.

Item 4: Digital Technology Working Group Literature Review (ACCC)

- The Digital Technology Working Group conducted a literature review in relation to the harms of content moderation algorithms, recommender algorithms and targeted advertising algorithms.
- They have provided three attachments:
 - A brief cover paper (**Attachment E**)
 - The literature review draft paper itself (**Attachment F**), and
 - The research database (**Attachment G**).
- The DTWG includes a workstream on algorithms and the literature review is a key work product to meet the workstream. The review focussed on 3 functions of algorithms—content moderation, recommender systems and targeted advertising. DTWG has favoured covering harms in the draft, and it was challenging to minimise repetition in the

paper, particularly where the same harm was coming up for each function. The themes of the paper are based on the objectives of the DP-REG infographic.

- While the primary audience is DP-REG, the DTWG envisions that it may be helpful to share this paper with secondary audiences like DITRDC, Home Affairs, and potentially international bodies like the UK DRCF.
- The ACMA commended the paper and the work of the DTWG. The division between individual and societal harm is particularly useful. The ACMA wonders whether the paper can be distributed publicly, as an output of the DP-REG. This could be done after a round of contribution or comment ahead of publication from academics or other forms of government, as has been done before by other regulators in other contexts. ACMA asked whether DTWG had thought about gaps that could be highlighted? It has been done in some part where the paper comments on the lack of non-English speaking research, but were there others?
- eSafety agreed that it's a great paper and also thought about publicly releasing it. There are lots of examples in the Australian context where algorithms may have an impact that involves eSafety. eSafety also noted it is important to be careful with language around freedom of expression and that it might be appropriate to frame this as a US expression rather than a Western concept. eSafety will send some comments about all of these to the DTWG.
- DTWG welcomed feedback on the free speech approach which they found challenging because the platforms are largely US-based, but there needed to be some alignment with Australian and other ideologies on free expression too.
- DTWG had not planned to publish the paper more broadly as yet but can see that it would probably require further work and legal review to get it publication ready. The opportunity to seek feedback from academics to help inform gaps is also a good suggestion.
- OAIC commented that they want to consider the amount and cost of work involved to get the paper publication ready before committing to that path, but the OAIC is generally supportive. eSafety noted they have an editorial team that may be able to assist in reviewing the paper, but inviting feedback on the paper is a good option although it would also give rise to a question about why we are seeking feedback and how public we are releasing it. DTWG should also consider the risks of publishing the literature review.
- DTWG said they would reflect on these considerations and return at the next Steering Committee meeting with a decision on publication.

Action Item 6: eSafety to provide comments on the literature review to the Digital Technology Working Group.

Action Item 7: The Digital Technology Working Group to consider the work and resourcing necessary to prepare the literature review paper for public release, and report on this at the next Steering Committee meeting.

Item 5: Update re international community of regulatory cooperation bodies (OAIC)

- The UK DRCF presented a proposal for the development of an international community of regulatory cooperation bodies and regulators to DP-REG Steering Committee on 8 March 2023.
- The DRCF proposed that the community meet 2 or 3 times a year to share knowledge and experiences of regulatory cooperation and coherence both domestically and internationally.
- Attendance would be at the officer level.
- Topics that the meetings may cover include:
 - different models of cooperation,
 - digital transparency and other regulatory key priorities,
 - undertaking collective horizon scanning,
 - putting together joint statements,
 - how regulatory cooperation groups do similar tasks.
- The DRCF originally proposed an initial 1.5-2hr meeting in the week commencing 27 March but are now exploring a later date. The OAIC is awaiting further information.
- eSafety's main concern is how the proposed community would work next to other international groups, but otherwise supported being involved in the community. The ACMA was also supportive, subject to the amount of resources required to be involved in the group. The ACCC and OAIC echoed both of these sentiments.

Outcome 5: DP-REG to progress involvement in the UK DRCF's proposed community. The Secretariat will continue to engage with the UK DRCF to manage DP-REG's involvement.

Item 6: Process for handover of Secretariat and Working Group Chair functions (OAIC)

- With the end of financial year approaching, there will be changes to responsibility for the DP-REG Secretariat and Steering Committee Chair function and the Working Group Chair roles on 1 July 2023.
- DP-REG considered whether the terms of reference of any of the working groups should be changed significantly and whether there were any preferences as to who will Chair each working group, the Steering Committee and the Secretariat.
- The Secretariat stated they will begin engaging with the next Secretariat to:
 - Provide templates and guidance on processes prior to handover
 - Discuss handover of projects taking place at Secretariat level, such as in relation to funding and the stakeholder engagement strategy, that are likely to span across Secretariat terms.

- eSafety suggested that working group chairs could be extended by an additional 6 months to complete the current projects. The ACMA agreed. The ACCC asked if that suggestion also meant that the Secretariat would also be extended by 6 months. The OAIC noted that they are expecting an influx of work from the Privacy Act Review which may be challenging to manage with the resourcing needs of the Secretariat.
- DP-REG agreed that discussions about extending the appointment of the Working Group Chairs and Secretariat would continue offline to allow Chairs and the Secretariat to assess workload impact.

Action item 8: The Secretariat to engage offline with the Working Group Chairs to consider the resourcing impact of extending their appointments.

Item 7: Regulator updates

OAIC

- OAIC thanked the Digital Technology and Data and Research Working Groups for providing their feedback on the OAIC's draft questions for their 2023 Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey (ACAPS) noting the tight timeframe. OAIC will keep the DP-REG updated with the progress of the ACAPS.
- OAIC's High Court proceedings against Facebook was heard by the High Court on 7 March 2023, in which the High Court revoked Facebook Inc's special leave to appeal. The OAIC's civil penalties proceedings against Facebook Ireland and Facebook Inc over the Cambridge Analytica in the Federal Court may now progress. The High Court revoked Facebook's grant of special leave following a change to the Federal Court Rules 2011 that came into effect in January this year which allowed the OAIC to successfully argue that the matter no longer raised an issue of public importance. This is an important step in ensuring that global digital platforms can be held to account when handling the personal information of Australians.
- The AGD released their final report in the Privacy Act Review on 16 February. The comprehensive report contains 116 proposals, including a proposal to introduce a positive obligation that personal information handling is fair and reasonable which the OAIC, as the privacy regulator, sees as a new keystone of the Australian privacy framework. The report also contains proposals that would enhance the regulatory powers of the OAIC to enforce privacy obligations and to identify systemic privacy issues and address privacy breaches, as well as other important proposals, such as enabling individuals to exercise new privacy rights and take direct action in the courts if their privacy is breached, and the removal of some exemptions from the Privacy Act. These proposals reflect the baseline privacy rights expected by our community. The Government is now consulting on the Final Report which closes at the end of the month on 31 March and that will be followed by a Government response.
 - AGD has done a survey with the intent to explore the practical impacts of the proposals and gain insight into what things mean for businesses. There may be some shifts in the targeting chapter, and there are a lot of different and divergent views on practicality of the proposals, e.g. on pop-ups and website designs. OAIC will be engaging the Department throughout the course of the PAR report and is happy to spend more time discussing the report with the other regulators too.

eSafety

- eSafety made a standalone submission to the Big Tech Inquiry in relation to algorithms and children's safety.
- eSafety will also be making a submission to the Privacy Act Review in relation to the proposal about eSafety being consulted on a children's online code. eSafety's teams may reach out to the OAIC to discuss further.
- The second round of BOSE notices were issued in February to Google, Twitter, Twitch, TikTok and Discord, again focussing on child exploitation material. eSafety will be publishing a summary as to what they will be doing in this area.
- eSafety is revisiting its policy position on end-to-end encryption, with a focus on the services have protections in place to counter child exploitation and other harmful material.
- In relation to industry codes, eSafety provided its statement of preliminary views on each code to parties in February. The consultation in February was published and the response on revised code is due 31 March.
- eSafety said that the age verification roadmap update would be provided separately.

ACMA

- The ACMA is also considering making a short submission to the Privacy Act Review on consent issues in the unsolicited communications area.
- On misinformation and disinformation, the ACMA is working with their portfolio department on the development of draft legislation on code and standard making and compulsory information gathering powers. They expect public consultation towards the end of April and early May.
 - o The ACMA is also working on a piece of advice to government on the voluntary code and how it's operating, timing in late April/early May.
 - o ACMA is also approaching the non-signatories—e.g. Snap, Reddit, and Yahoo—to encourage them to sign up now that they have the lighter reporting obligations, but most are waiting to see what powers the ACMA will be given in their draft powers.
- ACMA is consulting on the news measurement framework which is looking at measuring media diversity and localism. They have held roundtables with industry in which they discussed how social media should be accounted for in news metrics and production. Written submission are expected in the next few weeks.
- ACMA has had ongoing conversations with Twitter in relation to their compliance with the code. eSafety noted they are having similar engagements with Twitter in relation to their draft codes. eSafety's codes have annual reporting requirements, though this time frame may need to be updated.

ACCC

- The ACCC's 7th Interim DPSI issues paper has been released and submissions are due on 5 April. The Final Report is due on 30 September and is likely to be released 28 days after. The ACCC is interested in comments on areas overlap with DP-REG agencies and can organise meetings if necessary. The Interim Report focusses on Google, Apple, Meta, Microsoft, and Amazon.
 - eSafety notes that consumer cloud products have been a topical issue under their code, with providers required to take steps to ensure that they are assessing for child sexual abuse material. eSafety asked if the ACCC is looking at policies and how people are being informed around that. ACCC said possibly but they would need to revert to

confirm. They are mostly considering lock-ins and similar relationship impacts, but also platforms' access to rich sources of consumer data through their ecosystems.

- DPSI Report 6 is due to the Treasurer by end of March and is likely to be published 28 days later.
- s47C [REDACTED]
- The ACCC is also planning their own submission to the Privacy Act Review. The ACCC is largely supportive of the recommendations and their submission will focus on the practical implications of the proposals and the overlaps of CDR and individual data rights.
- ACCC noted that the Productivity Commission's 5-year Productivity Inquiry Report was released on Friday, 17 March. The DP-REG was mentioned in the Report, and the Productivity Commission had similar comments to the ANU Tech Policy Design Centre that while the DP-REG is a positive development, we need to do more to engage policy makers as well.

Item 8: Other business

- The next Steering Committee meeting was confirmed for 2 June 2023.
- The Australian Communications Consumer Action Network (ACCAN) recently met with Commissioner Falk and expressed an interest in presenting to the DP-REG from the perspective of a consumer representative in the digital platforms space.
 - The ACMA also met with ACCAN recently to speak about the telecommunications and captioning space, but it was not clear what ACCAN's role is in the digital platform space. eSafety echoed this sentiment and asked if ACCAN could clarify their role and intention is in relation to digital platforms.
 - DP-REG would like to understand how ACCAN's work intersects with DP-REG and what topic ACCAN would like to present on.
- OAIC noted that the Australian Human Rights Commissioner has invited the OAIC to take part in an online consultation it is running in relation to the UN's Global Digital Compact. The Global Digital Compact is expected to outline shared principles for an open, free and secure digital future for all. The AHRC is hosting 2 online consultations on 3 April and 6 April.
- The 3 April session will cover:
 - protection of data [REDACTED]
 - promoting the regulation of artificial intelligence [REDACTED]
- The 6 April session will cover:
 - applying human rights online, and
 - introducing accountability criteria for discrimination and misleading content.
- The Commission is also welcoming written submissions on the same topics which are due by 17 April. If DP-REG members are not already involved and are interested, registration to the online sessions and written submissions are both by email and the OAIC can provide these details.
- The ACMA noted the potential public service wide ban on TikTok.

Action Item 10: OAIC to provide AHRC email invitation to participate in consultation in relation to the UN Global Digital Compact.

Item 3: Extension of working group and secretariat tenure

- OAIC noted that there was in-principle support of the proposal at the March Steering Committee meeting to extend the tenures of the current Secretariat and Working Group Chairs until the end of 2023 as it that would enable DP-REG to maintain the momentum that's been built up and ensure working groups are able to deliver on their workplans which were endorsed in late September 2022.
- While this would alter the timing of when certain items might be delivered under the Working Group's workplans, the OAIC considers it a good opportunity to continue to bed down the processes that have been developed through the Working Groups for substantive reporting in December. OAIC acknowledged that this might raise concerns about the alignment of the DP-REG tenures with other government reporting timeframes.
- As a way of bringing DP-REG back to a financial year reporting cycle, OAIC suggested that the first half of 2024 could be used to reflect upon and review DP REG's processes, our output and the role of DP-REG more broadly to help inform our strategic priorities for the 24/25 financial year and called for comments on this modified proposal.
- The ACCC said they were comfortable with the OAIC's modified proposal but were unsure about the need to align DP-REG's tenures with other government reporting timeframes and financial years as DP-REG doesn't have any reporting obligations. The ACCC noted that DP-REG may lose momentum if we do take the first half of 2024 to reflect on processes so preferred to have working groups convened early next year.
- The ACMA asked whether it would be new committees or the same committees doing more work over the extension. If it is the latter, then the ACMA prefers financial years but also doesn't want to lose momentum.
- eSafety suggested extending for 12 months as there is good work coming from the Working Groups and eSafety doesn't want to lose that momentum. There may, however, be some amendments to the strategic priorities that may need to be taken into account.
- OAIC responded that they think the strategic priorities would be recalibrated annually by the Regulator Heads but could remain the same. The Working Groups are set up to progress those priorities, so they would need to be linked.
- OAIC was supportive of the idea of giving the Working Groups more time to finalise work in the next 6 months.
- The ACMA suggested that if the priorities were updated around February and March, the Working Groups could work from that point in time.
- eSafety noted that the Regulator Heads made an announcement around June/July last year and it would make sense to make an announcement at the same time this year. It would be good to make an announcement around generative AI since it's topical right now. They will want something to say after the Regulator Heads meeting, and the DTWG will potentially have an output on generative AI soon as well.
- The ACCC and ACMA suggested that it could be a good opportunity to publish the Digital Technology Working Group's algorithms literature review paper as a work product of the DP-REG, and then flag that the DP-REG's next focus is generative AI.
- OAIC suggested extending the current tenure for another 12 months with a view to set new priorities and intentions in June/July 2024. The Secretariat can prepare a 2-page

snapshot of achievements over the last year which s47C
[REDACTED] and would give the Regulator Heads something to announce.

- eSafety suggested also having a media statement ready to be published after the upcoming Regulator Heads meeting, even if it's simply an update on strategic priorities. OAIC agreed to draft the snapshot and media statement and circulate them to the Steering Committee for feedback ahead of the 20 June 2023 Regulator Heads meeting.

