This dialogue is organised by the OECD Centre for Entrepreneurship, SMEs, Regions and Cities (CFE), with support from the European Commission (DG REGIO). In this discussion, <u>Juliette Langlais</u>, Airbnb Public Policy and Campaigns Director for Europe, Middle East and Africa (EMEA), will provide a keynote address on airbnb analysis of changes in people's travel and telework tastes and habits, and present the opportunities and challenges sub-national governments face in attracting visitors and teleworkers outside big cities.