Item 5: Digital Technology Working Group Algorithms Literature Summary (ACCC)

- The Digital Technology Working Group noted the algorithms literature summary was presented at the March Steering Committee where they discussed options for publication and their resourcing implications. Since then, they have further considered the text and resource implications of publication, and the document has been reviewed from legal, economic and technical perspectives. The covering paper sets out the advantages and disadvantages of 3 options: publishing the paper; publishing the paper for comment; or not publishing the paper. They are now seeking feedback on the options.
- The ACMA supported publishing the paper on the basis that it is a good product and that it would benefit many in government to have it as context to the work they are involved in, for example, misinformation and disinformation.
- eSafety’s preference was not to publish. If it was going to be published, eSafety suggested that there needs to be a linkage between the research and the work of DP-REG and the regulators. eSafety was concerned that the paper is very academic and as it would be the DP-REG’s first output, it doesn’t clearly explain what the DP-REG does, and it is unclear who the audience would be. eSafety would support publishing if it could be more clearly linked to what DP-REG does.
- The ACCC said that the paper would benefit from adding the words ‘working paper’ to the front which could signal that this could be part of a series of papers, the next of which could be on generative AI. Calling it a ‘working paper’ would make it clear that it is not a public report, and it might therefore be more useful to academics and other parts of government. ACCC’s preference is not to call for comment.
- The OAIC supported publication but agreed with eSafety’s point about linkage to the DP-REG’s work. This may be a good opportunity to reconsider starting a webpage that sets out information about the DP-REG and its work, and that could host some outputs. That may help to contextualise the paper too.
- The ACMA agreed that a webpage would be useful to have, but is conscious of the resourcing requirements.
- The ACCC noted that launching an official .gov.au website can be potentially onerous as the we would need to ensure we follow official government process to do so.
- The OAIC noted that they launch ‘microsites’ for events like Privacy Awareness Week quite frequently and can discuss the process internally and revert to the Steering Committee on the time and cost implications.
- The ACMA suggested that if a website or microsite would not work for any reason, the regulators could publish something on their own websites and ensure it’s the same entry across the board as with the announcement of the communique.
- eSafety indicated they would support publication if there was a section at the front of the paper that outlined the roles of the regulators and how their work relates to or intersects with algorithms.

Action Item 9: OAIC to discuss establishing a DP-REG dedicated website or microsite with their Communications Team and report back to members on the time and cost implications of the options.

Action Item 10: The Digital Technology Working Group to put the words ‘working paper’ on the front of the Working Group’s algorithms literature summary.

Item 6: Digital Technology Working Group Examination of Generative AI LLMs (ACCC)

- The Digital Technology Working Group stated that their examination of large language models (LLMs) would be the first in a proposed series of studies on generative AI. The paper provides an overview of LLMs and how they work, current uses of LLMs, trends and how they might be used in the future. The paper is broken down in to how it impacts members regulatory remits.
- The Digital Technology Working Group is seeking feedback on the format, content and publication of the paper. They noted that the DISR published both a Rapid Response Report on Generative AI and discussion paper on Responsible Generative AI which provides a list of 20 consultation questions. The Digital Technology Working Group noted that in developing the paper, they met with academics who specialised in search engines and generative AI on 3 occasions, which they found to be a very helpful process which also opened a dialogue between DP-REG and academics.
- The OAIC was supportive of the idea and proposed adding a timestamp in the form of ‘as at (date)’ at the footer of each page to reflect when the paper was written given how quick moving the generative AI space is. The OAIC also asked whether the Working Group could scan the document to ensure that there are no references to unpublished government work, and suggested that the paper is put to the Regulator Heads for publication.
- The ACCC supported publication and suggested including the words ‘working paper’ on the paper somewhere and updating the format and language used to be similar to the algorithms literature review. The ACCC will provide written comments to the Working Group. The ACCC also supported presenting the paper to the Regulator Heads to discuss publication and noted it should be updated to refer to other reports such as the UTS paper on the State of AI governance.
- eSafety was comfortable with template of the document and publication. In terms of timing, eSafety is releasing a paper on generative AI and will also provide written comments. eSafety supports the format of articulating the problem and threats and how it links to DP-REG members’ roles. From their own stakeholder consultation with experts in UK, US and AU and industry, there is a lack of awareness around what regulation currently exists in this space and a paper that articulates DP-REG members’ roles is useful, especially in context of the DISR papers. eSafety intends to publish a tech trends paper on online harms in July and supports publication of the Digital Technology Working Group’s paper after that.

- Members also discussed preparing a joint letter to the DISR consultation paper similar to the approach to the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms which sets out the roles and remits of DP-REG members in the space, but which does not comment on the substantive questions of the consultation paper. In that way, members may still prepare their own standalone submissions if desired. Members agreed to seek in-principle support from Regulator Heads by 7 June, and for the Secretariat to provide the Digital Technology Working Group with a copy of the earlier Joint Paper.

Action Item 12: DP-REG members to provide written comments to the Digital Technology Working Group on their paper on their examination of generative AI LLMs.

Action Item 13: Digital Technology Working Group to update their paper on their examination of generative AI LLMs:

- add an “as at [date]” timestamp in the footer of the paper to reflect the point in time the paper was prepared,
- review the paper to ensure that any non-public government information is removed from the paper,
- restructure the paper to be more consistent with the algorithms literature review paper,
- add references in appropriate parts of the paper to the UTS ‘State of AI Governance in Australia’ report
- revise the tone of the paper to be more formal and pursuant to any comments received from DP-REG members.

Action Item 14: DP-REG members to each internally seek an in-principle decision from Regulator Heads by 7 June 2023 on whether DP-REG should lodge a joint letter submission to the Department of Industry, Science and Resource’s generative AI discussion paper.

Action Item 15: OAIC to provide the Digital Technology Working Group with the DP-REG’s joint letter to the Senate Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms.

Item 7: Data & Research Working Group Data Dictionary (ACMA)

- The Data & Research Working Group’s Digital Platforms Dictionary is the product of detailed exercise and discussions and identifies terms that are relevant to each members’ regulatory remit in the context of the digital platforms space. The Working Group sought feedback on terms and definitions.
- Members suggested including a column that would track the instances where the terms were defined in legislation, regulation or codes relevant to our regulatory remits. Members will provide the Data & Research Working Group with written comments if any.
- It was noted that a challenge over time might be whether it could capture consistency or inconsistency when terms are changed across legislation, regulation and codes.
- eSafety suggested including a preamble that notes regulators all work with the terms as defined within our own legal or co-regulatory mechanisms.

Action Item 16: DP-REG members to provide comments to the Data & Research Working Group on the Digital Platforms dictionary by 16 June 2023.

Action Item 17: The Data & Research Working Group to consider amending the data dictionary to clearly identify where certain terms are defined in the regulators' legislation and codes, and include a preamble noting regulators work with the terms as defined within their own legal or co-regulatory mechanisms.

Item 8: Codes & Regulation Working Group Digital Platforms Initiatives Tracker (eSafety)

- The Codes & Regulation Working Group's Digital Platforms Initiatives Tracker is intended to be a living document for all DP-REG members to track details about digital platforms initiatives across members' offices. It includes the full gamut of digital platforms work domestically – split into 2 sections – which tracks work that regulators are engaged on and not engaged on. The plan is for the document to live in a prominent area on the DP-REG GovTeams Sharepoint and for any member to be able to add to the document, but for the Working Group to keep governance of it.
- Members were generally supportive of the tracker and the aims of the tracker, and suggested the Working Group consider how best to highlight changes to the tracker between meetings. It was also suggested that the Working Group consider working with the Secretariat to create a standing item in the Steering Committee meeting agenda to check the tracker and report on it at each meeting.

Action Item 18: OAIC and Codes & Regulation Working Group to discuss how best to add the Digital Platforms Initiatives Tracker as a standing item to the Steering Committee's meeting agendas.

Action Item 19: Codes & Regulation Working Group to consider how best to highlight changes in the Digital Platforms Initiatives Tracker from meeting to meeting.

Item 9: Regulator Updates

OAIC

- OAIC hosted Privacy Awareness Week 1 May to 7 May and the theme was Back to Basics. It was a successful week and the OAIC thanked members for their support and collaboration throughout the lead up and week.
- OAIC received additional funding in the budget to support privacy activities and the Attorney-General has announced he will appoint a Privacy Commissioner, bringing the OAIC back to a three Commissioner model.

eSafety

- eSafety received an increase in their base funding (but not their overall funding) and is being restructured with two bands 2s and six band 1s.
- eSafety has registered 5 industry codes which cover social media services, app distribution services, hosting services, equipment (which covers operating systems,

consoles, mobile devices), and Internet Carriage Services. These codes include a range of obligations which will come into place 6 months after registration. 3 codes were declined and eSafety will move to standards to cover those areas, being relevant electronic services (communications), designated internet services, and search engine services. eSafety wanted broader commitment from service providers to detecting CSAM and deepfakes in the relevant electronic services and designated internet services codes. They didn't register the search engine services code due to announcements with generative AI. eSafety estimates the standards will take about 4 months to develop.

- At the end of March, the Government released their response to the Senate Inquiry on Social Media and Online Safety which noted the Online Safety Act has a mandatory independent review due in January 2025. eSafety stated they will work with the government on that review.
- eSafety has received Twitter, Twitch and Discord's response to their BOSE notices and are working through them.
- On 31 March 2023, eSafety submitted its roadmap on age verification to Government for consideration. They are now awaiting the public release of that report and a response from Government.

ACMA

- The ACMA noted that they had received additional funding for misinformation and disinformation, scams and setting up an SMS sender ID register, and are also going through a restructure.

ACCC

- The ACCC noted that their DPSI report 6 was published in April and that their DPSI report 7 is on track for delivery. They received 20 submissions for DPSI report 7 which have now been published online.

Item 10: Other business

- The next Steering Committee meeting was confirmed for 4 August 2023.
- The first meeting of the International Network for Digital Regulation Cooperation is confirmed to take place on 22 June 2023, and officer level representatives from each DP-REG member will attend.

Minutes

Previous meeting minutes

- There were no further comments received by the Secretariat on the DP-REG Steering Committee meeting minutes for 2 June 2023.

Outcome 1: The DP-REG Steering Committee meeting minutes for 2 June 2023 were taken as final.

Previous action items arising

- Members did not have any further comments in addition to the Chair's written update on action items from the 2 June 2023 Steering Committee meeting and 20 June 2023 Regulator Heads meeting.
- The following action items remain outstanding:

s47C

Action Item 2: Secretariat and working group chairs to develop 3-4 areas of strategic engagement for DP-REG to consider, while having regard to DP-REG resourcing.

Action Item 3: OAIC to arrange for the ACCAN to present at the next DP-REG Steering Committee meeting.

Action Item 4: OAIC to schedule a meeting in February or March 2024 for members to plan the strategic priorities for the next tenure of the DP-REG Forum. The meeting will ideally take place in person at the ACMA's Pyrmont office.

Item 3: Updates on working group progress

Digital Technology Working Group (DTWG)

- Working group chairs took the Triannual Reporting Stocktake as read.
- ACMA asked about the timetable for publication of the generative AI LLMs paper. ACMA also asked whether the working group had received feedback from the Departments with whom drafts of the generative AI LLMs paper and algorithms literature review had been shared.
- The ACCC noted that publication will take place as soon as the DP-REG microsite is ready. This will likely be September-October 2023. The generative AI LLMs paper has been shared with the Department of Industry, Science and Resources (DISR). The Department of Home Affairs (DoHA) and Comms (DITRDCA) were grateful to receive a draft of the algorithms literature review. No feedback has been provided to the working group yet. The ACCC has a standing meeting with DISR and may receive feedback on the generative AI paper through that avenue.

- eSafety noted that they are keen for a template to be developed for public facing DP-REG papers and asked whether the working group could prepare one. eSafety noted that the eSafety Commissioner would like visibility of the template.
- ACCC agreed to prepare a template, modelled on the generative AI LLMs paper. Members agreed that eSafety's representatives on the DTWG would assist.
- OAIC asked whether there were any key takeaways from TikTok's Transparency and Accountability Centre presentation to the DTWG.
- ACCC noted that Tiktok is about to launch an office in Singapore for their accountability centre. Tiktok were open about how their recommender systems work. There was a strong focus on Tiktok's security measures in the presentation. The Australian policy team is small and were making higher level content moderation decisions. Lower level content moderation decisions were outsourced overseas.
- eSafety asked whether TikTok discussed Oracle's involvement in the USA.
- ACCC did not recall whether this was specifically discussed. ACCC to send their file note to the Secretariat for circulation.

Action Item 5: DTWG to prepare a template for public-facing DP-REG papers.

Action Item 6: ACCC to send a file note of TikTok's Transparency and Accountability Centre presentation to the Secretariat. Secretariat to circulate the file note to DP-REG members.

Codes & Regulation Working Group (CRWG)

- The working group chair noted that the CRWG is currently drafting a paper that sets out best practice principles for code development and will present this to the Steering Committee for feedback once complete. The CRWG is also maintaining the digital platform initiatives tracker and register of formal action on an ongoing basis. The CRWG is developing a joint paper on digital platform dispute resolution and has settled the scope for that paper, and drafting has commenced. For that joint paper, the working group is looking at how we can bring in other agencies (such as ASIC and the ACSC) to present on their dispute resolution processes.
- ACMA asked about the planned timing for completion of the dispute resolution paper.
- The working group chair noted the CRWG had initially set an ambitious timeframe for an August completion, but it is more likely to be completed in September or October so that the working group can focus on one deliverable at a time and complete the best practice principles for code development paper first.
- eSafety noted that there is a risk of the dispute resolution joint paper blowing out in scope. Their preference would be for the paper to focus on the regulatory remits of DP-REG members and perhaps cover other regulatory frameworks in an addendum. eSafety also asked whether the WG chair could give visibility to the SC about the proposed case studies.
- OAIC suggested that a phased approach to the paper be taken, where we focus on completing work on our own remits and then subsequently ask other regulators to provide input.
- The working group chair was open to a phased approach and indicated that the working group was planning to include information on other regulators' remits in an addendum to

the paper. Planned case studies are Instagram and Reddit, who likely have very different models of dispute resolution and complaint handling.

- The ACCC noted that in the context of developing new work plans, there could be an opportunity to arrange for a skills uplift on code drafting skills. This could be an idea for next year.
- eSafety noted that the WG chair had completed legislative drafting training that was hosted by the Office of Parliamentary Counsel (OPC). This would be a good opportunity in that DP-REG members often deal with secondary instruments (codes and legislative instruments). eSafety often works with AGS, or OPC where primary legislation is involved.
- OAIC noted that there is a difference in in-house capability between regulators. The OAIC could share a list of skilled AGS drafters if that would assist. Working group to consider.
- The working group chair offered to send the details of the relevant OPC course to the secretariat, who will circulate to DP-REG members.

Action Item 7: eSafety to send details of the OPC legislative drafting course to the Secretariat. Secretariat to circulate to DP-REG members.

Action Item 8: CRWG to consider what opportunities there are for code drafting training/skills uplift for DP-REG members, as well as how best to share code-drafting resources amongst DP-REG members.

Data & Research Working Group (DRWG)

- The working group chair noted that DP-REG helped ACMA to finalise their research on complaints and reports around harmful content. The focus of the DRWG for the next quarter will be on:
 - Paper on barriers to information sharing. The first phase of this project was an exercise of mapping barriers to information sharing. The second phase will be to select a useful dataset – platforms' monthly active users (MAUs) – then map the sharing of this data across agencies and identify barriers that arise through this process.
 - Working on a way forward with a platform terms & conditions audit and deciding how best to align with the work that the OAIC is intending to undertake.

Secretariat

- The Secretariat noted that there have been a number of areas of engagement with DP-REG, completion of the stakeholder mapping exercise, development of reporting materials for the Regulator Heads meeting, s47C and agreement on developing a DP-REG microsite.
- The Secretariat highlighted the first meeting of the International Network for Digital Regulation Cooperation (INDRC), which officers from DP-REG attended on 22 June 2023. The meeting included two presentations. The first presentation was from the UK DRCF about where they are now and their upcoming priorities. The second presentation was from the Netherlands SDT on their effective transparency project, which developed high level principles on effective transparency and on the protection of children. In both presentations the groups shared on the lessons they learned as they progressed their projects. The next session will take place in early December.

- ACMA noted that there were no introductions of attendees at the INDRC meeting and no discussion of what the group will look like going forward.
- eSafety asked for the working group chairs' views on what the benefits are for DP-REG's participation in the INDRC group.
- OAIC noted that participants had offered to share some of the research that they had undertaken. Participation could be useful to hear what the experiences of other regulatory networks are, how they developed and challenges they faced, noting that other networks (e.g. UK DRCF) are quite advanced. We could engage with INDRC early before the next meeting and take a lead on what the agenda could look like next time.
- eSafety agreed that we could learn from the UK DRCF, including on how they have approached funding.

Discussion on the development of new work plans

- ACMA noted that the working group chairs and Secretariat had discussed the best way forward and are currently working on a process to develop the new work plans. Some working groups have resources that will need continuous updates. The working groups are also at varied stages of completion of their work plans.
- The working group chairs propose to develop full 2023/24 work plans which will be brought back to the Steering Committee for sign-off. The working group chairs also intend to run a planning session in November to plan DP-REG's 2024/25 strategic priorities, in order to seek regulator heads' feedback in the December regulator heads meeting. In Feb/March 2024, working group chairs will look to finalise 2024/25 strategic priorities and working group roles.
- OAIC, ACMA and eSafety agreed with that approach.
- ACCC agreed but noted that it would be worth periodically reviewing how the working groups are split up and titled.

Action Item 9: Working group chairs to develop 2023/24 work plans for Steering Committee endorsement.

Item 4: DP-REG website

- The OAIC has been progressing work on the DP-REG microsite since the regulator heads meeting. The OAIC circulated the request for quote with the detailed microsite requirements at an officer-level to provide early visibility of what the microsite will look like and what its proposed functionality will be. Once the OAIC receives officer-level feedback, the OAIC will seek quotes and appoint a developer.
- Assuming that a developer is appointed in the following three weeks, the completion date is likely to be late October.
- As the microsite process moves forward the OAIC will receive design details such as the colour palette and font. The OAIC will circulate these out of session for Steering Committee approval to ensure there is agreement prior to building the microsite. The draft microsite content may need to be amended based on the layout the developer proposes, and so the draft content may change over the course of the project.

- The OAIC asked for Steering Committee guidance on the level of clearance that will be needed for DP-REG microsite content.
- It was agreed that DP-REG members would give thought to clearance levels required within their own agencies. The group noted that when public facing documents are cleared (e.g. submissions and research papers) we could ask for clearance that it be published on the website.

Action Item 10: Members to provide officer level feedback to the OAIC on the microsite request for quote and proposed functionality by COB 11 August.

Action Item 11: Members to internally consider what their respective clearance levels will be for changes to the DP-REG microsite (noting that it may be different for each agency) prior to the next Steering Committee meeting.

Item 5: Data and Research Working Group Data Dictionary

- ACMA noted that the data dictionary was at the final draft stage, subject to feedback from the ACMA comms team. The working group is seeking feedback on next steps for circulation to regulators and portfolio departments. ACMA proposes that members could circulate the data dictionary internally by sharing the document with internal data areas, and potentially promoting the work through newsletters. In terms of sharing the document with portfolio departments, the Chair could write to the various deputy secretaries in each of our departments and attach the data dictionary – this could be a good opportunity to introduce the work of DP-REG and could also include the algorithms paper.
- OAIC noted that the data dictionary could also be circulated to OPC and AGS, who may find it useful for drafting work.
- eSafety noted that the definition of a digital platform in the data dictionary was drawn from the definition used in the ACCC's *Digital Platforms Services Inquiry* terms of reference. However, DITRDC would use the term 'digital platform' differently to include/exclude other services. eSafety's legislation refers to 'online services'. eSafety would also use the term digital platform slightly differently to how it is defined in the data dictionary. Also, the term 'search services' refers to the returning of results in natural language, but unclear as to whether that would include image search. The group should also consider the inclusion of generated video and images.
- OAIC suggested that in the interests of finalising the document, eSafety could provide comments to the group next week.

Action Item 12: eSafety to provide comments on the draft data dictionary to the Data and Research Working Group in relation to the definitions of digital platform and search services.

Action Item 13: Once eSafety's feedback on the Data and Research Working Group's data dictionary has been actioned, ACMA to circulate the final version for out of session clearance.

Item 6: Approach to DP-REG joint submissions

- The ACCC reflected that the joint submission to the DISR AI discussion paper was successful and thanked all members of the group for their contributions. The ACCC had two reflections on joint submissions to discuss:
 - Firstly, asking the regulator heads to provide early sign-off on a skeleton of the joint submission was a good approach and made the process easier.
 - Secondly, the ACCC noted that there were different views between agencies about how substantial the content of the joint submission would be. The OAIC was providing a separate submission to the DISR discussion paper which delved in to the detail of the OAIC’s framework, which the ACCC has no objections to, but it may be helpful for future submissions to decide whether DP-REG joint submissions should cover all information from our agencies, or should just be a high-level paper or covering paper. While recognising that it may be different from case to case, it would be helpful to get a general sense of the Steering Committee’s views.
- The OAIC noted that their vision was that a joint submission could provide a view on the areas of commonality and overlap between regulators. The specific details on individual regulators’ regulatory remits could be provided in separate submissions or as an attachment to the joint submission. On that basis, was imagining something fairly high level, either a few pages or a longer submission with one or more attachments. If there are specific things that matter to the OIAIC as the privacy regulator, then we could attach that or provide as a separate submission.
- The ACMA agreed with the OAIC’s view.
- The OAIC suggested that the early skeleton submission for RH sign-off could indicate at the outset whether a regulator intends to provide an attachment or separate submission.
- eSafety agreed and noted that there will be many cases where one regulator has a particular issue to discuss and doesn’t want to put that content in the body of a joint submission, as then all other agencies would have to sign off on that content. Joint submissions should be short by definition and focussed on the areas of commonality.
- The ACCC liked the agreed approach and the flexibility of providing a regulator-specific attachment that may not need to be signed off by all members.
- Members agreed to test this approach for the next joint submission.

Outcome 2: DP-REG members agreed that for the next DP-REG joint submission, members will prepare a skeleton or structure of the joint submission for early regulator head sign off, which also indicates whether a particular regulator will provide an attachment or separate submission.

Item 7: Regulator Updates

OAIC

- OAIC is preparing submissions to the ACCC’s Digital Platform Services Inquiry issues paper on data brokers and an OAIC submission to the DISR discussion paper on safe and responsible AI in Australia.

- Still awaiting Government response to the PAR report
- OAIC will publicly launch the results of the Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey on Tuesday. Provided embargoed copies of the report to your respective heads yesterday. The research explores themes of interest to the group, including the public's views on artificial intelligence and the value of privacy to individuals.

eSafety

- eSafety issued BOSE notice to X (formerly Twitter) about what it is doing to address online hate. X has requested an extension which is currently under consideration.
- As noted last meeting, in June, eSafety registered 5 industry codes and withheld a decision on the search engine services code due to recent developments in generative AI. eSafety is hoping to make a decision in late August/early September on a revised version of that code.
- eSafety is expecting Government's response on the Age Verification Roadmap in the coming months. eSafety understands that the Minister is seeking interdepartmental feedback.
- eSafety is in the final stages of a position statement on generative AI and is currently seeking feedback from academics and subject matter experts.

ACMA

- ACMA publicly released the second report to Government on the operation on the voluntary mis/disinformation code last week. The report made a number of findings, including that the transparency of platform measures under the code are quite poor, as well as a lack of progress on developing reporting processes and administrative processes to administer the code.
- The mis/disinformation bill is still out for consultation and the Government has extended the submission period until 20 August. There was a significant protest outside the Brisbane ACMA office last week. The Department has received over 15,000 submissions so far.

ACCC

- The Digital Platform Services Inquiry (DPSI) issues paper on data brokers has been released. The ACCC welcomes submissions or comments.
- s47C
- Successful ACL proceedings against Onavo Protect.
- ACCC to be the accreditor for digital identity and tasked with policy. Minister Gallagher made comments about the ACCC doing this role in the interim but that in future there needs to be a digital regulator.

Item 8: Other business

Rebecca Brown (OAIC) and Louisa Kefford (ACCC) were recorded as apologies for the meeting.

The minutes were accepted without alteration.

3. eSafety Presentation

MS delivered a presentation on the Basic Online Safety Expectations, a component of the Online Safety Act. While not a code, the Expectations are a transparency and accountability mechanism that complements the other regulatory arrangements in the eSafety Commissioner's remit.

The Online Safety Act 2021 provides for the Minister to set online safety expectations through a determination. The Online Safety (Basic Online Safety Expectations) Determination 2022 (the Determination) was registered on 23 January 2022. The Expectations themselves are not enforceable, however, eSafety has a number of relevant powers under the Act:

- The power to require online service providers to report on how they are meeting any or all of the Expectations, either on a non-periodic or a periodic basis. The obligation to respond to a reporting notice is an enforceable obligation and backed by civil penalties.
- The power to require reporting can either apply to specific providers, or – via a determination – may apply to a specified class of providers.
- The power to issue statements to provider(s) about compliance and non-compliance with the Expectations and publish such statements.

eSafety is required by the Act to take into account several criteria when deciding whether to issue a reporting notice, for example: the number of complaints it has received under the Act in relation to the service in the previous 12 months and any deficiencies in the provider's safety practices or terms of use.

MS outlined eSafety's experience issuing a first set of non-periodic (i.e. point in time) notices. The notices were issued to Apple, Meta (including Whatsapp), Microsoft (including Skype), Omegle and



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Snap and focused on information about the steps these services are taking to address child sexual exploitation and abuse. eSafety avoided asking for information that was already in the public domain and/or addressed by existing reporting mechanisms, and the questionnaire was designed to gather a mix of qualitative and quantitative data. MS observed that it was useful to tailor questions to the platform in question and to recognise their services and sub-services.

MS outlined eSafety's current considerations around putting some information from services in the public domain to support the policy objectives of transparency and accountability.

Members discussed the policy intent of the Expectations – whether the Expectations would drive behaviour change or whether the publication of information was the intended outcome (or both).

Members discussed how the Expectations mechanism and the process so far compares to their own experiences gathering information from entities they regulate.

Members discussed next steps for the Expectations, including the possibility of issuing periodic notices to track trends over time and expanding the types of online harms beyond child sexual exploitation and abuse.

One of these priority areas was a register of all formal action taken against digital platforms across the four regulators. Working group chairs discussed whether this work would be best taken forward by the codes and regulation group. Members agreed that this would be a useful exercise and likely sits with this working group, but that it would need to be carefully scoped. ACCC and OAIC maintain running registers of formal actions. Members also discussed whether there would be scope to include informal action, as informal actions are common across some regulators.

Action: s4 to consider scope of work involved in this activity, update the workplan and circulate this out-of-session for consideration.

- The ACCC would appreciate working group members identifying any gaps in the entries, document will be editable on GovTeams.
- The tracker can be circulated more widely within working groups' agencies.
- Working group agreed updating at the same time as the register of enforcement action. s4 to make calls for updates.
- TL and LK are seeking feedback on the tracker.

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5. Register of formal/enforcement action

S47 introduced the Enforcement Actions Register:

- Scope document and register sent around with agenda.
- The register is intended to capture both formal and informal actions regarding digital platforms. It is acknowledged that agencies have different approaches to enforcement and similar actions and may require different formats for entries in the register.
- Two potential designs for the register were provided, one divided by each agency and the other a potential combined register. S47 requested feedback on the preferences of each agency.

The working group suggested the following changes:

- A definition of digital platforms be added to the scoping document.
- A column for timing be added to the combined register table.

Action: Working group to provide any definitions of digital platforms and a brief description of their agency's approach to enforcement. Working group members to trial completing both versions of the register before the next meeting and provide feedback on their preference or any changes then. 6. Workplan review

Key Learnings and Best Practice Principles document and Areas of Intersection paper

S4 asked the working group what the desired outcome or purpose for the Key Learnings and Best Practice Principles document was, as it would be good to recalibrate:

- S4 suggested the document should be broader than digital platforms and focus on codes development generally. LK agreed.
- The working group agreed that limiting scope to a focus of codes and regulations would be best, but having it cover all codes including both voluntary and mandatory.
- S4 suggested the Area of Intersection paper could explore how the principles developed in the Best Practice Principles document apply to digital platforms. TL agreed that it would be good to include key learnings in this paper.
- TM suggested focusing on specific harms that code making powers are seeking to address.

Action: JO to circulate OAIC table on areas of intersection.

Action: Members agreed to write down key points from their experiences developing codes and send to S4 in 2 weeks. S4 to send an email detailing request. To be revisited next meeting or the following.



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7. Agency updates

eSafety:

Basic Online Safety Expectations (BOSE) transparency notices were sent out to Apple, Meta (including WhatsApp), Omegle, Microsoft (including Skype) and Snap. eSafety has published a summary of responses for the this set of notices. A second set of notices were sent to Twitter, TikTok, Twitch, Discord and Google (including YouTube).

Industry associations submitted draft Industry Codes to eSafety in November 2022. eSafety provided its preliminary views to industry associations on 9 February 2023 and provided until 9 March for changes to be made. The draft codes and preliminary views have been released publicly on www.onlinesafety.org.au/codes. Industry associations requested an extension to make changes, eSafety had advised them of the outcome of the extension request but had not made this information public (n.b. since the working group meeting, eSafety publicly announced that it had granted an extension to 31 March).

s47C

ACMA

ACMA is assisting drafting legislation to introduce the new misinformation and disinformation powers announced in January. Powers include ACMA being able to compel information from digital platforms and mandatory codes and standards making.

ACMA is encouraging buy-in from smaller providers on the disinformation code. ACMA is considering the potential for misinformation in the Voice referendum.

Reviews of the broadcasting codes are beginning this year. These are industry-led codes but registered by ACMA. ACMA is encouraging broadcasters to extend safeguards to their online offerings.

OAIC

The Privacy Act review was released two weeks ago. Some significant proposals including:

- improved clarity of collection notices
- improved quality of consent requests
- personal information handling to be fair and reasonable in the circumstances – list of legislative factors
- individual rights: right to erasure, opt out of targeted advertising
- establishment of a tort of privacy
- right to private action for breaches of the Act
- powers for OAIC to establish a code without approaching industry.



Next step for the review is a round of consultation by Government, a government response then an exposure draft for consultation potentially later in 2023.

- LK suggested a different topic or a separate piece of work focusing on 'dispute resolution processes', which could cover:
 - What is and is not covered by dispute resolution processes

- Role of various regulators and ombuds schemes
- Gaps and overlapping jurisdictions
- Funding sources
- Members were supportive of this idea and considered when the paper could be developed, alongside the current workplan.

5. Best practice principles and key learnings doc

ACMA led discussion of the [mock up](#) for the best practice principles doc, which included a shell structure and a description of how it could look. There could be three parts to the document: an overview infographic, a deep dive section, and checklists. Members discussed whether the checklists would duplicate information already in the overview and deep dive sections. Members agreed to begin with the overview, then the deep dive section, and from there ascertain whether a checklist is necessary.

Members discussed the purpose and content of the overview, including the extent to which it is process-driven or could include strategic considerations.

Members agreed to add their experiences and thoughts to the current mock up, including deep dive suggestions and any existing sources or frameworks that the overview could draw information from.

Action: all members to make suggestions to the [mock up](#) by the next meeting.



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6. Area of intersection paper

OAIC led discussion of the [scoping document](#) for the area of intersection paper.

Scope:

- Members discussed whether the scope should be extended to include dispute resolution methods outside of member regulators e.g. financial disputes. Members were generally supportive of this and noted this may involve extra clearance processes.
- TM asked if the paper should look at international dispute resolution mechanisms. Members were not opposed to this idea but noted the potential for scope creep, so this may not be a significant focus of the paper.

Purpose:

- Members discussed the need for the paper to have a clear purpose, including whether the paper is intended to inform government, make recommendations to government or to be more internally-focused on improving regulatory cohesion. **S4** suggested the paper could be a foundational piece focused on improving regulatory cohesion that could be drawn on for future papers providing advice to government.
- All members noted the need to understand the current landscape of dispute resolution processes – internal to platforms and externally with regulators – and that the need for alignment and cohesion is likely to increase.
- **S4** asked about duplication with any existing work? TM discussed the Accenture report which could be used to inform DP-Reg's paper. He noted that it heavily focuses on internal dispute resolution and is beginning to date. **S4** agreed that it is a useful input but that there is merit in a regulator-driven piece that includes a greater focus on external dispute resolution.

Timeframes:

- Members thought the proposed timeframe was ambitious but potentially doable, but ultimately agreed to push out the timeframe to, among other things, accommodate the Government response to ACCC reform recommendations.
- Members thought end of July could be sufficient and noted that clearance processes may take longer than anticipated.
- Members discussed whether it would be better to wait for the Government response to the DPSI Interim Report 5. ACCC advised it would be helpful to have the work underway prior to the Government response to help inform regulators' views, but that the findings and completion of the report should be after the Government response.

Process:

- TM advised that the OAIC would write the intro and part 1 of the paper. For part 2, which would map dispute resolution processes, members should provide a few paragraphs on what dispute resolution exists in each of their remits. Parts 3 and 4 are left relatively open and may be informed by parts 1 and 2.

Timing of best practice infographic: Noted that members would discuss this item at agenda item 6.

TM to check whether scope of joint paper could be discussed at Steering Committee meeting: TM confirmed that the joint paper was not discussed by the Steering Committee (SC) and that CR-WG members will progress clearance of the scoping document through internal clearance channels. The CR-WG will aim to update the SC about the paper's progress at the next meeting.

4. Standing item: Digital platforms initiatives tracker

Members noted updates to the tracker regarding online safety codes and Privacy Act. TL has added brief information relating to the consultation on an Exposure Draft Bill to strengthen ACMA's powers relating to misinformation and disinformation. ACMA will check over this addition. TL has also updated the titles of the two tables from 'current initiatives' and 'initiatives on hold to 'actively engaging' and 'not currently engaging'.

Members also noted the feedback from the most recent SC meeting that the SC would like to have the tracker tabled at each SC meeting, with additions to the previous version marked in yellow highlight. The CR-WG agreed to update our current process of using track changes for additions to mark these in yellow instead, to streamline the process.

Action: ACMA to confirm wording of mis/disinfo addition.



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Action **S4** to accept track changes/change updates to yellow highlight.

5. Joint submission – process test

S4 flagged that regulator heads agreed to develop a joint DP-Reg submission for DISR's consultation on generative AI and that the group will keep tabs on how the process is operating in order to make tweaks to the joint submissions process document and templates agreed by the SC.

While the CR-WG will wait until the process is finalised to collate any lessons learned and tweak the process, members noted some early observations:

- DA (whose working group is coordinating the sub) suggested that a draft submission template, in addition to the existing templates for the EOI and proposal process, may assist future submission.
- Regulator Heads want to be involved in the shaping of the submission very early on – this should be factored into the process.
- The lead coordinator may be a subject matter expert rather than the CR-WG or the Secretariat.

6. Best Practice Principles Paper

Members discussed next steps and timing to progress the best practice principles paper.

Infographic:

- The next step is to clear the content in the process steps infographic to enable design to create a version.

Action: all members to begin internal clearance of the process steps for the infographic within 2 weeks (aim COB 12 July)

Deep dives:

- Members finalised allocation of deep dives
- **S4** will develop a first draft of a deep dive for members to use as a model within the week. Members will then follow by prioritising drafting of their deep dives over July.
- Members agreed that this drafting work can be prioritised over the area of intersection paper.
- Action **S4** to draft a model deep dive and distribute to members by 5 July.

7. Area of intersection paper

Members discussed the merits of confining the scope to voluntary and mandatory processes, vs maintaining case studies in the dispute resolution paper. The CR-WG agreed to keep case studies but reduce the number of case studies to two. Members also agreed that where there is potential duplication (e.g. the 5th interim DPSI report) to refer out to existing sources rather than duplicating detail.

Members discussed which case studies the paper should focus on, and agreed to float YouTube and Reddit with decision-makers for internal clearance.



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On timing and drafting, members agreed that drafting the best practice principles paper can take precedence over drafting the joint paper. However, members agreed that in the meantime we can seek internal clearance of the scope.

Action: all members to seek clearance of the scope and case studies ahead of the next meeting.

5. **ACMA presentation: Consumer research on mis/disinfo (and code review)**

- The ACMA provided a report to government on the adequacy of the Australian Code of Practice on Disinformation and Misinformation (Mis/Dis Code), which included research on consumer experiences with Mis/Dis information on digital platforms, an assessment of the operations and outcomes of the Mis/Dis Code (including the code review conducted by DIGI) and recommendations. The report to government was released on 25 July 2023.
- ACMA's major recommendations in the report of interest to members included the creation of information gathering powers and the powers to register a mandatory industry code or standard. They also recommended DIGI create a complaints escalation process from signatories to DIGI.
- The consumer research had a sample size of 840 respondents. Key findings:
 - a. 48% exposed to harmful content
 - b. 48% of those who saw harmful content had made a report
 - c. 38% of those who made a report about harmful content reported Mis/Disinformation
 - d. 44% of those who made a report were very dissatisfied or dissatisfied with the actions taken by the platform.
- Members asked questions about how the relationship between DIGI, the ACMA and the third-party assessor has operated in assessing outcomes under the Mis/Dis Code, how the self regulatory scheme has operated and the scope of consumer research.

Action: S4 will circulate PowerBI link for research data, methodology, and presentation slides and, when possible, information on September presentation.

6. **Progress on major deliverables:**

Best Practice Principles Paper

- S4 advised that the Infographic is with the eSafety design team.
- Next steps for the paper as agreed by members are:

1. Introductions

- ACMA commenced the meeting and all attendees introduced themselves.

2. Discussion of revised scope of the group

- ACMA noted that agency heads and the steering group had agreed to a new working group structure for DP-REG going forward. This was largely driven by the Steering Group's appetite for the existing data group to do additional and non-data related work.
- It is envisaged that this group will build upon the work of the existing data group, as well as expand its scope to research. The group would need to look at updating its work program to take into account revised scope.

ACTION ITEM: ACMA to develop revised work program drawing from previous data work plan and circulate to the group for comment.

3. Status of current data work (See: previous group work plan)

- The group discussed the progress of the previous data subcommittee, noting that work had been paused during discussions on its future make up. It was noted that the data stocktake across agencies had been completed and there was an exercise to identify potential gaps. However, it was unclear whether all agencies had provided a response. Some agencies had completed input but not provided it to the group.

ACTION ITEM: ACMA to recirculate data gaps request and working group meetings to provide responses in govteams.

4. Key activities for group going forward

- ACMA asked group what activities the group would like to achieve going forward.
- It was noted the challenges with sharing information with many of the items in the stocktake marked as red. It would be good for the group to explore barriers to sharing information (technical, legislative etc) and discuss mechanisms to potentially overcome these down the track.
- ACCC noted that the group had had some quick wins previously, for example the Neilson subscription which can be extended to DP-REG members. It was suggested that these are the types of initiatives that could be pursued in the group.

- Developing a stocktake on research was discussed. There had been some discussion about this in the previous data working group, noting the Department of Infrastructure had been looking at digital platforms research and all DP Reg members had contributed. ACMA had been investigating DP-REG could access this research. There was also interest in the group being used as a forum to provide early advice on potential research projects, to allow members not to duplicate resources or research activities.
- ACCC noted some previous concerns around joint research project namely how to be managed, capacity, size of work and budget. ACMA noted that it has been scoping some complaints research and may look to use this group as a mechanism for feedback on the questionnaire and sharing of findings.
- ACMA queried whether there was appetite for others to present to group i.e., academics or international organisations. There was an interest in inviting interesting organisations along to future meetings and working group members will consider going forward.

ACTION ITEM: ACMA to follow up status of research stocktake.

5. Working together (future meetings, communication preferences, Govteams)

- ACMA advised that the Working Group meeting chairs had recently met and a govteams site has been established for the working groups. It is envisaged that this will allow working group members to directly collaborate on documents, as well as easily store and share information.
- The group discussed the frequency of meetings (particularly with the establishment of the govteams site). It was agreed that the group would meet monthly initially.

1. Introductions

- ACMA commenced the meeting. MI introduced himself.

2. Action items

- The ACMA confirmed that all action items from the previous meeting had been completed.

3. Work program

- The Chair thanked all members for their feedback on the draft work program and their contribution to the gap analysis.
- The ACMA asked if there was any desire to expand the work program to cover additional issues highlighted in gap analysis. There was agreement that the work program doesn't need to be expanded to include these items.

Action item: ACMA to put together a document that summarises the gap analysis and details the items that are not captured in the work plan. This list would also be circulated to other working groups as some matters may fall better within their remit.

- The group discussed feedback received on the draft work program including the proposed Terms & Conditions (T&C) audit. The group noted that there were concerns about lack of clarity about scope of the audit, the entities covered, and specific interests of agencies. ACCC noted that they had undertaken these types of audits before, and they were quite resource intensive. Having a clear objective and scope for this work will also be important to the success of this work.
- The group agreed that the item 2.1 of the workplan be updated to be an exercise to scope a T&C audit. This scope would then be taken to the steering committee for further consideration (including potential resourcing for this project).

Action item: Members to seek feedback/views from their agencies on terms and conditions audits to inform a scoping discussion at the next working group meeting.

- The group agreed that the tasking and allocation of work would be discussed and agreed following the completion of scoping discussions on each project. It was also agreed that the work program would be updated within 3 months to reflect the agreed task allocation.
- The group discussed the research hub, specifically whether a separate GovTeams space should be created for the hub. No firm position was reached but the OAIC agreed scope the arrangements for the research hub on GovTeams.

Action item: JC to investigate arrangements for a potential research hub and report back to the group.

- The group discussed workstream item 3.1 (Digital platform dictionary). It was agreed that the digital platform dictionary will be a document internal to DP-REG members and relevant policy agencies.
- The ACMA noted that the other working groups have developed a Terms of Reference (TOR) and a draft had been circulated prior to the meeting.

Action item: Members to provide feedback on the TOR.

1. Introductions

- ACMA commenced the meeting. §47 introduced §47. JC introduced LL.

2. Action items

- The ACMA confirmed that all action items from the previous meeting had been completed.

3. Terms and conditions (T&C) audit

- §47 thanked all members for their feedback on the draft terms of reference and work plan. The documents were signed off by the Steering Committee with no changes.
- Members gave presentations on their experiences with T&C related audits. The key points from the presentations were:
 - All the audits were conducted for different purposes including to inform the development of consumer information, assess compliance with rules and gather evidence to inform reviews/inquiries.
 - All members discussed the importance of scoping audits and limiting the number of variables to keep audits manageable.
 - Several members noted that they developed criteria to determine the entities captured by their audits. These criteria included legislative requirements, industry/international developments, complaints statistics and usage data.
 - Audits can be extremely resource intensive. Some members discussed bringing in external consultants with legal expertise to assist. However, they may not have the subject matter expertise to complete the audit.
 - Detailed planning was important for a successful completion of an audit. Key areas highlighted the need to develop internal policies to effectively capture data, establish a small set of variables to consider and have clear objectives for the purpose of the audit (i.e. what will it inform?)
 - There may be some challenges in auditing platforms where accounts are required to conduct the audit.
 - Platform's policies may be technically compliant for the purposes for the audit, however they may not be consumer friendly. Accessibility and readability of terms and conditions were highlighted as challenges by several members.
- Members discussed scoping a potential joint DP-REG audit. The key points from the discussion were:
 - It would need to be clear that any audit was not a joint regulatory process or exercise.

- It would also need to be clear that DP-REG as a body have no power to process audit outcomes. Individual regulators would need to consider how any potential legal deficiencies or non-compliance identified would be handled.
 - Several members stated that they are interested in an audit focusing on the readability and accessibility of T&Cs.
 - Members discussed complaints handling as another potential area of focus for an audit. eSafety considered complaints as part of developing its eSafety guide but noted that this work may not be detailed enough for a terms and condition audit.
 - There would be a need to consider the final product resulting from the audit and whether it was something for public release.
- The members agreed that they would develop a scope for an audit focusing on accessibility of T&Cs in first stage for Steering Group consideration. The group would then consider developing an audit framework that members could use for their own audits in second stage.

Action item: ACMA to circulate a high-level outline for a potential T&C audit to members for feedback ahead of the next meeting.

4. Research hub

- JC gave an update on research hub. JC proposed that the research hub will be a community on GovTeams and members could determine who within their organisations could access hub.
- The group discussed the need to establish a structure to the library before it was established on GovTeams. There is also a need to clarify who is responsible for setting it up.
- s47 noted that the Department of Communications research mapping exercise could be a place to start. RK shared an example of research mapping work eSafety are currently undertaking.

Action item: eSafety to provide members with a copy of the eSafety data and insights hub.

Action item: ACMA to lead discussion on structure of the research hub at the next meeting.

5. Digital platform dictionary

- s47 noted that he will be contacting members shortly to seek their views on the objectives of the digital platforms dictionary (item 3.1 in the work plan).

1. Introductions

- ACMA commenced the meeting. WG members introduced themselves to guest attendees.
- s47E(c) noted that we will shift the date of the December meeting as Kate Boyd (new ACCC rep) doesn't work Mondays.

2. Action items

- The ACMA confirmed that all action items from the previous meeting had been completed. No comments or queries on previous minutes.


3. Structure of the research hub

- At the previous meeting this was proposed to be located separately in Gov Teams with the structure to be agreed.
- To aid discussion of a potential structure, an  [Overview of existing materials shared by members](#) was provided to DP-REG WG members. It included:
 - Examples of research structures provided by s47E(c)
 - Algorithm literature review provided by the Digital Technology working group.
- Members discussed key considerations for developing the structure for the research hub. Key points included:
 - An Excel spreadsheet is an easy way to capture information however multiple sheets may be considered if necessary.
 - Ideal to have a basic simple structure that is easy to read and not cumbersome to fill in.
 - While simplicity can be appealing, an overly simplified structure can reduce the flexibility in how the data can be cut and displayed. Need to be mindful of these trade-offs in the design.
 - Key criteria may include:
 - Name/Title
 - Author
 - Platform name
 - Publication date (date/time stamp)
 - Type (link, uploaded copy)
 - Format (Academic or Government research)
 - Descriptor/key terms (Topic, Harm, Subject, other)
 - Linking key (related research in that topic)
 - High level description/overview
- s47E(c) noted it would be good to give consideration of how best to integrate research for other current and future projects into a streamlined hub.

- There was a preference to model the database to be specific to DP requirements and to bring in topics of relevance to this project. Open option could be to have a central research data and then link to other specific databases (e.g. Algorithms literature review database) on the GovTeams home page.

Action item: ACMA to circulate a high-level outline of potential research structure to DP-REG WG for input ahead of next meeting.

4. Next steps for the Terms and Conditions audit scoping exercise

- Siobhan Bryan (Assistant director of the Assessments team) and David Moore (Director of the Assessments team) from the OAIC joined for the discussion of this item.
- s47 provided an overview of the discussion at the previous meeting and issues raised in the T&C scoping  [Outline document](#) (circulated prior to the meeting).
- The preference of Members was to conduct an audit rather than developing a framework, noting the potential resource impacts.
- Members discussed the issues for consideration in conducting a T&C audit.
 - The scope and framework for any considerations should reflect the available funding/resources.
 - A practical component to consider:
 - ‘Readability’ is harder in practice than theory (Accessibility is less challenging)
 - There will be a subjective element to the work that will be influenced by differing perspective and nuanced thinking by different regulators. These will require more time to consider and work through.
 - Several members agreed it would be good to have a deliverable/outcome at the end of the process.
 - The outputs should be fit for purpose and the intended audience. They could include 1) a published summary report that includes research, education and public assurance components and 2) an internal report that caters to individual regulator needs.
 - If the T&C audit surfaced any evidence of non-compliance, they may be referred to a relevant regulator’s enforcement teams. For example, OAIC may review any potential breach of the Privacy Act (although this is generally more limited to privacy policies than T&Cs).
 - Potential timeframe for work would be at least 6 to 8 months, noting limited staff availability in December and January. The timings will in part be determined by the scope and proposed approach (e.g. the number of platforms and depth of the review). Additional time (e.g. 2 to 3 months) should also be allowed for report writing.
 - The audit objectives should be firmly established as they will inform the criteria/key areas of focus. Given differing Regulator priorities, aligning these will be challenging.
 - As a shared project, the number of platforms audited could be divided amongst the 4 DP-REG WG agencies (i.e. 2 platforms per regulator = minimum of 8 in total).
 - High-level results from the ACMA Digital Platforms complaints research will be available ahead of the next meeting and will provide some insights into the platforms to include in the audit. Using a ‘most popular with Australians,’ criteria for selecting platforms was discussed.
 - OAIC noted the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data in Hong Kong regulator did a similar exercise. An overview of their ‘Comparison of Privacy setting of 10 Social Media Platforms’ is available here on pages 7/8: [Social media platforms.pdf \(pcpd.org.hk\)](#). Also see [PCPD Releases](#)

- Members discussed that a proposal could be made to the Steering group for DP-REG WG to conduct a small audit with a small public facing summary report (subject to the findings). An update to the Steering group will also include potential resourcing implications.

Action item: ACCC to provide resourcing information from for a previous audit conducted for ACCC (by consultant from a Law firm) ahead of next meeting.

5. Digital platform dictionary objectives

- s47 thanked all members for their input to the [Digital platforms dictionary - Objectives scoping.docx \(sharepoint.com\)](#). Objectives, terms and purpose were well aligned.
- s47 noted there was no intent for public release of the dictionary and regulators could use the terms publicly when/if suitable. Members supported this approach agreeing external release of the dictionary would provide limited benefits.
- The dictionary could exist as a living document to be updated as established terms evolve or new terms emerge.
- Once finalised, regulators would be encouraged where possible to use the DP Dictionary language and definitions for both internal and external communications.
- JC noted that the OAIC intentionally did not include some terms in the DP Dictionary that are inconsistent across legislation. 'Consent', 'and 'Personal information' are key examples of terms that are fundamental to the Privacy Act and also relevant to DP work.
- s47 suggested any terms relevant to DP should be included in the DP dictionary. The legislated definitions may be adopted or adapted for in the context of this project.
- For any terms where a regulator does not have an 'official' definition, text could be added to this effect: 'The ACMA does not have a current definition but refers to 'X' as....'
- A broad list of terms can be developed first then reduced if identified as not needed.

Action item: – ACMA to circulate an initial list of common terms for DP-REG WG to add definitions.

6. Agency updates

- DA: [Digital platform services inquiry - September 2022 interim report - Regulatory reform | ACCC](#) was released on Friday.
- JC: OAIC noted recent activity related to the Privacy Legislation Amendment (Enforcement and Other Measures) Bill 2022. Angelene appearing this week sometime in front of Committee.
- Angelene Falk was at the Global Privacy Assembly last month which passed a resolution on principles and expectations on the appropriate use of personal information in facial recognition technology. OAIC is a sponsor for the resolution which is a good development.
- s47: ACMA questionnaire on Digital Platforms complaints (commented on by DP-REG WG) is in field with preliminary results expected to be available for the next meeting. s47 Some results of the 2022 ACMA Annual Consumer Survey are scheduled for publication in December.

Action item: ACMA to circulate preliminary results from Digital Platforms complaints research to DP-REG WG members once available.

7. Other business

- No other business raised.

1. Introductions

- ACMA commenced the meeting. KB introduced herself.

2. Barriers to information sharing

- The Chair noted that there is deliverable in our workplan to develop a guidance paper to various legislative, contractual, technical, and administrative barriers to sharing data, and ways they could potentially be addressed.
- The Chair noted that the previous gap analysis had identified a range of legislative, contractual, and technical sharing barriers, as well as some potential ideas for improvement. eSafety had put forward an idea to develop a process around sharing data including security and data handling requirements.
- The group noted that gov teams could be useful tool to share data, noting caveats.
- The Chair noted that the ACMA would develop and circulate a high-level outline for the guidance paper, drawing upon the information in the previous gap analysis for working group input.
- The group agreed that all working group members catalogue what their data sharing limitations are and update the outline of the guidance paper when available. The group also agreed that members will look to see if there are any templates that can be used to develop a data sharing procedure.

Action item: the ACMA to develop an outline of the guidance paper and circulate to working group.

Action item: all members to develop ideas for pilot projects for ways to overcome barriers for information sharing.

Action item: all members to review guidance paper outline and provide input with a particular focus on legal barriers to data sharing.

Action item: all members to identify documents and templates that can be used to help develop a data sharing procedure and help inform any potential pilot projects.

3. Research hub

- The group discussed the research hub. The Chair thanked everyone for reviewing the draft research hub structure. The group agreed that there is value in having primary platform and secondary platform field. It was noted that it would be useful to list multiple platforms in the secondary platforms field.
- The group agreed that they are happy with the hub structure, subject to members comments in the draft document being adopted.
- The group agreed that the working group would set up separate GovTeams site and develop guidance documents for how to use the research hub. JC volunteered to set up hub in GovTeams.

- The group discussed ways of tracking usage of the research. No firm position was reached but it was noted that there are several possible ways of tracking usage.
- The group also noted that it may have to house other databases such as algorithms literature database. This would be considered in the final design of the hub.

Action item: s47 to update draft research hub structure to reflect everyone's comments (including a comments field).

Action item: JC to set up hub in GovTeams.

4. Data dictionary

- The group discussed the data dictionary. The Chair noted that there may be multiple definitions of terms in the dictionary and asked the working group what the best way is to determine what the best definition of a term is.
- MI noted that where the dictionary has multiple definitions, the group can examine both definitions and determine if the group is happy to use one or more definitions.
- s4 noted that it might be a good idea to create an agreed non-legislative definition and to also note where there are definitions that are written in legislation.
- The group agreed that the ACMA will go through the existing list of terms to code the definitions to identify those that have no definition, one definition and multiple definitions. The group agreed to set up a short discussion in the new year to work through the terms where there are multiple definitions.

Action item: ACMA to go through existing terms in dictionary and code the terms based on number of definitions.

Action item: ACMA to set up a short discussion in the new year to work through the terms where there are multiple definitions.

5. Complaints research

- s47 presented the initial results of part 1 of the complaints research. The questionnaire on part 2 will be circulated to members for feedback shortly, with a request for feedback before the end of the year.

Action item: s4 to circulate definition of harmful content used in the survey.

Action item: s4 to circulate part 2 questionnaire to members for feedback.

6. Terms and condition (T&C) audit

- The group discussed the T&C audit. The Chair noted that the DP-REG Regulator Heads were extremely interested in the audit.
- JC noted that the Regulator Heads commented that following the loss of the ACCC's Google case, readability and comprehensibility of T&Cs will be important.
- The Chair thanked KB for sharing documents on the ACCC's previous audit. These documents were updated to GovTeams earlier in the day and suggested that members review.
- The Chair noted that if an external provider can be procured, an audit could be achievable. However, the working group needs to determine how funding and procurement of the audit could work across members before finalising a proposal to the Steering Group. One regulator may need to lead a procurement however it is unclear whether there is an easy mechanism for members to contribute funding to the project.
- The group agreed that all members would investigate how the T&C audit would be funded and paid for.

1. Introductions

- The Chair commenced the meeting. The Chair welcomed AK and AS.

2. Previous action items

- The Chair noted that December and January had been a busy time and as a result, some of the action items hadn't progressed as expected.
- The group discussed the action item about potential arrangements for collectively paying for a consultant to assist with the terms and conditions audit. RK stated that he contacted eSafety's finance team but hadn't received firm position. While KB hadn't had a chance to speak to their Finance, KB noted that ACCC budget is tight. The Chair stated that the initial position from ACMA's finance area was that one agency would lead the procurement and then invoice the other agencies for their share. JC noted that there have been initial discussions with his EL2 on how costs would be split but there hasn't been a discussion with OAIC Finance.

3. Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey presentation

- AK and AS gave a presentation on the upcoming Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey.
- The objective of the survey is to provide insights on Australians' attitudes towards privacy, understand the changes in Australians' attitudes and behaviours over time and identify awareness of and concern about emerging privacy issues.
- The findings will be used to assist the OAIC across its policy, compliance, and communications initiatives
- The new survey will seek to ask questions about 6 main themes:
 - General knowledge, awareness
 - Legal considerations
 - Fair and reasonable
 - Privacy breaches
 - Biometrics

- Children
- This year's survey will introduce new questions on whether platforms practices are fair and reasonable, moving away from consent. The survey will also include questions on Artificial Intelligence and biometrics for the first time.
- The survey also seeks to understand harms from privacy breaches and community attitudes on what organisations should do to minimise harms from privacy breaches.
- OAIC will seek feedback from DP-REG on the survey questions in mid-February. The tight timeline and turnaround time for the questionnaire was foreshadowed (2-3 days).
- The OAIC expects to soft-launch the top-line results of the survey during Privacy Awareness week in early May with the full results likely released sometime in June.

Action item: OAIC to circulate slides to DP-REG members to share with colleagues within their individual regulators.

Action item: DP-REG members to provide feedback on survey questionnaire when survey is circulated by OAIC.

4. Data dictionary

- **s4** presented the findings of the analysis of the dictionary terms. **s47** proposed that that each member of the working group will be responsible for developing the definition an allocated number of terms in the dictionary. Once the definition has been drafted, the working group will decide whether to accept the definition. The group agreed with **s47E** proposal.
- **s4** proposed that each agency be responsible for defining at least 15 terms. The group agreed with this proposal.

Action item: **s4** to send out request for Members to identify terms that they would like to define for Member action.

5. Update on each agency's research plans for 2023

- The Chair noted that the ACMA's research priorities will be the current platforms complaints research and the next Annual Consumer Survey, scheduled for fieldwork in June 2023. ACMA will also be carrying out research into metaverse. Another focus for the ACMA is piloting its draft news measurement framework. The draft framework is currently out for consultation.
- JC stated that ACAP survey would be big research item for OAIC in 2023.
- KB noted that most of the ACCC's digital platforms research is tied to Digital Platforms Inquiry (DPI) but to date they haven't commissioned any additional research. KB stated that ACCC enforcement is conducting a sweep of social media influencers to investigate patterns of misconduct and the prevalence of non-disclosure of advertising. This work will feed into the 6th DPI report. KB noted that the ACCC is also planning on doing case studies for the 7th DPI report – likely to be on ecosystems of products and services, though the topics haven't been decided yet.
- **s47** noted that he was unable to provide an update at the meeting but noted that a representative from eSafety's research team may be joining the group at the next meeting..

Action item: eSafety to provide update on their research plans at the next meeting.

6. Recap and way forward for 2023

- The Chair noted that the working group will be seeking to update the DP-REG steering group on the Working Group's progress against its work plan at a future steering group meeting. The ACMA will develop a stocktake about where we were at against the workplan..

Meet and Greet / introductions

- ACCC commenced the meeting and all attendees introduced themselves

Review of the scope of the working group

- ACCC noted that there are three areas outlined in the internal work plan. The most relevant to this working group was exploring new and emerging digital issues, as well as agency coordination.
- ACCC noted that the working group will need to deliver against the communicate as well as the internal work program.

How will we work together

- Following a discussion yesterday between working group chairs, the working group have decided to use 'GovTeams' as their collaboration tool. Each agency will be an owner of the GovTeams community – with one community for all three working groups.
- ACCC suggested that meetings should be monthly ranging from an hour to an hour and a half in length and virtual, given that representatives are based in different states.

Initial thoughts

- **Algorithms** - Attendees agreed that there should be a standalone work stream on algorithms. A potential deliverable could be an interagency workshop that covered existing work in the area.
- **Tech trends report** - eSafety noted that they will have a *Tech Trends Report* due near year end and would like to share some of that work with the group.
- **News sharing** - The attendees discussed how the working group could share information on news review any international developments in the digital technology space.
- **Horizon scanning** –
 - The working group generally agreed to a workstream on horizon scanning. This could involve engaging experts and the working group brainstorming and discussing new issues.

- ACCC raised the idea of using the group to complete short research projects on specific topics. This would involve understanding the relevant technology, how it is used and what competition, consumer, privacy or eSafety concerns could arise. From this the group would then identify if these topics need further or immediate attention. A template could be developed to structure this work. This could result in the preparation of short summary documents.
- The working group generally supported this approach, and the development of a standard template.
- **External engagement:** The working group discussed the best approach to external engagement, including potentially sharing information on existing engagements, identifying future events, and directly engaging with other stakeholders. The group discussed DP-REG led engagement with specific firms (e.g. TikTok) and discussed the need to be involved with different and diverse perspectives. The group also discussed potential engagement with academics, thinktanks, and institutions. This may be informed by the horizon scanning.

Summary of items arising from working group meeting:

- The work plan is to be circulated before the next meeting on 9 September 2022 and settled between working group participants before the steering committee on 16 September 2022. The workplan will reflect the discussion today regarding work on algorithms, horizon scanning and a template, and external engagement.

- ACMA noted it recently presented on misinformation/disinformation on ANU national security council.

eSafety

- eSafety noted it sent out Basic Online Safety Expectations (**BOSE**) notices to several digital platforms last week and provided the associated [media release](#).
- eSafety is looking at immersive technology and its impact on young people and children and referred to workshops with project Rockit and Meta.
- eSafety noted an ANU school of cybernetics workshop taking place in Sydney this week.
- eSafety noted a safety in the metaverse week event that will take place later in the year. The format is still to be determined but an invite will be shared.

OAIC

- s37
- OAIC noted the upcoming Global privacy assembly October meeting and that the OAIC will monitor this meeting for relevant developments.
- OAIC noted a special leave hearing in the high court on 16 September in relation to jurisdiction over the American Facebook entity.

ACCC

- ACCC noted that it has shared information relating to some recent international work and upcoming events on the Metaverse with the group since the last meeting. The ACCC will attend upcoming events on the Metaverse and provide an update at the next meeting.
- ACCC noted that social media will be the topic for the sixth interim report of the digital platform services inquiry.

CSIRO/Data 61 session on AI/algorithms

The Chair provided some background on the engagement with the CSIRO. The group agreed to focus on addressing the substance of the work plan before addressing this agenda item (which would discuss possible areas of focus and timing on the engagement with CSIRO).

Work plan

The Chair noted the purpose of the meeting is to discuss the work plan document and noted the intention to provide the draft work plan to the steering committee ahead of its 16 September meeting.

General comments

On general comments, the group discussed various issues, including the framing of the work plan, the inclusion of a terms of reference, measuring success and assigning leads to workstream. The Chair noted an action item to create a short terms of reference document for the working group which would accompany the work plan. An action item was noted to amend the work plan to note that the Chair will maintain a running record of our work. It was decided that leads would not be assigned at this point, but they may be allocated in future.

Workstream 1 – Algorithms

The group discussed algorithms work, including its scope. An early priority would be developing a shared understanding of our regulatory interest/s related to algorithms. The group agreed to amend the work plan to focus on algorithms in the first half of the year. The work plan will be amended with a workshop on algorithms taking place in October 2022, followed by the meeting on an algorithms literature review in November. The October workshop will consist of 15-minute presentations from each agency and some time will be scheduled to discuss the literature review. Each agency will then work on the literature review before the November meeting, with further work to aim to complete it by the end of the year.

The group discussed the importance of producing outputs from this work and it was agreed that a record of the workshop would be kept (e.g., a summary minute and associated powerpoint presentations) and a written record of the literature review.

With regard to monitoring news and developments in algorithms, eSafety and ACCC both noted they could share existing spreadsheets they have developed internally. ACMA agreed to check with the Data Working Group what their research hub tool is, with a view to potentially using it, though the group agreed to use existing spreadsheets for now.

Workstream 2 – Horizon scanning

There were no substantive comments on this proposed workstream in the work plan. Given the agreed changes to the timings of workstreams, the work plan will reflect that scoping for horizon scanning will take place in January followed by the horizon scanning workshop at the February meeting.

Workstream 3 – Analysis of technologies

The group discussed the pilot template and how it may evolve over time, the terminology describing the workstream, possible topics for analysis and the number of topics that may be considered during the year, though a decision was not made.

Workstream 4 - External engagement

The group provided feedback on the proposal in the work plan, discussing the appropriate level of engagement with external stakeholders between working groups and the steering committee, the purpose of engagement and the focus on engagement relevant to digital technologies for this group, as well as noting the need for a distinction in the work plan between proactive and reactive engagement. The Chair agreed to revise Workstream 4 to reflect the discussion before re-circulating the draft work plan.

Next steps and next meeting

The Chair outlined the next steps to complete the draft work plan ahead of Steering Committee. This included the ACCC updating and re-circulating the draft work plan by 7 September, with comments due on 8 September and submission taking place on 9 September.

Given the meeting ran over time, the Chair requested that members email with their ideas on engagement with the CSIRO and noted that a specific meeting at a later date could be arranged to discuss this if necessary.

It was agreed that the Algorithms Workshop should take place on a Wednesday morning in mid-October (and similar for the November meeting), the Chair will follow up with proposed dates.

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting and the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Agency updates including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACMA

- ACMA noted it is soon to be attending an International Institute of Communications (IIC) event in Ottawa on media harmonisation and regulation.
- ACMA also noted it would be attending a DRCF Web 3.0 briefing on 18 October 2022.

eSafety

- eSafety noted it’s Commissioner presented to the Trans-Tasman Business Circle on the Metaverse in early September and that the link to this is now available.
- eSafety noted a Ministerial presentation at a recent RMA meeting.
- eSafety noted an upcoming IEEE Tech Forum event on 24 October 2022. eSafety also noted a tech UK online program regarding Web 3.0 and the Metaverse to be held on 25 October 2022.

OAIC

- OAIC noted it will be attending some upcoming meetings. It also noted that the High Court had granted special leave in Meta proceedings on 16 September. A date for the hearing is still to be confirmed.
- OAIC noted this was to be s47E(c)

ACCC

- ACCC noted it had shared the 5th report with Treasury and were preparing for briefings with various policy departments regarding the report. The date of publication of the report is unclear at this stage.
- ACCC noted the announcement of the Bragg inquiry into the role of international big tech in our society and economy. ACCC noted its 6th interim report on social media is currently progressing, and that an update regarding recent events attended by ACCC on the metaverse was circulated in advance of the meeting.

Opening of algorithms workshop

The purpose of these workshops was to collate and synthesise the different working group members existing knowledge of algorithms.

ACCC

- ACCC presented on algorithms particularly noting their effect on competition and consumer harms and its work to date on algorithms. ACCC noted the internal expertise of its Strategic Data Analysis Unit (SDAU) and referred members of the working group to the appendix of its presentation for further detail of cases discussed in its presentation.

OAIC

- OAIC provided its presentation on algorithms, noting some of the information presented is based on findings that are currently under appeal. It presented on algorithms with a specific focus on the *Privacy Act* and personal information.
- OAIC also discussed the Australian Privacy Principles (**APP**), noting how privacy can impact other rights. It noted that its algorithms work relates to guidance work, engagement with government, determinations and international engagement.
- OAIC noted a *Privacy Act* review is currently being conducted, which is specifically considering reforms to automated decision making and other reforms which may impact algorithms.

eSafety

- eSafety provided its presentation on algorithms, noting that relevant legislation to its operations was updated last year. eSafety focussed on recommender systems, contention moderation algorithms and algorithmic transparency in its presentation.
- eSafety also noted current tech trends and challenges which underpin its work (<https://www.esafety.gov.au/industry/tech-trends-and-challenges>).
- eSafety noted it is looking to distribute a report on recommender systems by year end.

ACMA

- ACMA presented on algorithms noting the role of algorithms in the media and communications sector, how they shape the information environment, the associated benefits and risks, especially in the areas of access to content, protection against harms and scams.
- ACMA noted it does not currently have powers relating to algorithms and that it was in the early stages of learning about them, noting its oversight role through the voluntary Australian Code of Practice on Disinformation and Misinformation.

Discussion of areas of intersection

The working group discussed areas of intersection, noting transparency, regulation and bias, choice and control as key areas of intersection. A further list of intersecting areas is to be distributed among the working group.

Next steps including actions and allocation of future tasks and literature review

- ACCC agreed to share a list of relevant areas of intersection. It would also look to engage with the ACCC's in-house team with expertise in algorithms, the SDAU.
- The working group agreed to create a prioritisation matrix for topics to cover in the literature review.
- The Chair noted the next formal meeting in approximately six weeks' time, noting the working group should have a less formal meeting before this to undergo the prioritisation and allocation of tasks.
- The Chair noted another director from the ACCC will transition into her current position within DP-REG shortly.

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting, and the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACMA

- ACMA is hoping to receive new powers to help it combat mis- and dis-information. ACMA is hopeful the Minister will make a statement before the end of the year, ahead of a possible exposure draft in the new year.

eSafety

- eSafety is currently finalising a position statement on algorithms and recommender systems. This will likely be published in next couple of weeks, so by our next meeting eSafety should be able to give more of an update on it.

OAIC

- The [Privacy Legislation Amendment \(Enforcement and Other Measures\) Bill](#) has been introduced to Parliament and is currently before the Senate. If passed, this Bill would:
 - Increase the maximum penalty for serious or repeated interferences with privacy to match those in the [Competition and Consumer Act](#).
 - Grant enhanced enforcement powers to the OAIC, including by strengthening the notifiable data breaches scheme and allowing enforcement against foreign companies that carry on a business in Australia, even if they do not collect or hold Australians’ information from an Australian source
 - Enhance the Commissioner’s information-sharing powers (which could make it easier for the OAIC to share information with DP-REG colleagues).
- The OAIC co-sponsored a [Resolution on Principles and Expectations for the Appropriate Use of Personal Information in Facial Recognition Technology](#) at the Global Privacy Assembly last month. The OAIC noted that such technology is often powered by algorithms.
- The OAIC has been in discussions with TikTok about a potential meeting, which could include a discussion of how its algorithms work. Other agencies expressed

interest in hearing more about this and/or being included in it, including the ACCC whose team working on the upcoming Social Media Report would likely also be interested in this.

ACCC

- The ACCC noted its 5th interim report of the DPSI was published on 11 November 2022 and that work on the 6th report is underway.
- The ACCC's Kate Reader (along with the OAIC's Sarah Ghali) spoke at the IAPP ANZ Privacy Summit this week.

Algorithms Literature review

The ACCC noted it had shared three documents before the meeting to talk through in relation to the literature review. These were a database, a template setting out the format for conducting the review, and a set of timelines and milestones.

Database

- The group discussed a number of outstanding issues in relation to the format of the database, including the approach to noting relevant categories of harm and algorithm types. It was agreed that up to three columns could be used for identifying categories of harm, with additional categories of harm or further explanations to be noted in the 'Other comments' box or in the 'Key findings' column.
- In terms of articles that discuss harms arising from more than one algorithm type (e.g. both recommender system algorithms and targeted advertising algorithms), it was agreed the **ACCC** would add a 'General' category to the relevant dropdown menu, with further information to be provided in the 'Other comments' box where necessary.

Format of written literature review

- The ACCC ran through a summary of the template. In the discussion that followed, the group clarified that the core aim of the literature review was to highlight the key risks and harms associated with algorithms as opposed to regulatory initiatives responding to these harms. It was agreed that text at the beginning of the regulatory initiatives section should reflect that the regulatory initiatives noted are examples and that this section is not meant to be exhaustive, nor does it aim to evaluate these initiatives.
- The group also noted the possible option of presenting the regulatory initiatives section in a table format and that the structure of the section could change depending on how the literature review pans out – e.g. rather than 'Australian' and 'International' the initiatives may be broken down by the types of reforms or the harms they address.

Milestones and timelines

- The ACCC provided an overview of proposed timelines for the literature review. **ACCC** agreed to add the dates of upcoming Steering Committee meetings to the Milestones and Timelines document, with a brief update provided to Steering Committee on 2 February and the final output provided to Steering Committee on 24 March.
- The group also clarified that the first draft (due on 27 January) would not include Section 4 (conclusions/next steps). Rather, this will be discussed at the February meeting and subsequently included by the ACCC in the second draft. As for section 3 on regulatory initiatives, first drafts should include notes on possible initiatives for inclusion, with this section being discussed at the February meeting and formalised in the second draft.

- With these amendments, the group agreed to the milestones and timelines presented. The next step is for each lead to produce a first draft of their section by 27 January 2023. **ACCC** noted an action item to follow up with invites for working group meetings on 8 February and 2 March 2023.

DITRDCA and Home Affairs questions for DP-REG Steering Committee on Algorithms (25 November 2022)

- The OAIC provided context around DITRDCA and Home Affairs' interest in algorithms, and the ACMA noted that Home Affairs now has a dedicated team working on algorithms.
- The ACCC suggested that at Friday's Steering Committee meeting, it would be good to clarify what our working group means when we talk about algorithms, as this may be different to what DITRDCA and Home Affairs have in mind.
- It was agreed that we should manage expectations and continue to make clear that we are still in the early stages of our work and that the focus of this working group is on building capacity and common understanding, not creating or publishing external-facing work.
- The group discussed its approach to sharing outputs with DITRDCA/Home Affairs and publication. Some members noted a potential willingness to share the final output with DITRDCA and/or Home Affairs if requested, provided their expectations are managed appropriately as to the nature and scale of this work. Members agreed to assess the views of their SES on these issues and to liaise via email before Steering Committee on 25 November.
 - [NOTE: Subsequent email exchange between agencies agreed to share this work, subject to appropriately managing expectations]

Next steps/Date of next meeting

- It was agreed that a date towards the end of the week commencing 12 December would be best. The **ACCC** agreed to suggest some possible times via email.

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting, and the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACMA

- The ACMA noted that in the mis- and dis-information space, it expected the review report on the *DIGI Code of Practice on Disinformation and Misinformation* would be published before the end of the year.
 - Since the meeting, DIGI completed this review on **22 December 2022** and [published the report on its website](#).
- ACMA also said it expected a ministerial announcement soon that would give more information about ACMA’s proposed new powers in relation to mis- and disinformation.

eSafety

- eSafety noted it had recently published its [position statement on recommender systems and algorithms](#) and that s47E(c) [redacted] had circulated a copy to members of the working group.
- eSafety also noted a possible next position statement topic might relate to ‘generative AI’ such as ChatGPT and Dall-E.

OAIC

- The OAIC noted the [Privacy Legislation Amendment \(Enforcement and Other Measures\) Bill](#) had received Royal Assent on **12 December 2022**. This legislation enhances the OAIC’s information-sharing powers, which may facilitate collaboration with other agencies (such as via DP-REG) in future.
- The amendments also enhanced the OAIC’s compulsory information-gathering powers in respect of notifiable data breaches.

ACCC

- The ACCC noted its understanding that the Government would commence consultation on Interim Report No. 5 of the DPSI shortly.
 - [Consultation on this report has since commenced](#), and submissions to the Consultation Paper will be open until **15 February 2023**.
- Other ongoing ACCC priorities include working on the sixth report, which is due in March 2023 and focuses on social media, as well as work on a draft DITRDCA options paper on mandating free-to-air prominence on smart TVs.

Notes from the DP-REG heads of agency meeting

- The Chair shared some updates from the Heads of Agency meeting, minuted separately.

Algorithms Literature review

- All agencies gave an update on their internal processes for completing the literature review, and noted that they were on track with their plans to have a first draft of their respective sections completed by 27 January 2023.
- It was also agreed that each agency has the discretion to decide which articles to prioritise and focus on the articles it thinks are of the most relevance to the working group, and to exclude articles they don't think add much value.

Discussion of work stream 2 – horizon scanning

Brainstorming session (item 2.1 in the work plan)

- In line with the work plan, this work stream is set to begin with a directed brainstorming session led by the ACCC as Chair of this working group.
- Members agreed it would be beneficial for each agency to go into this session with some potential ideas or areas of interest to focus on.
- To assist with this, the ACCC noted that closer to the date of this session, it could:
 - prepare a form/table where members could input possible topics for consideration. An example format of this might be:
 - Topic – Stage of development – Potential issues – State of regulation
 - prepare and circulate some questions for the group to consider and provide input on ahead of the session to help guide the discussion.
- No issues were raised with these preliminary suggestions, and it was agreed it would be best to come up with some thoughts beforehand and then use the session to rank or prioritise them and decide what the report could look like.
- All parties noted they would likely invite other colleagues from their respective agencies to attend and participate in the virtual brainstorming session.

Horizon-scanning report/summary (item 2.2)

- The 'report' will be a summary note of the brainstorming workshop. It will include identifying which areas are of the greatest interest and why.
- The working group will have a follow-up meeting once this note has been prepared, to choose the topic of our pilot study (workstream 3) and the questions it will address.
- All parties noted they were happy with this report being an internal document or file-note rather than a more formal output. It would be something we would take to the Steering Committee to ask whether they have any issues with our chosen topic.
- It was suggested and broadly agreed that we could use the word 'summary' instead of 'report' to better reflect the nature of this document.

Discussion of workstream 3 – pilot study

- The ACCC referred to a draft template document it had put together and suggested the output of the study could be around 4 to 6 pages answering the prompts in a final version of that template. The working group would meet to discuss and confirm the questions we would like to answer as part of the pilot study. The plan is to finalise this template at the brainstorming meeting in early 2023.
- The ACCC noted the output for the pilot study would likely be similar to eSafety's recent position statements, but about half the length and hence less detailed.
- Questions to be answered as part of the study could include:

- a description of the chosen technology, how it works, projected trends in usage and potential benefits/concerns in each regulator's area of expertise
- some notes from each agency on any work they have already commenced or completed that is relevant to the technology
- some notes on international reports, and
- some suggestions on whether DP-REG or individual agencies should undertake any future work on the topic.
- Regulators would split up the questions and identify benefits and concerns within our remits. The template would be both a scoping document and a deliverable.
- It was agreed that a sensible approach could be to set up a 'template set' of generic questions that can apply to any technology, with the flexibility to add in more specific questions based on the topic chosen. This was based on an ACMA suggestion that a consistent look and feel could help streamline the process and make it easier to copy across some elements of it should we end up doing multiple technology reviews.
- In terms of timeframes, it was agreed that we could potentially formalise and approve our template for this workstream at the inter-agency workshop currently proposed for 24 March 2023. We would then approve the final document around the start of June and subsequently share it with the Steering Committee. We can adjust these dates slightly as necessary based on the finalised dates of Steering Committee meetings.

Other business

RMIT presentation on search engines

- The ACCC noted it had been approached by Mark Sanderson, an academic from RMIT in Melbourne who has a small team of PhD students conducting a qualitative analysis of search engines. Prof Sanderson has offered to give a presentation at the ACCC's Melbourne office in February 2023 and said he would be happy for ACCC and other DP-REG people to dial in virtually as well.

Twitter

- ACMA noted that Twitter had formally disbanded its Trust and Safety Council, and asked if any other agencies had engaged with Twitter representatives recently.
 - The ACCC agreed to check with its Report 6 (social media report) team and subsequently sent through an email summarising a meeting this team had had with Twitter representatives on 28 November 2022.

Next steps/Date of next meeting

- The next meeting of this working group is currently scheduled for **8 February 2023**. It will centre on a discussion of our first-draft algorithms literature review work.

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting, and the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACMA

- The Government [has announced plans to legislate](#) new ACMA powers around oversight of mis- and disinformation. The ACMA is hopeful an exposure draft of this legislation will be released around April 2023, followed by a Bill in winter.
- In January, the ACMA opened consultation on a new [framework for measuring news media diversity](#). Submissions close on 17 March 2023.
- The ACMA recently met with its counterparts in the EU to discuss their experience with the Digital Services Act.
- The ACMA noted there has been some initial discussion around possible amendments to the [Broadcasting Services Act 1992](#), including whether the [pre-election media blackout laws](#) in Schedule 2 should be extended to also cover the First Nations Voice to Parliament referendum and/or other referenda in future. Note that these laws currently do not apply to online advertising on digital platforms.

eSafety

- eSafety noted it had published a [transparency report](#) summarising the responses it had received on the first round of Basic Online Safety Expectations (BOSE) notices.
 - These notices were issued to 7 platforms – Apple, Meta, WhatsApp, Microsoft, Skype, Omegle and Snap.
- eSafety said it was now preparing to issue a second round of BOSE notices, keeping the focus on child sexual exploitation and abuse material for now. Relevantly for the working group, some of the questions in this next round may ask high-level questions about how algorithms and large language models are being used in this area.

OAIC


- The OAIC and ACCC mentioned they had received invitations from the Digital Regulation Cooperation Forum (**DRCF**, the UK’s DP-REG analogue) to its [Quantum Symposium](#) event on 28 February 2023. The ACCC noted it had requested a recording of this event, given the time difference, but it has since been confirmed that the event will not be recorded.
- The OAIC noted the [Enforcement and Other Measures](#) amendments to the *Privacy Act* came into effect on 13 December 2022. Separately, the OAIC has also recently published some privacy [guidance for not-for-profits](#).
- The High Court’s hearing of the OAIC case against Meta is set to begin on **7 March**. **[NOTE: Since the date of this meeting, the Attorney-General’s Department published its [Privacy Act Review Report](#) on 16 February 2023, [inviting consultation until 31 March](#) on what the Government’s response should be.]**

ACCC

- [Treasury's consultation](#) on the ACCC's 5th DPSI report has now closed. As well as Treasury's roundtables held on 8 and 10 February, the ACCC has been briefing a range of international counterparts on its recommendations.
- Work on the 6th report is underway, and after this meeting the ACCC shared some draft text about DP-REG from that report with the members of this working group.
- All members of this working group are also invited to the upcoming presentation from Mark Sanderson and his team at RMIT about search engines. Note that since this meeting, this presentation has been postponed to **8 March 2023** from 3 pm AEDT.

OAIC presentation – Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey (ACAPS)

Amy Kiely of the OAIC's Strategic Communications team delivered a presentation on the 2023 **ACAPS**, which is currently in the questionnaire drafting phase. Key points from this presentation are summarised in the slides and notes below.




Overview

ACAPS is a longstanding study to evaluate the perceptions and awareness of privacy.

First conducted in 2001, it provides longitudinal information on Australians' attitudes about key and emerging privacy issues and their experiences, as well as actions taken to protect their privacy.

The OAIC has commissioned Lonergan Research to conduct the 2023 survey.



Objectives

- Provide insights on Australians' attitudes towards privacy
- Understand the changes in Australians' attitudes and behaviours over time
- Identify awareness of and concern about emerging privacy issues
- Collect data to assist the OAIC across policy, compliance, and communications initiatives



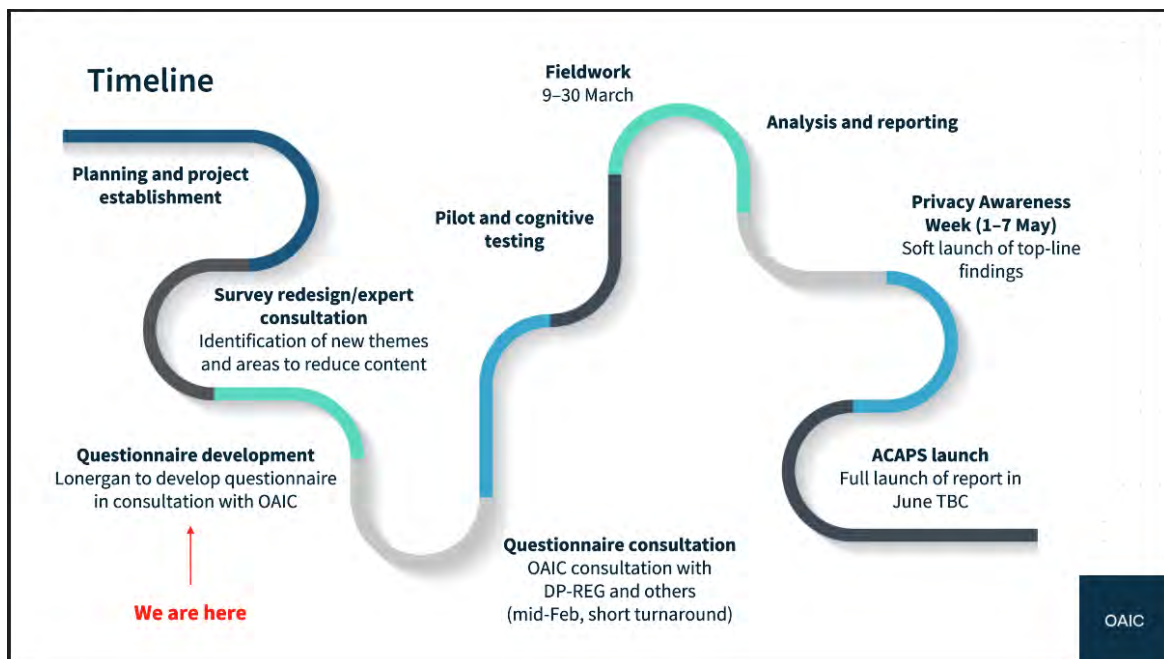

OAIIC

- In 2023, the survey questions will move away somewhat from a focus on notice and consent to consider what proactive privacy measures Australians think organisations should have in place (with a privacy policy being just part of this picture).
- The survey will also ask people whether they believe certain data collection and usage practices are fair and reasonable (such as organisations using AI to make decisions about people without their knowledge).



OAIIC

- The OAIIC said it intends to share the questionnaire with this working group around mid-February, but given tight timeframes and questionnaire budgets they will be seeking feedback on the framing of the questions rather than adding new questions.



- In response to questions from working group participants, the OAIC indicated:
 - the survey will be a nationally representative sample size of at least 1,500 people per module, for a total of around 4,500 people across all modules, and
 - it could potentially share relevant, de-identified survey data with this working group.

Algorithms literature review

Working group members discussed a possible structure for the literature review and next steps following the recently completed 'Draft 1' work.

Summary of discussion

[For a more detailed record, please refer to the 'Draft 2' document in GovTeams and the email dated **9 February 2023** from Eoin O'Connell to working group members].

- Members noted the overlaps in the harms identified by different regulators and agreed a strategy to address this.
- Members agreed to place each risk under an overarching theme – Fairness, Trust or Safety. The 'Draft 2' document in GovTeams includes a proposal for how to do this.
- Members agreed to progress work on section 3 (regulatory initiatives) as part of Draft 2. A table for recording these initiatives is included in the Draft 2 document.
- To save space, members agreed to reference using endnotes (not footnotes).
- The Draft 2 document in GovTeams also includes some minor comments and requests for clarification arising from Draft 1.

Next steps

1. Members will finalise Draft 2 work and upload it to GovTeams by **COB 24 February**.
2. The ACCC will then draft text to follow the table in section 3, along with the conclusion for the Literature Review, by **COB 1 March**.
3. This working group will meet on **3 March** to review draft 2 and finalise the Review.
4. The working group Chair will submit the finalised Literature Review to the DP-REG Secretariat ahead of the Steering Committee meeting on **24 March**.
5. The horizon-scanning workshop will occur on **27 March**, with a view to taking the pilot 'examination of technologies' document to the Steering Committee on 2 June.

Minutes prepared by the ACCC

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting and introduced Tyana to the working group, and the [minutes of the previous meeting](#) were approved, with one minor amendment from eSafety, which they agreed to make in the GovTeams version of the minutes.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACCC

- The ACCC noted that the 6th interim report of the Digital Platform Services Inquiry [was published](#) on the date of this meeting, 28 April 2023. This report features an updated analysis of the competitive and consumer landscape in social media, including some high-level findings from the ACCC's recent [influencer sweep](#).
- Also on the date of this meeting, the ACCC noted a colleague in its Digital Platforms Branch was attending a University of Sydney conference on LLMs and generative AI. The ACCC will seek to incorporate relevant insights from this conference into the LLMs pilot study.

ACMA

- The ACMA made reference to Senator Paterson's questions about the working group's proposed meeting with TikTok. This discussion is minuted under 'Other business' below.
- The ACMA noted it had begun some legislative drafting and was also finalising some letters to Discord, Pinterest, Telegram, WeChat, Twitch and Tumblr. It has also been asked to appear before the [Inquiry into the Voice Referendum](#).

eSafety

- eSafety advised its LLM position statement was likely to be completed in May, though there's no set timeframe on publishing it yet. eSafety is seeking to use different experts to the ones involved with the recent NSTC Rapid Response paper.
- eSafety said it had presented at a panel on Standards for the Metaverse on Wednesday 26 April, and had said the drafters of these standards could contact other DP-REG members to discuss any areas of overlap with their regulatory remits.
- Online Safety Act codes – industry groups provided redrafted codes focusing on 'class 2' material by early March, and the eSafety Commissioner is currently considering whether these meet community standards.
- In late March, eSafety provided Minister Rowland with [a roadmap for age verification technology](#), for the Government's consideration. The roadmap includes broad guiding principles, which eSafety will follow up with more detailed work. In terms of overlap with this group, eSafety believes this work may yield some insights into the use of age verification and biometric technology, and will share this with the group when able to do so.

OAIC

- The OAIC noted that [Privacy Awareness Week](#) this year would run from 1-7 May, the week after the meeting, involving some in-person sessions in Sydney, as well as some online ones.
- The OAIC has been engaging with the Australian Human Rights Commissioner and considering possible opportunities for collaboration, including on AI and the Metaverse.
- Submissions to the Attorney-General's Department's (AGD) Privacy Act Review report have now closed, and the Government is considering them. No submissions have been published on the AGD website yet, but some stakeholders have started to publish their own. The OAIC expects the AGD to eventually publish all submissions on its website.
- The OAIC gave an update on the Facebook matter, which has returned to the Federal Court.

Discussion of Pilot examination of technologies study on LLMs

See also: [Draft 2 of the pilot study and Timelines to complete the pilot study](#)

- Members all agreed they were happy with the overall structure of this document, subject to some suggestions from the OAIC and ACMA which they had added into the document.
- eSafety noted its Tech Trends team will also be looking at generative AI throughout the year.
- Members agreed to the proposed completion timeframes, which are intended to allow the working group to submit this pilot study to the Steering Committee by 26 May 2023, for their consideration at the 2 June meeting.
- The ACCC agreed to draft responses to the background questions at the start and the section on international developments, subject to additional input from other regulators. Members agreed to divide the remainder of the work based on their respective regulatory remits.
- Members agreed on an ideal length of 5-6 pages, and a maximum length of 10 pages.
- Note that the ACCC subsequently completed draft 2 of this study (linked above) on 5 May 2023 and opened it up to feedback from other members by **12 May**. This draft includes a proposed allocations of work and a slightly amended structure to reduce duplication.
- Members considered whether the working group should recommend that this work be published. While no final decision was made, no members expressed opposition to publication and there was broad agreement that the working group would be expected to publish at least one of the pilot study or the algorithms literature review.
- The ACMA noted the working group would eventually be publishing a 'year in review' paper reporting on our achievements this financial year, and suggested the literature review and this pilot study could be included as attachments to that.

Algorithms literature review

See also: [Current draft of the literature review following Steering Committee input](#).

Working group members discussed the possible publication of this work, including how and where it could be published, and whether it should be renamed. Key points of this discussion included:

- In terms of where to publish the literature review (and potentially the LLMs pilot study), one option discussed was a standalone DP-REG website. However, challenges noted with this approach included that one agency would likely need to host and manage the website.
- Regardless of where the literature review is published, members noted another point to consider in the coming weeks was the timing and drafting of a joint media release.
- The ACCC agreed to draft some wording for inclusion in the Steering Committee paper.
- Members agreed to hold off from getting the review in a 'ready to publish' state until after Steering Committee's final decision on publication.

- On an officer level, members broadly agreed they would be happy with the work being published (not for comment), though the ACMA and OAIC suggested renaming the document to manage expectations as to its scope and comprehensiveness.
 - Following this meeting, members discussed some possible alternative names in the GovTeams version of the document, linked above.
- To cut down on duplication and the level of work required, members agreed to split up the work of internally reviewing the literature review. The ACCC agreed to arrange for legal and economic review, and eSafety said it could handle the editorial side of things.
- Members agreed to add 'mini-conclusions' to their respective sections, in line with the Steering Committee's previous request to add detail on gaps and areas of future research.
- Members agreed to seek an out-of-session decision from their respective SES representatives on the Steering Group, to allow review work to be conducted ahead of the 2 June meeting.

RMIT and other academic consultation on LLMs

- Members agreed with the ACCC's suggestion to propose another session with Professor Sanderson and the other RMIT researchers we spoke to on 21 April, to allow us to discuss LLMs in more detail. This next session would be optional for non-ACCC members to attend, and it would likely take the form of a free-form discussion of up to 1 hour.
 - Subsequently, on 12 May David sent an email to the RMIT academics attaching the DP-REG presentation slides from the 21 April meeting and inviting the academics to another call on Monday 29 or Tuesday 30 May.

Other business

- In relation to TikTok's proposed virtual 'Transparency and Accountability Tour' into its use of algorithms and biometric identification:
 - The ACMA noted it had developed a response to Senator Paterson's questions
 - Members agreed to suggest Wednesday 24 May to TikTok as the most suitable date. Following this call, the ACCC emailed TikTok to propose 12pm on that date.
- The ACCC noted it was producing summaries of key submissions to the Senate [Inquiry into the influence of international digital platforms](#), and agreed to circulate these summaries with this working group. It subsequently did so via email from David on 3 May.
- Multiple agencies mentioned they were working on or had submitted their responses to a Department of Industry discussion paper on generative AI. The ACCC noted that its response had suggested removing the reference to DP-REG from figure 2 of the paper, because DP-REG is a coordination and collaboration mechanism without its own regulatory functions.

Next steps/action items

- ACCC to seek legal and economic review of the literature review, and to draft additional paragraphs discussing how it might be published.
- All members to discuss possible alternative names for the literature review.
- The ACCC to send through Draft 2 of the LLMs study, with all members to then collaborate on this work with a view to having it ready for Steering Committee review on 2 June.
 - The ACCC subsequently sent through draft 2 on 5 May, as linked above.

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting, and the [minutes of the previous meeting](#) were approved.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACCC

- s47C
- s47C
- 20 submissions to the ACCC’s Issues Paper for the 7th interim report of the Digital Platform Services Inquiry have now been [published on the ACCC’s website](#). The topic of this forthcoming report is the expanding ecosystems of digital platforms, with a focus on consumer cloud storage services and smart home devices. The published submissions include 4 from large digital platforms (Apple, Amazon, Google and Meta), as well as submissions from various industry participants such as Free TV and Family Zone.

ACMA

- The ACMA noted it is hopeful that exposure draft legislation will be released within the next two weeks or so for its [proposed mis- and disinformation powers](#).
- Also on the topic of mis- and disinformation, the ACMA noted it would be meeting with Twitch soon, as part of some engagement efforts to encourage platforms which are not currently signatories to the [existing DIGI Code](#) to sign up before the new powers come in.
- Following a restructure effective from 1 June 2023, s47E(c) will move to a different part of the agency and be replaced in this working group by s47E(c).

eSafety

- eSafety continues to progress work on its position statement on generative AI, and advised it intends to send out consultation requests in June 2023.
- eSafety also noted the [Government’s recent response](#) to the [Social Media and Online Safety Inquiry](#) called for an earlier than expected review of the *Online Safety Act*.

OAIC

- The OAIC noted the Australian Human Rights Commission has been consulting on a federal Human Rights Act for some time, and recently published a [position paper](#) outlining its proposal for this Act, including a proposed right to privacy.
- The OAIC also advised that the [Administrative Appeals Tribunal had substantially upheld](#) the Information Commissioner's decision that Clearview had breached the *Privacy Act* through its facial recognition AI technology, following an appeal by Clearview.
- The OAIC also gave a brief update on its ongoing enforcement matter against Facebook.

Discussion of Pilot examination of technologies study on LLMs

See also: [Draft 3 of the pilot study and Timelines to complete the pilot study](#)

- The ACCC thanked other members for their contributions to this document and gave an update on its progress, noting its aim to complete it and send it up for internal SES and Strategic Data Analysis Unit review in the week commencing 22 May 2023. The ACCC plans to have a clean version available towards the end of that week for other members to review.
- Regarding **s47E(c)** suggestion to improve the formatting, visual appeal and readability of the document, the ACMA noted its Editorial team may be able to help with this.
- In terms of whether the document should be published, eSafety noted Morag would like to review it before making a final decision on this. **ACTION ITEM: The ACCC suggested that members mark up any parts of the document that they wouldn't want to make public.**
- On referencing consistency, members agreed that the ACCC would trial replacing endnotes with hyperlinks to sources and see how it looks.
- Subsequently, on 25 May, the ACCC uploaded a third draft of this pilot study to GovTeams and circulated it via email to the working group, including a small number of final questions and suggestions for other members. In this draft, references have been standardised to endnotes for the reasons outlined via email.

Algorithms literature review/summary

See also: [Current draft of the literature summary ahead of June steering committee meeting](#)

- Members discussed possible new names for the literature review and settled on the term '**Literature summary**'.
- Members discussed whether an out-of-session decision could be taken to publish the literature summary, but it was ultimately determined that the decision on whether to publish it would be taken at the 2 June Steering Committee meeting, with the final sign-off on this to then be given by the Heads of Agency at their meeting scheduled for mid-June.
 - Members agreed, however, that future joint publications could be approved by Heads of Agency out of session.
- eSafety noted its Editorial team could conduct a grammar, style and formatting check of the study, but members agreed this should occur after the Steering Committee meeting.

Academic consultation on LLMs

- Members noted that by the RMIT next meeting booked on 29 May, the working group would have a finalised version of its LLMs study.
 - However, on 25 May the ACCC noted it could not send the full version of the document to RMIT because it includes content from the NSTC's Rapid Response Report, which is currently confidential within Government.

- The ACCC noted that Professor Kimberlee Weatherall had agreed to give a presentation about LLMs immediately after the Steering Committee meeting. The OAIC subsequently sent an invitation to this call from the DP-REG inbox. The presentation will be recorded.
- Members noted continued difficulties in arranging a call with Professor Amin Beheshti.

Upcoming meetings

- Members noted the TikTok meeting had been postponed, with a date of 16 June subsequently confirmed in late May.
- The ACCC and eSafety noted they were both working on 'back pocket briefs' on generative AI. Both agencies subsequently shared these briefs within the working group via email.

DP-REG workplan discussion

- Members noted that the existing DP-REG workplans and chairing arrangements would likely remain in place for a further 6 months from 1 July 2023.
- Following that, the ACMA noted its Chair had expressed a preference to align workplans to financial years, not calendar years.

Other business

- Multiple members noted they had provided feedback to DISR on 2 papers about generative AI – the Rapid Response Report by the National Science and Technology Council, and a separate DISR discussion paper. Both of these papers are currently confidential within Government, but the ACMA noted its understanding that the discussion paper would be published in late May 2023.
 - Following a subsequent meeting with DISR, the ACCC now understands both papers will be published together, on or about 31 May 2023.
- The ACMA noted Minister Rowland is considering holding an AI roundtable in the near future, and other agencies expressed interest in attending this.

Next steps/action items

- Members agreed to finalise work on the Algorithms Literature Summary and the Examination of Technology Pilot Study on LLMs ahead of the Steering Committee meeting.

Date of next meeting

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting, and the [minutes of the previous meeting](#) were approved.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACCC

- s47C
- The ACCC's noted its Issues Paper for the 8th interim report of the Digital Platform Services Inquiry is due to be released on Monday.
- The ACCC gave a brief update on its recent meetings with DITRDCA to discuss a potential voluntary or mandatory dating app code, and with the CRTC to discuss the news media bargaining code and Canada's draft regulations. David Abkiewicz will also be attending an Automated Societies Panel Discussion run by the ADM+S Centre on AI.

ACMA

- The ACMA noted public consultation on its exposure draft opened last week, and will run until 6 August. DITRDCA is leading briefings on the new powers with key stakeholders, and DP-REG members have been invited to one taking place next week.
 - The ACCC noted it will provide feedback to DITRDCA regarding overlaps with the ACL and some definitions in the exposure draft. **ACTION ITEM: The ACMA would like to receive a copy of the feedback.**
- The ACMA also noted it is working on Ministerial advice on the effectiveness of the mis/disinformation code, to be released next week. **Update: Advice was released on 25 July.**
- The ACMA advised it completed a study on the experiences of users who complained to platforms regarding the content they see. An interactive report will be released in the coming weeks.
- The ACMA noted it will be appearing at the Select Committee on Foreign Interference with DITRDCA and eSafety next Wednesday.
- The ACMA also noted the Online Gambling Committee released a report last month. Phase one of the recommended ban on advertising for online gambling involves prohibition of advertising on social media and online platforms.

eSafety

- eSafety noted it is overseeing the development of industry codes for extreme forms of content. Last month the Commissioner decided to register 5 codes which will come into effect in December, and eSafety will be developing mandatory standards for Relevant

Electronic Services and Designated Internet Services. A decision on search codes is yet to be made.

- eSafety also noted it issued reporting notices to Twitter under the Basic Online Safety Expectations, seeking information about how it is addressing hate speech on the platform. Twitter's response is due on 19 July. This work is becoming an area of focus for eSafety, and eSafety is conducting internal research and papers on the topic.
- eSafety advised it continues to progress work on its position statement on generative AI. **ACTION ITEM: eSafety will share with DP-REG for red line feedback shortly.** eSafety is looking to publish in August.

OAIC

- The OAIC noted it is preparing its individual submission to DISR's discussion paper.
- The OAIC noted it attended the International Network for Digital Regulatory Cooperation alongside other DP-REG members.
- The OAIC also advised it is finalising the ACAP survey results. **ACTION ITEM: OAIC to share findings when possible.**
- The OAIC noted it is continuing to engage with the AGD on the Privacy Act Review.
- The OAIC also gave a brief update on its ongoing enforcement matter against Facebook.

Algorithms literature summary

- Members discussed timing for publication and agreed to wait for the website to go live (sharing with interested agencies in the meantime). The OAIC noted microsite procurement requirements were underway and the site is likely to be live in a few months.
- eSafety noted its Communications team would review the document now, working to a two-week timeline in preparation for publication.
- Members discussed the group's level of engagement with DITRDCA and Home Affairs' project going forward. **ACTION ITEM: The group agreed to check in on updates for the project when we share a finalised version of the document.**
- Members noted comments made at the last Regulator Heads meeting on engagement and how we can feed into AI work more broadly. This can be considered in the group's updated workplan.

LLMs examination of technology

- The ACCC noted the document was last updated on 14 June and will need to be updated further, including making it consistent with the joint submission and noting why we have focused on LLMs as discussed at the last Heads of Agency meeting.
- Members discussed timing for publication and agreed to aim for mid-September given eSafety's position paper will be published in August.
- The ACCC noted it had no updates on the FOI process. **ACTION ITEM: ACCC to provide update to the group when possible.**
- Members also discussed the possibility of running the document past RMIT colleagues for comment.

DISR joint submission

- Members discussed the level of detail in the submission, and agreed to:
 - remove detailed points on risks that are covered in the LLMs document and position

- focus on DP-REG regulatory frameworks and applications.
- The OAIC noted it will submit a separate submission which will go into more detail on the Privacy Act Review.
- Members agreed to provide the draft LLMs document to DISR in a follow-up email after submission.

Feedback on 2022-23

- Members considered what has worked well over the past year, including:
 - strong rapport has been built between the working group members, and everyone has remained flexible in accommodating competing priorities and helping to progress work
 - the group has achieved a lot, aided by reaching consensus on topics at an early stage and effective coordination of projects (including clear timeframes and advanced notice)
 - the use of GovTeams has been helpful in progressing collaborative pieces
 - the workplan was scoped well, and has enabled the group to produce work that is relevant and of interest to other areas of Government. Information sharing sessions were also useful in the scoping process
- Members also discussed lessons learnt, including:
 - expectations management is crucial given each agency has different ways of working. Clarifying the purpose of each piece of work with Steering Committee and Heads of Agency from the outset (e.g. whether a piece is for an internal or external audience), such as circulating an outline for the DISR joint submission is good practice to ensure they are aware of and comfortable with the work being undertaken
 - resourcing has been higher than anticipated and there is a desire across all members to reduce the group's workload in the coming year. Large joint written papers like the algorithms literature summary may not be the most effective use of resources, and we could instead focus on simpler/shorter outputs like the LLMs paper
 - it will be worthwhile considering the extent to which outputs should be cleared by each member internally vs through the working group to ensure those processes don't conflict. Sufficient time needs to be factored in to align and work to reach a consistent position
 - the group should consider how it can better coordinate with/be informed by the work of other working groups, such as the data dictionary.
- **ACTION ITEM:** group to consider discontinuing the algorithms tracker (developed in drafting the algorithms literature summary) when updating next year's workplan.

2023-24 workplan discussion

- Members agreed to keep algorithms as a separate workstream given it is a useful avenue for demonstrating our consideration of the mechanical functions of digital platforms, along with the interest in potential follow up work from Heads of Agency.
- Members agreed to combine the horizon scanning and examination of technology workstreams for simplicity given they complement one another.
- Members considered focus on strategic engagement, noting the group has been good at engaging with academics and Government.
- Members suggested dedicating more time to reflection on what works well, and workshopping process improvements.

- Members discussed revisiting the list of topics for the next technology examination following finalisation of the LLMs document in September.
- Members also discussed revisiting the examination of technology template to ensure it is kept short.

Upcoming meetings

- Members noted the upcoming RMIT search engine symposium.

Other business

- eSafety noted members should coordinate in advance of senate appearances for the Big Tech Inquiry, with officer-level staff who are drafting briefings to meet towards the end of the month.

Next steps/action items

- Members to prepare the algorithms literature summary for publication.
- Members to update the LLMs document following submission of the joint submission.

Open Meeting and confirm minutes

The Chair opened the meeting, and the [minutes of the previous meeting](#) were approved (noting one adjustment made to the OAIC's update, amending reference to the International Network for Digital Regulatory Cooperation).

Brandon Harrington advised the group of his conflict of interest.

Agency updates, including attendance at any events and/or any upcoming events

ACCC

- Awaiting a response from the Government to the DPSI Regulatory Reform report recommendations. The recommendations may be considered at the end of August 2023.
- In an action brought by the ACCC, the Federal Court ordered two Meta subsidiaries, Facebook Isreal and Onavo Inc, to each pay \$10 million in penalties for engaging in conduct liable to mislead in breach of the Australian Consumer Law.
- The Minister for Finance Katy Gallagher assigned the ACCC responsibility for the Digital ID program; some of the Minister's public comments also flagged the potential establishment of a single digital regulator (the program delivery functions of such an entity are unclear).
- Met with the DISR and discussed their responsible AI consultation among other matters (noting the DISR had limited information to convey on the consultation to date as they have received a large number of submissions to the consultation and are extremely busy).

ACMA

- On 25 July 2023, the ACMA published [the second report to the Government](#) outlining its views on digital platforms' efforts under the voluntary Australian Code of Practice on Disinformation and Misinformation. The report includes visualisations of research on adult Australians' user experiences with reporting harmful content on digital platforms.
- Met with Adobe on the week commencing 31 July; Adobe presented their generative AI Firefly product; and discussed misinformation provenance issues (noting Adobe is a signatory to the DIGI Code of Practice on Disinformation and Misinformation).
- ACMA Chair Nerida O'Loughlin and Deputy Chair Creina Chapman met with the Minister for Communications Michelle Rowland to discuss misinformation and disinformation issues.

eSafety

- Finalised its position statement on generative AI to coincide with the DP-REG Digital Technology Working Group's Commissioners attendance at the [International Institute of Communications forum](#) to be held on 15 and 16 August 2023. **ACTION ITEM:** eSafety to share final version of the position statement with this working group; provide list of academics eSafety consulted over the drafting of the position statement (noting knowing who other agencies consider experts in their field would be useful for the LLM paper).

- eSafety is looking to revise and expand the Basic Online Safety Expectations (BOSE), including expanding the scope of the BOSE to other types of tech harms; online hate; generative AI; and services using generative AI.

OAIC

- On 8 August 2023, the OAIC released the [Australian Community Attitudes to Privacy Survey 2023](#). The survey includes insights on child privacy and safety; Australians' views on privacy risks; privacy issues' intersection with product safety; and difficulties unsubscribing from marketing communications.
- The OAIC is still engaging the Attorney-General's Department on the Privacy Act Review
- The OAIC is going through the court timetable on the agency's proceedings against Facebook Inc and Facebook Ireland in the Federal Court ^{s37}
- The OAIC released [new guidance](#) on what services children can access online.

Algorithms literature summary

2023-24/2024-25 workplan discussion

- Agreed to undertake working group planning on future work around the financial year.
- Suggested holding a workshop on planning future work for the 2024-2025 financial year. **ACTION ITEM: ACCC to circulate updated work plan before the group's next meeting.**
- Suggested noting the group's current work on updating the various documents/papers in the 2023-24 work plan.

Upcoming meetings

- Agreed to hold the next meeting in September 2023, excluding 30 September (noting Naomi Lampe on leave all September and will arrange a team member to step in for the meeting).
- Suggested the next examination of technology could cover biometrics or immersive tech (noting, however, the group has examined immersive tech before), to be discussed further.
